TECHNICALITY IS AGAIN INJECTED

PIERCE'S ATTORNEYS TRIAL IS IMMUNITY FROM TRIAL IS DUE DEFENDANT.

NOW ARGUING QUESTION

Jury Selection Was Completed Yesterday, Being Mostly of Young Men. Trial Begins.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., Dec. 1.—When the case of H. Clay Pierce was called in the district court here this morning, the defense filed a petition claiming immunity from trial because testimony which Pierce had given in other courts was being offered against him.

This question is being argued and the attorneys on both sides will probably consume the greater part of the day in their discussions of the matter.

The selecting of a jury was completed late yesterday afternoon. Most of the jurymen are young men. The personnel is as follows:

The defense's plea for immunity asserted that Pierce was compelled to involuntarily testify in the anti-trust case filed against the company in Missouri and that he is granted constitutional protection from prosecution in matters about which he is compelled to testify in another case. The motion and the state's answer will be submitted to the jury. The court ruled that the state will not be permitted to introduce any statement not connected with the affidavits.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., Dec. 1.—Counsel for H. Clay Pierce, head of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, on trial here charged with false swearing in connection with the re-admittance of the company into Texas, this morning sought to secure immunity for Pierce on the ground that the statute of limitation has operated against the prosecution.

Upon the conclusion of the reading of the indictment when the court convened, a motion asking immunity was immediately presented to District Judge Calhoun. The motion contends that Pierce was not a resident of Texas and while absent from the state was not a fugitive from justice, and for that reason, as a citizen of the state, would be immune from prosecution after the expiration of the limitation.

The counsel argue that limitation has operated in the case of Pierce as if he had been a citizen of the state. The court granted a recess to enable the state to prepare an answer. This will probably be one of the most important questions in the trial.

DIES IN BATH TUB.

Girl Was to Have Been Bridesmaid in Wedding Today.

Texas News Service Special. El Paso, Tex., Dec. 1.—Miss Margaret Bacon of Evansville, Ind., was found dead in a bath tub last night at the home of Judge A. B. Fall, where she was the guest of Miss Carolyn Fall, for whom she was to serve as bridesmaid today.

After rehearsing the wedding ceremony at 8 o'clock last night, Miss Bacon retired to her room, and was dead an hour later.

Miss Fall's marriage to Mahlon T. Everhart of Pueblo, Colo., has been postponed temporarily.

Judge Fall is a former attorney general of the United States and a personal friend of Roosevelt.

TRACTION PLANT ACCIDENT.

Boiler Head Blows Out, Seriously Injuring Engineer.

Temple, Tex., Dec. 1.—Asa Bunn, engineer at the power house of the Temple-Belton Traction Company, west of here, was seriously scalded this morning when the boiler head blew out, demolishing part of the plant. Traction service was suspended for several hours, pending repairs.

INSURGENTS GET NEW ARMS—U. S. INACTIVE

Texas News Service Special. Washington, D. C., Dec. 1.—Decisive action regarding the Nicaraguan situation is expected soon to be announced by the state department.

The department maintains its neutral position, but the secretary is inclined toward recognizing Estrada.

If the propositions to effect arbitration through Mexico or King Edward are defeated, the department will certainly bring pressure to bear on Zelaya and indemnity for the death of the two Americans or abdication by Zelaya, will follow.

By Associated Press. Stockholm, Dec. 1.—The Norwegian steamer Stavengen arrived here today from New York with arms and ammunition for the insurgents. It is now announced that General Estrada will immediately assume the aggressive and the impression is that the situation will soon end, despite Zelaya's claims to the contrary.

By Associated Press. Paris, France, Dec. 1.—The foreign office cabled the French consuls at Nicaragua today, instructing them to furnish information regarding the reports of ill treatment of French citizens in Nicaragua. Upon the nature of the replies depends the action of the government.

