Mr. Colquitt will arrive in Wichita Falls at 2 a. m. on the morning of the 17th and will be the guest of the local committees during the morning. At 1 p. m., at some place yet to be selected, he will deliver the opening address of his campaign, being introduced by Judge Scurry. After the opening speech, the candidate will be taken to Lake Wichita where he will probably deliver a second address. At the performance of "The Third Degree" Thursday night, Mr. Colquitt and the other visitors, including the visiting newspaper men, will be the guests of the entertainment committee at a box party. Following the show, an informal smoker will be given at the Elks Club in Mr. Colquitt's honor.

Excursion rates have been put on by several of the railroads entering this city and there is little doubt that the occasion will be attended by thousands of people from other points. Mr. Colquitt's friends from all over Texas will probably attend the affair.

## Preparing for Strike.

## AUTOMOBILE ENGINE TO BE SHIPPED AT ONCE BY THE MANUFACTURERS

The "bubble" fire engine which is shortly to be added to the city's fire equipment will be shipped from St. Louis on Friday of this week and will be rushed to this city as rapidly as possible, according to a telegram received by Mayor T. B. Noble this morning, as follows:

"Engine finished, M. K. & T. promised special car Friday. Robison Fire Apparatus Mfg. Co."

This means that the automobile engine will be here by the middle of this month and that within a very short time Wichita Falls will be equipped with a modern fire fighting apparatus as can be obtained.

## JUMPS FROM TRAIN.

Alleged Forger Gets Away from Officer in Darkness.

Texas News Service Special. San Antonio, Mch. 9.—While an I. & G. N. train was running twenty-five miles an hour, Charles Neill, white, charged with forgery, who was being taken from Austin to Kyle jumped out of the window as the train was entering Kyle. He was handcuffed. Deputy Sheriff Hall of Hays county was leading the prisoner to the platform, believing Neill was following him. When he looked around Neill had escaped in the darkness.

Railroad Commission Hears Final Arguments on Case.

## CONTRACT SIGNED TODAY FOR \$100,000 UNION DEPOT

Will Be Two Blocks in Length, Extending from Seventh to Ninth Streets. Work to Start Immediately.

A union passenger station, extending from 7th to 9th street, on Michigan Avenue, 780 feet in length, and costing one hundred thousand dollars, is assured for Wichita Falls as the result of a contract which was signed this afternoon by D. B. Keefer, representing the Fort Worth and Denver, and Messrs. Kemp and Kell of the Northwestern. The depot will be used by all the railroads entering this city. The new Northwestern building will be used for the general offices of that road. It was also announced today that freight terminals would be constructed by the Wichita Falls and Northwestern on Ohio Avenue, between 9th and 10th streets. Work on these improvements is to be started at the earliest possible moment.

Briefly, that tells the story of Wichita Falls' newest acquisition. D. B. Keefer, vice-president and general manager of the Fort Worth and Denver, is in the city today to close the contract with the Northwestern officials and this contract was signed at noon today. It is announced that the work will start as soon as the site can be cleared.

The union station is to front on the south side of 8th street, but the long shed will extend from the south side of 7th street to the north side of 9th street, making the depot a total of two blocks in length. It will be two stories in height and will be a handsome up-to-date building.

The old Katy depot is to be torn away and a freight depot for joint use by the Wichita Falls Route and the

Katy will be constructed at the corner of 9th and Ohio. The new depot will be as modernly equipped a structure as any in the Southwest. It will have handsomely appointed waiting rooms, a well equipped cafe and other features. The Northwestern building at 8th and Michigan will be used for the general offices of that company and will not, as has been reported, be sold to a wholesale grocery company. The Times is authorized by Mr. Kemp to deny, as being without foundation, the rumor to that effect. While it has been whispered for several weeks that a union depot was in store for Wichita Falls, it was not definitely known until noon today that such a structure would be erected, nor were the details of the proposed building given out until today.

## WICHITA FAILS TO LAND CONVENTION

1911 ODD FELLOWS MEETING GOES TO WACO INSTEAD OF TO THIS CITY.

## DECISION THIS MORNING

Dallas and Waco Combined Were Able to Defeat Wichita Falls By Small Majority.

