BELGIUM'S RULER PASSED AWAY EARLY THIS MORNING-END WAS PEACEFUL.

Regency Council Will Conduct Affairs Until Prince Albert can Ascend Throne.

Brussels, Dec. 17.—King Leopold died at 2:35 o'clock this morning, following several weeks' illness with intestinal trouble.

All Brussels mourns today. The flags on all the public buildings are at half mast and private houses are draped in the crepe of mourning.

The body of the departed king, clothed in the iniform of a lieutenantgeneral, remains in the chamber of 'The Palms,' where death occurred last night. It is surrounded only by those who in life won and retained the king's close friendship.

The expression on the face of the dead monarch is peaceful and serene as though the end came without any haunting memory of the scandals and suffering to which the king had been subjected.

The body will be placed in its casket this evening and then the period of mourning will officially begin. Death

## FINLAND SUMMERS.

Effect of the Famous "White Nights" Upon Vegetation.

The famous "white nights" of the north are a most surprising phonomenon to the visitor from southern climes, It is a weird experience, declares A. M. Scott in "Through Finland," to sit for the first time upon a veranda at midnight and read a newspaper or to walk home from a restaurant at 1 o'clock in the morning and to see people still gossiping at the street corners or strolling along the promenades under a bright, clear sky!

A spirit of rest and peace is over all the earth. The sky is bright, not with the flery brilliancy of noon, but with a tender, gentle radiance. The colors of the landscape have become softened, but not blended. There are no shadows save for a week or two in June, when the bright northern sky at midnight projects faint, ghostlike shadows toward the south. The sun just dips below the horizon and no more. There is no division between the sunset and the dawn. The same rosy flush serves for both.

Summer in Finland is, in fact, one ong day. Never a star is to be seen, and when the first faint star glimmers in the south it is a sign that the summer is past and that the autumn frosts have arrived.

The long light has a marvelous effect upon vegetation, forcing its growth at hothouse pace. The "white nights" account both for the suddenness of the burgeoning and for the intensity of the heat. Land and water have no time to cool. One cannot fail to be struck with the enormous size of the foliage upon the oak and hawthorn trees as compared to that to which we are accustomed. Botanists have explained this as being due to the larger supply of light. It has sometimes been suggested that we may hasten the harvests by the use of artificial lights. Nature herself does this for the Fin-

SCIENCE ON THE SOIL.

Increase of Yield Obtained by Chemical Treatment.

This is the age of scientific farming. Take the results from grain by the application of phosphates to the The lack of phosphates is not limited to the older sections of the country. In Wisconsin, for example, it has been customary in the wooded districts to clear but small fields and crop these fields continuously for a number of years very largely to grasses for hay, chiefly timothy. This prac tice has had the effect of greatly re ducing the available phosphates of the



soil, and in such cases exceptional care will be needed to restore the supply of available phosphates.

In the spring of 1908 a farmer in Wisconsin made an extensive experi ment with phosphate on clay loam land which had not given satisfactory yields the preceding year. For this purpose he purchased four tons of acid phosphate, using it on oats seeded to clover and on corn in three different amounts-namely, 100, 200 and 400 pounds per acre. The result of this experiment is given in the following quotation from a letter from the experimenter:

"I am of the opinion the grain (oats) was thicker on the ground, and there were more cats at thrashing than where the fertilizer was not used. On the heavier soils the difference was apparent very early in the season, and later on, when the grain headed out, the pieces could be picked out readily. the stand was thicker and more uni form -in fact, some of it was as nice onts as I ever saw stand up. I found that where we used 100 pounds it was somewhat better, when 200 pounds were used it was very much better. and when we used 400 pounds the best results were obtained. The benefit was even more apparent in the corn



than in the oats, the stand was far better and more vigorous, towering above the other beside it, and the color, too, was different, being a rich green of a darker bue."

Similar experiments have been made

in Illinois and Obio. The cuts here presented show the beneficial effect of acid phosphate on corn. An increased yield of large and well filled ears resulted where phosphate was used compared with a light yield and nubbins where none was

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### A LOVE TRAGEDY.

Ruskin's Adoration of the Lovely Rose La Touche.

In 1858, when Ruskin was in his fortieth year, he was asked by a friend to give some lessons in drawing to a child named Rose La Touche, whose name, indeed, was French, but whose family were Irish. There sprang up between Ruskin and this young girl a very charming friendship, which, of course, at the time could be nothing but a friendship. They wrote each other letters and exchanged drawings, and then for a while they did not meet.

Ten years passed by before they saw each other. Meanwhile the child, whom he had remembered as a blue eyed, saucy, clever little blond with ripe red lips and hair like fine spun gold, had become a very lovely young woman of nineteen. They resumed their old acquaintance, but in a very different way. Though Ruskin was now nearly fifty, he gave to Rose La Touche an adoration and a passion such as he had never felt before. On her side she no longer thought of him as "very ugly," but was singularly drawn to him despite the difference in their years. The two met often. They took long

strolls together in the pleasant fields of Surrey, and at last Ruskin begged her to make him happy and to be his wife. Oddly enough, however, she hesftated, not because he was so much older than herself, but because he had ceased to be what she regarded as "a true believer." Some of the things that he had written sbocked her as being almost atheistic. She was herself, underneath all her galety of manner, a rigid and uncompromising Protestant. She used phrases from the Bible in her ordinary talk, and when she spoke of marriage with John Ruskin she said that she could not endure to be "yoked with an unbeliever."

Yet her heart was torn at the thought sending him away, and so for several years their intimacy continued, he pleading with her and striving hard to make her see that love was everything. She, on the other hand, read over those passages of the Old Testament which seemed to bar all com-

At last, in 1872, when she was twenty-four and he was fifty-three, she gave him her final answer. She would not marry him unless he could believe as she did. His honesty forbade him to deceive her by a pretended conver-sion, and so they parted, never to see each other again. How deeply she was affected is shown by the fact that she soon fell ill. She grew worse and worse until at last it was quite certain that she could not live. Then Ruskin wrote to her and begged that he might see her. She answered with a note in which she feebly traced the words:

"You may come if you can tell me that you love God more than you love

When Ruskin read this his very soul was racked with agony, and he cried

"No, no; then I cannot go to her, for love her even more than God." When she died, as she did soon after, the light of his life went out for Rus-

kin.-Lyndon Orr in Munsey's Maga-

This does not seem a very definite determination, but then in geology estimates of time in years are extremely difficult because of the uncertainty of the elements of the calculation. The most that can be said for such results is that they are probable.