SAN ANTONIO SOLDIER ENDS LIFE WITH PISTOL

Texas News Service Special. San Antonio, Tex., Dec. 1.—Major Samuel B. Bogart, of the third cavalry of the United States Army at Fort Sam Houston, was found dead by the roadside near the post early this morning, a revolver lying by his side, and he had fired a bullet into his brain. A note in his hand read: "This is a deliberate attempt to end an ill-spent life." He requested the notification of his brother, Robert Bogart, 25 Wall Street, New York City.

TORPEDO EXPLODES.

One Man Killed and Noise Heard 25 Miles Away.

By Associated Press. Cameron, W. Va., Dec. 1.—Chimneys were toppled over by the concussion when a nitro-glycerine magazine marletta torpedo exploded near here today. One man was blown to pieces, and the roar was heard for twenty-five miles.

MEXICO HAS PLAN.

Is Trying to Bring About Peace in Central America.

City of Mexico, Dec. 1.—A suggestion for a peaceful solution of the Nicaraguan trouble has been made by the Government of Mexico to the United States. This was admitted by Minister of Foreign Relations, Ignacio Mariscal, last night. Mr. Mariscal said that no definite agreement had been reached up to this time and that he had not received a reply to his letter sent to Washington about six days ago.

Mr. Mariscal refused to discuss the nature of the suggestions in question, which he said were purely voluntary.

At a late hour last night he made the following statement to a correspondent of the Associated Press:

"About six days ago I wrote a letter to the United States Government in Washington in which I made several suggestions regarding a peaceful solution of the Nicaraguan controversy. No agreement of any kind has as yet been received up to this time. The matter rests purely in the form of a voluntary suggestion from my Government."

Mr. Mariscal is suffering from a throat affection and has not been at the Foreign Relations office for several days. Despite his illness he attended the presidential banquet to Ambassador Thompson last night, but remained only for a short time.

In view of the widespread report that Zelaya had asked and been refused aid from the Mexican Government, the failure of Francisco Castro, Nicaraguan Minister to Mexico and a close personal friend of Zelaya, to attend the banquet given by President Diaz last night in honor of the retiring American Ambassador, David E. Thompson, caused considerable comment. All of the other diplomatic representatives in the capital who could attend were present. It was known Castro was in the city and he is said to have received an invitation.

BLOODY MYSTERY IS TO BE SOLVED

BODY OF WOMAN FOUND IN VACANT HOUSE IN NEW JERSEY FOLLOWED BY ARREST.

INFANT'S SKULL FOUND

Search of Premises Brings to Light Some Ghastly Developments in the Affair.

By Associated Press. New York, Dec. 1.—The mystery surrounding the death of Mrs. Snead, whose body was found yesterday in a vacant house in East Orange, New Jersey, is still unraveled and the case is assuming bloody proportions.

Mrs. Wardlaw, an aunt of the dead woman, has been arrested in connection with the affair.

This morning the vacant house in which the body was found, was searched and some interesting, though very ghastly, developments came to light. Blood stains were found on the floors and walls of several rooms of the building. In the kitchen stove the officers found some bundles of human hair and the skull of a child, apparently about two years of age.

These discoveries have intensified the activities of the authorities and the cellar of the house is to be dug up and the walls thoroughly searched.

MELVIN OLEY KILLED.

Notorious Outlaw Meets Death in Duel With Officers.

Texas News Service Special. Tulsa, Okla., Dec. 1.—Melvin C. Oley, a notorious outlaw, was killed and Deputy Marshals Gooch and Tom Baxley were seriously wounded in a pitched battle between Oley and the officers late last night at Fetter, an oil town fourteen miles south of here.

It is alleged that Oley opened fire on Town Marshal Hignett as the men passed in the street, having vowed he would avenge the death of his brother, Homer Oley, by Hignett, two months ago.

Hignett and Gooch returned the fire and after a number of shots had been exchanged, Oley fell dead.

Baxley, a bystander, was wounded by a stray bullet. Hignett was uninjured. Gooch and Baxley were brought to the hospital here this morning, and both may be fatally wounded.

TELEPHONE METER.

Long-Desired Innovation Has Been Invented in Chicago.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 1.—Chicagoans will soon have their telephonic talk measured.