With Dallas and Waco combining against her in favor of Waco, Wichita Falls failed to land the 1911 meeting. Odd Fellows at Austin this morning, the next year's convention going to Waco by a small majority. Such was the news received by the Times today. The Wichita delegation put up a stiff fight for the next meeting and let the rest know that Wichita Falls was on the map. The following telegram received by the Times this morning covers the situation:

"It took a combination of Dallas and Waco to win for Waco by a small majority. They know Wichita Falls is on the map."—P. C. Maricle.

The Wichita delegation went to Austin armed with badges and banners booming this city for the 1911 meeting and for a while it appeared that this city would be successful. The support of the big Dallas delegation, however, went to Waco and that city won out. Without Dallas' aid Waco would have been beaten. It is planned to secure the 1912 meeting for this city and that idea will be kept in mind. While the local Odd Fellows regret very much that Wichita Falls failed to land the 1911 meeting, they think that a great deal of good has been accomplished.

Texas News Service Special. Austin, Mch. 9.—The Texas Odd Fellows today selected Waco for the convention next year after a spirited contest for the honor by Dallas and Wichita Falls. Governor Campbell will be given the assembly degree in the Rebecca's and the lodge Odd Fellows will ask a special dispensation to give him the degree. Adjournment will take place tomorrow.

## COUNTER OFFER IS SUBMITTED TODAY

REPRESENTATIVES OF CHARLIE AND THORNBERRY MEET COMMITTEE THIS AFTERNOON.

## ACCEPT OFFER IN PART

Announce that There is Some Opposition to Giving of Bonus for the Line.

A counter proposition to the promoters of the Wichita Falls & Northern railway was submitted this afternoon at a meeting of the committee of the road with the representatives from Charlie and Thornberry. In general, the report from these communities was not excessively encouraging, but the committee is still confident. The counter proposition calls for eighty acres at Thornberry and one hundred acres at Charlie, with the desired amount of right of way. While it is probable that a bonus will be added to these inducements, the committee was not in a position to make any definite promises along that line today. Mr. Bevering, speaking for the country committee, stated that many of the settlers in that section considered that Byers and Petrolis were close enough to give them good railroad services, though these were in the minority. The committee from Thornberry consists of Messrs. C. J. Shumake, J. F. Poole, J. B. L. Hansard, and Joseph Stephenson; that from Charlie includes August Bevering, William Linville and Louis Hooker.

There is some opposition at both these places to the offering of any bonus. As the Times goes to press this afternoon, the railroad committee, is still in conference with the Charlie and Thornberry representatives and it is not known what the final action will be.

PERCY SAILS.

Leaves for Washington to Tag Seat as Senator.

## WILL NAME M'GRADY.

Understood Taft Will Adopt Lyon's Recommendation.

Texas News Service Special. Washington, D. C., March 9.—It is reported at the capitol today that President Taft can be depended upon almost to a certainty to appoint J. G. McGrady of Bonham, to succeed late Federal Judge Bryant for the Eastern Texas District. Taft had in consideration a number of others, and at first really desired to refuse Cecil Lyon's recommendations, as it would make it appear that Lyon had too much power. Fearing he might antagonize Lyon's friends, and could not make any better appointment, either, it is said that Taft will name McGrady within a week's time.

## WOMAN HAD PISTOL.

Is Fined One Hundred Dollars in El Paso Court.

## REAL ESTATE DEALERS TAKE DECISIVE ACTION ON GOOD ROAD MATTER

The Real Estate Dealers Association met in weekly session yesterday afternoon at the office of Moore, Jackson & Perkins and several matters of importance were discussed. Judge Edgar Scurry addressed the meeting, calling attention to the fact that O. B. Colquitt is to open his campaign here next week and that it was necessary for Wichita Falls to do the honors. A resolution was adopted pledging the support and assistance of the Association to Judge Scurry. The county road question was brought up again and the desirability of a road eastward from 7th street was discussed, it being pointed out that this would be a great convenience to all in that direction. In order to get some definite action on the matter a committee consisting of J. B. Marlow, Butler Moore, C. W. Bean, N. Henderson and M. O'Reilly was appointed to take the matter up with the country commissioners. Satisfactory progress on the Oklahoma City railroad proposition was reported and the new brick plant offer was endorsed.

