

DECLINE OF TWO AND A HALF CENTS RECORDED ON EVERY-THING BUT PORK.

No Reduction On Pork, as Local Butchers Are Unable to Lower Its Price.

Beef, veal and mutton are selling for two and a half cents less a pound than formerly in some of the local markets and prices on everything but pork

are now appreciably lower. Meat market proprietors will not admit that the decline in prices is a result of the boycott recently inaugurated, but say that it was brought about through the ordinary market flucta-

tions Beef was selling for from ten to seventeen and a half cents per pound last week but is quoted today at eight to fifteen cents. Prices on mutton have declined from seventeen and a half cents to fifteen cents and yeal has

declined at about the same rate. Pork prices are the same as heretofore and there is no promise that there will be any decline. An average grade of bacon costs thirty cents today and the butcher claims there is no profit in it even at that price.

'Pork prices will have to stay up, 'r said a local butcher this morning.

'Good bacon is worth thirty cents today and we are just barely breaking even on it at that price. If we put it any lower we would lose money." The decline of two and a half cents in meat prices put them down to a figure lower than they have been for some time past and nearer to being

HUGHES IS DENOUNCED

Position on Income Tax Bared by Hull

of Tennessee Washington, Jan. 28.—Charging hypocrisy on the part of many public men in openly advocating the ratifica-tion of the constitutional amendment for an income tax while secretly attempting to defeat it, Representative Hull of Tennessee, in the House today pointed to Governor Hughes of New York as illustrating this class of advocates of an income tax.

Most of the medical colleges in the United States are co-educational, and tendance at each college every year. Lisot here are three medical colleges devoted exclusively to women; notably, the Women's Medical College of Penn sylvania, which graduates about forty women each year. LOVE MAKES STATEMENT

Corrects Existing Impresions of Rating Board's Work

At the meeting of the fire rating board at Austin Thursday, Chairman

Chairman Love stated at the outset of the meeting that there was evidently some misunderstanding of the effect of the Fire Rating Board law and the work of the board under it. He said that absolutely no rates had been made or approved by the board in any part of the State up to this time; that the law did not provide that the Fire Rating Board should make fire insurance rates, but that it should reduce them if they were too high, so that they would be reasonable, the action of the board being at all times subject to review by the courts. He said it was the duty of the board to carefully and fully investigate the reasonableness of all rates of insurance being collected in the state and to take action in reducing any unreasonable rates upon giving the company due notice and also to set down for hearing upon such notice all complaints filed by any citizen or by the representatives of any city or town; that in pursuance of this provision the rates filed by several companies applicable to the city of Fort Worth had been specifically complained against by certain property owners as to specific rates and by representatives of the city as to their general application and that this hearng had been called and all the parties interested notified to take up the matter for consideration.

He said that he was authorized to say for the board that in view of its rule it would hereafter be the general policy of the board to have such hearngs take place in the city or town affected by the complaint rather than in the city of Austin, so that no citi-zens would be put to any expense in atending such hearings and that it was the policy of the board to require no formality in the presentation of a complaint; that all the board desired to know was that a specific rate or the rates applied in a given locality were deemed unreasonable and that upon receiving this information they, would take up the mater for formal consider-


