Richards operates, a 2,000-acre, 300-cow spread with the help of his sons, Jerry and Burt.
He uses brands rather than tags or neck chains in his identification system. The reason, of course, is because brands will never be pulled off by brush or fences.

SENATOR DODD: First of all let me say this. This bill will require the manufacturers and producers and sellers, retail and wholesale, of these dangerous addictive drugs to keep a record of how many they produce, to whom they sell them and where they sell them. Now this may seem strange to you. You say, 'I assume this has been going on all the time.' Wellit hasn't been.

Under this bill Narcotics Bureau inspectors can go, in and check the records. This I think will be a salutory things. Up to now you know, these drugs have not been under this kind of control, and millions of them are sold to young people, to some adults, with the result that they're becoming addicts and on the threshold of addiction

—many of them have proceeded from the threshold to real addiction.—to heroin, to opium, to cocaine.





Corps Saves Money
Peace Corps Director Sargent
Shriver told Congress this week that his agency is a tight little financial listand in the vast sea of government spending.
In testimony before the Senate Appropriations Committee, Shriver cited facts and figures to show how the Peace Corps is cutting costs and increasing efficiency in the far-flung Peace Corps operation.

Shriver asked the committee to approve \$106. 1 million to operate the Peace Corps during the year which began July 1, compared to \$104.1 million voted by the House. To support his request, Shriver lot the United States for medical reasons.

Proper Management Brings More Milk From Dairy Cattle

The hard working dairy cow is a lady and needs to be protected, says A. M. Meekma, Extension dairy specialist, Texas A & M University. Feeding and breeding are of top importance but other management factors also play a big part in production.

Fifty to 60 square feet of shea area per cow is needed just for loafing, says Meekma. Two to two-and-one half lineal feet of manger space per cow is required to assure enough eating room.

Cows will not consume as much feed if eating room is inadequate and if feed is not available at all times. Thus, Meekma says, production is lowered.

Anything disturbing to cows affects their efficiency, the specialist points out. Loud or new noises, dogs barking, children playing, or anything to which the cows are not accustomed can cut production. Accurate record keeping is also important in the management of dairy animals, says the specialist. Records can and will be a big help in locating "soft spots" in your management practices.

When treating for mice, smaller amounts of bait should be used and should be placed at closer intervals. This is because mice live in small areas and travel about very little, explains Poore.

Although it is difficult to determine the amount of bait to put out, about five pounds is average for a Texas farm.

In addition to the dry form, a soluble material is available for use in a water bait, says Poore. One packet is sufficient for on quart of water which may be exposed in baby-chick water fountains or similar containers. In dry surroundings this is particularly effective.

Adding a tablespoor of sugar to

surroundings this is particularly effective.

Adding a tablespoon of sugar to each quart of liquid bait makes it much more attractive, provided ants aren't a problem.

Placing the liquid and dry baits together at a station is more effective for controlling rats, Poore points out. They will consume more of the bait and quicker kills will result, especially in the summer. Poore warns that any animal or human can be harmed by anticoagulant bait if enough is eaten every day or so for several days. An injection of Vitamin K will serve as an effective antidote. Baits should be placed where only rats and mice can feed on them.

"Anticoagulants are not poisons but rather chemicals and are the safest materials for rat and mouse control that have yet been develop-

The 4-H Tractor program has trained well over a million youths to drive safely, handle the big machines and keep them in working order year around. The project is planned and supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service. In this state and five others, educational aids and awards are provided by the Humble Oil & Refining Company.

With today's big investments in farm equipment, it is vital that tractors are adequately maintained and put to maximum use, points out 4-H Club leaders. A breakdown could mean financial loss on crops.

There is always plenty to do in this project, even for the beginner. The program is divided into four sections. The first year participation acquaints the member with the tractor and safe rules for operation.

Second year members learn to operate the tractor and what it takes to keep it going. Care of battery, spark plugs, cooling system and tires is taught. Operating costs, including fuel and lubrication also are studied.

"Improving Your Skills" is the title of the third unit. This emphasizes highway safety, power take-off, brakes, power transmission, winter care and ownership costs.

The fourth year and advanced unit goes into detail on machinery care such as servicing and maintaining tillage tools, planters, harvesters and sprayers. By the time 4-H'ers have completed the fourth year, they usually have assumed responsibility for not only the farm tractors, but other machinery as well.

Over the years thousands of young 4-H farmers have been recognized in various ways for doing a superior job. The program sponsor this year again will provide an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago for the state winner. College scholarships worth \$500 each will be awarded to the top 12 members across the nation. They will be designated by the Extension Service.


