A series of sensations followd the arrest of Charles L. Warriner of Cin-A series of sensations followd the arrest of Charles L. Warriner of Cincinnati, a trusted official of the Big Four railroad, upon the charge of having embezzled large sums of the company's money. After Warriner had admitted that he was short in his accounts auditors went to work on the books and found that the discrepancies aggregated more than \$640,000. Warriner then made a confession, in which he charged several persons with having blackmailed him systematically for years. Edward Cooke, a former employee of the company, was named in published reports of the case, as was also Mrs. Jeannette Stewart Ford. Officials of the company were open in their declarations that Warriner had been the victim of designing persons, although those whom he named in his confession denied ever receiving any money from him unlawfully.

#### CHEVY CHASE.

The Old Rodgers Mansion and the Famous Washington Club.

Doubtless few of the many thousands of persons who have read of Chevy Chase have any idea of the interesting history attached to the clubbouse and surroundings. Part of the old colonial structure as it stands today was erected in 1747 and from that time until a few years ago remained in the Rodgers family. In the war of 1812, when the British were advancing on Washington, the army and navy records were taken from the White House and secreted in the cellar of the Rodgers mansion, where they were kept for

several days. The Rodgers family has been famous in the American navy, no fewer than seven baving served as admirals. The estate consisted of something like 200 scres, and as the beautifying of the property was always a bobby of its owners it is not surprising that unusual taste should have been shown in laying it out. It is a fact that there are 105 varieties of trees and bushes to be found within a stone's throw of the clubbouse. Not far from the present fourth green there was once a sunken garden, but this is scarcely more than a memory now.

The Chevy Chase club took possesgion in 1888 and at first rented the property from the Rodgers estate, but later the club purchased 200 acres. Several horse shows have been conducted on the property, and some years back the regular old fashloned county fairs were popular there. 



Becretary Wilson Amends Horace Greeley's Famous Utterance Washington, Nov. 20.— 'Go South,

young man,' ought to be substituted by the Department of Agriculture for Horace Greely's 'Go West, young man.'' where Secretary Wilson not afraid the changed admonition might be construed as smacking too strongly of an attempt upon the part of a branch of the Government leading itself to a claim of sectional advantages,

While the Secretary would not give an official O K to the substitution, he decanted enthusiastically today on the agricultural possibility of the South, and subscribed heartly to the sentiment that the Southern States are teeming with opportunities worth going after. Secretary Wilson is confident that the Southern farmer can double and treble his cotton acreage by pursuing scientific methods.

His first advice is for the Southern farmer to eradicate the cattle tick, through the success of which he will be able to raise more cattle. To accomplish this end he advises the cotton farmer to keep their cotton seed meal, and feed it to their cattle. It is cheap feed and cattle thrive upon it.

The South, he says, is remarkably well adapted to cattle raising, which can be made a profitable industry by utilizing the meal from the cotton seed for feed.

"There is no such thing as wornout lands in the South," continued Secretary Wilson. 'There are lands in the South now considered worn out that are worth as much as lands in the West valued at \$150 an acre. The socalled worn-out farmers can be made immensely profitable if the owners will only recognize and practice scientific methods in their cultivation."

### ARAB FASHIONS.

Clothes the Natives Wear and the Tailors Who Make Them.

Conservative to all matters, the Aral s especially averse to change in the matter of clothes. Not only do the fashions of the Arabs never change. writes Graham Petrie in "Tunis, Kairousn and Carthage," but they are very restricted. Although every Arab wears a gandoura more or less richly abroldered, it is always worked in ne of three accepted patterns, from which no deviation nor any combination is permitted.

The only matter in which persons taste is allowed to show itself is in the choice of color. In this respect entire reedom is permitted and taken full advantage of, although it is curious to iote that the more delicate shades of yellow and mauve are generall; worn by elderly men, while rich reand brown are in favor with their jun

The souk-el-trouk is the souk of the tailors in Tunis, and here in numerous little shops the sartorial needs of the Arab population are fashioned and temptingly displayed. I call them shops for want of a better word, but they are as unlike the European shop as snything one can imagine. They are really recesses separated from each other by coupled columns painted with stripes of red and greed, which support a continuous cornice, richly carved and colored. There are no windows or doors, and the shop is raised some four feet above the ground. To this elevation the tailor nimbly vaults, for there are no steps to assist him. Sit-ting crosslegged in orthodox fashion, he there cuts out, pieces together and embellishes the gay silk waistcoats, gandourss and other garments beloved the Arab.

Arab Buttermaking.

Among the Arabs an interesting de-partment of woman's duty is dairy work. This, like all other operations, is carried out on an old fashioned and patriarchal plan. To make butter, for instance, a small sheepskin is filled with milk and tied to a ring in the wall. The woman then sits flat on the floor and rocks it to and fro till little balls of butter begin to form within. These grow larger and larger and accumulate and are finally brought out as one big lump. The remaining milk is then boiled on the fire with bits of meat. The male members of the fam: ily now come together. A large dish of cooked rice is placed before them and the boiled milk poured over it. Then, making balls of the mixture with his bands each member quickly swallows his stare and rises to wash his hands. This done, the girls and mother sit down and eat what the men are pleased to leave.