For two years the commission created by the telephone franchise has been hunting for an accurate and effective meter, and it announced to the council last night that it had been successful. In addition, the commission has ordered the company to install a "meter."

In the report of the engineers the following comments on the meter are suggested:

"Such a meter would be suitable for us to replace the service of the present nickel or toll-box type given by the Chicago Telephone Company. It is a question of policy where these meters should be placed on business phones.

"Such a meter could be installed on any telephone line without interfering with the subscriber's use of the telephone, except for the time required for him to register, and would give him at his station an accurate, visible record of the total number of calls made by him and for which he has to pay.

Steamer Runs Ashore.

SWITCHMEN STRIKE.

Traffic Maintained With Difficulty in Northwestern States.

St. Paul, Dec. 1.—Both sides of the controversy between the railroads of the Northwest and the Switchmen's Union of America which resulted in a walk out of switchmen between here and the Pacific coast, claim they have the situation well in hand. Passenger traffic from the Twin Cities was maintained last night and today with considerable delay. Little freight is handled anywhere. The switchmen are asking sixty cents an hour and double time for holidays and over time. It is said should the strike last, ten thousand men will be thrown out of work in a few days.

FRANCHISE TRANSFERRED.

Chattanooga Certain to Succeed Little Rock in Baseball League.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Dec. 1.—Making arrangements looking toward the transfer of Little Rock's franchise, reserve list and other property of the club was placed in the hands of President Kavanaugh of the Southern League with instructions to receive Chattanooga's draft for twelve thousand, five hundred dollars.

MUCH-WANTED SARDIN KILLED SELF TODAY

By Associated Press. Sacramento, Calif., Dec. 1.—Gus Sardin, wanted in Kansas for alleged murder, and in Texas on charges of robbery, committed suicide in the city prison here today by hanging.

TODAY'S PROCEEDINGS IN THE HIGHER COURTS

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Tex., Dec. 1.—The Court of Criminal Appeals today affirmed the sentences in the cases of Jack Matthews, from Grayson county; Henry Deckard, from Hill county; Woodland, from Smith county; Alonzo Cleveland, and John King from Tom Green county. No error was found in the record of the King case. King was convicted of the killing of Nate Ryan of San Angelo and sentenced to life imprisonment.

The Texas Supreme Court today affirmed the verdict in the case of the Houston Oil Company vs. Kimbell from Hardin county. Motion to dismiss on writ of error was submitted in the case of Murphy vs. Williams from El Paso. The case of the Itasca Independent School District vs. McElroy Hill from Hill county, was set for December 6. This case involves the school tax constitutional amendment recently carried.

IS NOT WORRIED.

John D. Rockefeller Smiles at Report of Danger.

By Associated Press. New York, Dec. 1.—John D. Rockefeller, who arrived here today, only smiled when told of the report that he was marked for kidnapping, or, perhaps, killing in Cleveland.

"I'm not the least bit worried about the story," said Mr. Rockefeller.

IS KILLED UNDER DENVER FREIGHT

D. J. RESINK OF FREDERICK, MEETS DEATH NEAR STOCK YARDS.

WAS SITTING ON TRACK

Death Was Almost Instantaneous. Money and Notes to Extent of Over Thousand Found on Him.

D. J. Resink of Frederick, Oklahoma, aged about 42 years, was run over and killed about 2 o'clock this morning by north bound freight train No. 19, in the Fort Worth and Denver yards near the stock pens. His skull was crushed and death was almost instantaneous.

According to Engineer Bennett of the freight train, Resink was sitting on the track and paid no attention to the whistle of the approaching train, which the engineer was unable to stop in time. The man was picked up by the crew of the freight train and brought to the depot, where he died before medical aid could be summoned, having expired when Dr. Burnside arrived.

