Diplomacy of the different under the Eisenhower adminisration regarding the Suez Canal takeover by Egypt, we would be in much better position now to justify our position in the Panama Canal Zone. Regardless of diplomacy or world opinion the administration will do whatever is necessary to protect our rightful interests in the zone and in the operation of the canal, even at the risk of gaining the reputation of being a bully. It would be interesting to know what a Republican administration would do with a similar situation, one for which they were directly responsible.

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

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

Geldon said these are farmers who do not file income tax and self-employment reports on their farm earnings.

Geldon pointed out that Federal law requires farmers who clear at least \$400 a year to file tax returns and pay social security taxes. Farmers who do not clear \$400, but whose total farm sales are at least \$600, may report this income and pay social security tax on it under special provisions for farmers only, and thus earn credit for low or no profit years.