Resink's home is in Frederick, Oklahoma, where a widow and several children survive him. He was until recently in the hardware business at Davidson, Oklahoma, moving to Frederick not long ago. He got on the home-coming excursion train at Grandfield last evening, riding down with a stockman named Wheatley. The train reached this city at 10:30 and it is not known where Resink spent the four hours between that hour and the time of his death. According to Mr. Wheatley, he was a man of excellent habits, and much respected by those who knew him. On his person was found the sum of \$25.50 in cash, several deposit slips on a Davidson bank, and two notes in his favor, one for \$250 and one for one thousand dollars.

The injuries consist of a crushed skull, which was probably the direct cause of his death, a broken right arm, a crushed right shoulder five or six fractured ribs and both hands badly bruised. He breathed once or twice after being picked up but was dead within ten minutes after being struck. The remains were forwarded to Frederick on this afternoon's Northwestern train and the funeral services will probably take place tomorrow morning.

Spokane, Wash., Dec. 1.—Deeds for a half interest in city and country property, appraised at \$250,000, will be presented on her wedding day to the woman selected as a wife by William B. Niedemeyer, a wealthy widower, with offices at 523 Hookery building, Spokane. He was born in Newark, N. J., January 21, 1861, moved to Nebraska in 1889 and came to Spokane in 1897. He wears a full beard and boasts that his face has never felt the edge of a razor.

Niedemeyer believes in advertising and he is using that means to find a life-partner. Regarding the qualifications of the bride-to-be he says among other things:

"The woman I marry must be a member of the Catholic church and a good Christian; aged not to exceed 35 years. LOVE TO GO OUT.

**Hawkins Will Probably Succeed Him
as Banking Commissioner.**
Austin Statesman:

Some time ago Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Love announced that he would resign his office about January 1. He has now more definitely fixed the date for February 1 and says that he has so notified the governor, although he has not sent him his written resignation. There appears to be doubt in the mind of Mr. Love that he will retire within the next two months and it is looked upon as an accepted fact that he means it.

It is understood in statehouse circles that the governor has already determined upon Mr. Love's successor and has already notified Judge William E. Hawkins, first office assistant attorney general, that the office is to be his if he wishes it. It is understood, too, that Judge Hawkins will accept. The position pays \$3000 annually, while his present office pays only \$2500. Judge Hawkins has been advising Mr. Love relative to the law governing various questions which have arisen in the departments of insurance and banking and is especially familiar with banking and insurance laws. The selection apparently meets with general favor.

Judge Hawkins has been prominently mentioned as a candidate for the office of attorney general to succeed Judge Davidson, but since the selection of J. P. Lightfoot for appointment by the governor to succeed to the office of attorney general after January 1, when Judge Davidson retires, Judge Hawkins has decided not to be in the next race.

LOVE TO GO OUT.

**Hawkins Will Probably Succeed Him
as Banking Commissioner.**
Austin Statesman:

Some time ago Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Love announced that he would resign his office about January 1. He has now more definitely fixed the date for February 1 and says that he has notified the governor, although he has not sent him his written resignation. There appears to be doubt in the mind of Mr. Love that he will retire within the next two months and it is looked upon as an accepted fact that he means it.

It is understood in statehouse circles that the governor has already determined upon Mr. Love's successor and has already notified Judge William E. Hawkins, first office assistant attorney general, that the office is to be his if he wishes it. It is understood, too, that Judge Hawkins will accept. The position pays \$3000 annually, while his present office pays only \$2500. Judge Hawkins has been advising Mr. Love relative to the law governing various questions which have arisen in the departments of insurance and banking and is especially familiar with banking and insurance laws. The selection apparently meets with general favor.

Judge Hawkins has been prominently mentioned as a candidate for the office of attorney general to succeed Judge Davidson, but since the selection of J. P. Lightfoot for appointment by the governor to succeed to the office of attorney general after January 1, when Judge Davidson retires, Judge Hawkins has decided not to be in the next race.

BROKE ALL RECORDS.

Sec. Wilson is Oldest Cabinet Member in Point of Service.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 30.—Secretary Wilson, the head of the department of agriculture, yesterday broke all records for length of service in the cabinet. Until Monday the record for length of service as cabinet minister was held by Albert Gallatin of Pennsylvania, who was secretary of the treasury in President Jefferson's first administration and who served in that office for twelve years, eight months and twenty days. Secretary Wilson was appointed by President McKinley on March 4, 1897, and, having served continuously ever since, today surpassed the record of Albert Gallatin.

The department of agriculture is a comparatively new branch of the government service and Mr. Wilson is but the third man to hold the position of secretary of that department. His predecessors, Jerry Rusk and Sterling Morton, were both good men, but it required a bulldozer and organizer like Wilson to carry along the work of the department to the point where the application of science and organized methods to farming could produce great benefit to the tiller of the soil.

Mr. Wilson is now 74 years of age, but he does not look it. He is more than six feet tall, is powerfully built, has a pair of keen gray eyes that follow closely every word of every narrative that comes to him while he is sitting in authority at his desk in the department. He yields little to the dictates of fashion in the matter of dress, confining himself to the garb of sober tints, but his immaculate linen, set off with a dark tie, suggests the man who is as unfailingly regular in his habits of dress as in everything else that concerns him.

The secretary, on his way to the long service record has figured in public life before he came into his present office. He spent three terms in con-

gress and gained a knowledge of official routine; then he went back to Iowa to become a professor in the Iowa Agricultural College. Then it was that the peculiarly appropriate combination struck President McKinley. Here was a man who was a farmer, who knew the practical side, but who also, by reason of his life as a pedagogue, was familiar with the scientific phases of farming and who, having served the nation in congress, understood lawmaking and administrative work. It was this exceptional fitness which caused him to be appointed for the position of secretary of agriculture.

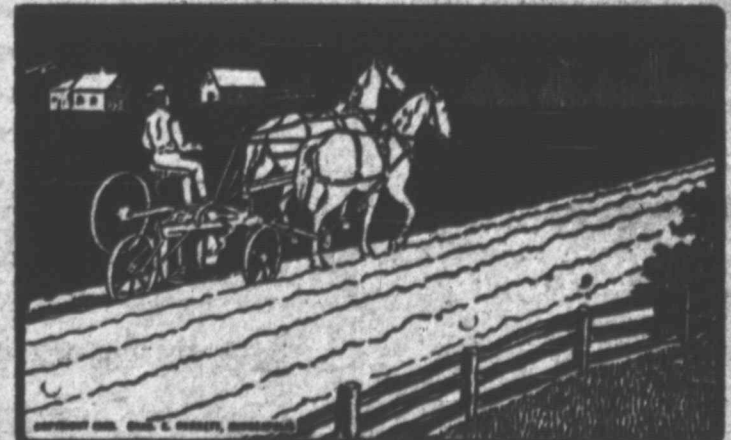

THE LEADING SIX CHAIR SHOP IN THE CITY

Santa Fe Provides for Its Extension in West Texas.

Austin, Nov. 30.—The amended articles of incorporation of the Concho, San Saba and Llano Valley railroad company were approved yesterday by the attorney general and filed in the state department. The amendment proposes to construct a line of railroad extending from Paint Rock to Lubbock in Lubbock county, a distance of 215 miles. The amendment also proposes to increase the capital stock from \$200,000 to \$255,000. This is a line which was incorporated only a short time ago, and R. A. Love, its general manager and moving spirit. The road only runs at present from Paint Rock to Miles, a distance of about fourteen miles. As this amendment was filed by Judge J. W. Terry, it is taken as an indication that the Santa Fe has absorbed this new piece of railroad.

The articles of incorporation of the Colorado and Concho Railway company were also filed in the state department yesterday afternoon after having been approved by the attorney general's department. The headquarters for this new road is Colorado, Mitchell county, a distance of sixty miles, and the capital stock is fixed at \$500,000. It is proposed to construct a line of road from a point on the Texas and Pacific at Colorado, thence through Mitchell, Lee and Coke counties to Robert Lee, in Coke county, thence to a point on the Kansas City, Mexico and Orient railway to Tenyson, about sixty miles. Incorporated by C. W. McCutchen, F. D. Coulson, J. C. Cunningham, W. J. Adams, W. F. Dypree and S. B. Kemp.