## BIG SWINDLING TRIAL

"Fixed" Races and Fights to be Called in Court.

## ANOTHER PARK FOR CITY IS ASSURED

"SEVEN SISTERS" BLOCK HAS BEEN PURCHASED BY LOCAL PARTIES FOR PARK.

## DEAL IS BEING CLOSED

Will Be Turned Over to City as Soon As Proposed Special Charter Can Be Secured.

R. E. Huff and Frank Kell have about perfected arrangements whereby block 215, known as the "Seven Sisters" bounded by 15th, 14th, Lamar and Travis streets, will be purchased from its present owners and held intact until the city has received a special charter, at which time if the citizens desire to have it as a public park it will be turned over to the city without profit. A number of other leading citizens are assisting in the movement and their names will be given out when the deal is closed. There is every reason to believe that this effort will be successful and there is little doubt that the people will favor having this park when the question is put up to them. While the proposed park at the Lake is a valuable acquisition, it would be valuable only, when the citizens had time to spend as much as half a day off. A small park close in will afford a place for recreation for those not wishing to go out so far and would be available for all classes of our citizens. This proposed park is only one of several contemplated in different parts of the city, but this tract will be the first. Being on the car line and conveniently close in it will make a most desirable park. It is the intention of the gentlemen who have purchased it to plant trees at once and make other improvements. It is likely that the Civic League ladies will be given charge of the new park until such time as it can be turned over to the city, if they will undertake the task.

COMPARATIVELY QUIET.

No Serious Demonstrations in Philadelphia Today.

By Associated Press. Philadelphia, Pa., March 9.—Despite the excitement created last night by "shooting up" one of the principal thoroughfares by a trolley car load of alleged strike breakers from St. Louis, there was no serious demonstrations against cars operating early today. Three men and a fourteen-year-old girl were taken to a hospital suffering from bullet wounds. The strike leaders still claim that between one hundred and twenty to one hundred and fifty thousand persons are idle.

Newcastle, Pa., March 9.—The ninth annual convention of the federation of labor, in session here today, unanimously passed a resolution asking that in the event arbitration of the strike question fails, the American Federation of Labor will call a nation wide strike or organized and unorganized labor.

The delegates have to refer the matter back to the congregations they represent and for this reason it will take several weeks to get the new association organized.

## ANOTHER NAVAL INVESTIGATION

Some of the Congressmen Want Sutton Case Reopened.

Washington, D. C., March 5.—The "Sutton Case," which has been the subject of two naval inquiries, is to be brought before the public attention again, and, from all indications, it is destined to be as prolific of official investigations as the Brownsville affair. Today a joint resolution was introduced in both houses of congress, asking for a thorough re-investigation into the death of Lieutenant James S. Sutton and of all the events leading up to the tragedy. Simultaneously, it is understood, the mother will institute proceedings in the civil courts of Maryland.

Lieutenant Sutton died at Annapolis as a result of a wound in the head caused by a pistol shot on October 15, 1907. At the time of his death the lieutenant was a student at the marine school of application. According to the testimony given at the first investigation, Sutton quarreled with a brother officer as they, accompanied by several other officers, were returning in an automobile from a dance at Annapolis to the barracks. There was a fist fight after the party left the automobile in which Sutton is said to have been vanquished. The testimony tended to show that he went to his quarters and obtained a revolver with the intention of shooting his antagonist. He fired one shot at Lieutenant Robert E. Adams of the Marine Corps, but did not strike him.

Lieutenant Edward P. Roelker, another Marine Corps officer, who was a member of the party, attempted to intervene and struggled with Sutton in an attempt to disarm him. A second shot from Sutton's pistol pierced Roelker's clothes, but did not penetrate his body. According to the testimony, Sutton, who had been thrown to the ground in his encounter with Roelker, then shot himself in the head.

A board of officers appointed to investigate Sutton's death rendered a verdict that he had committed suicide and that no person was in any way responsible for his death. About a year ago, as a result of an agitation on the part of the family and friends of the dead lieutenant, the matter was re-opened and another board appointed to inquire into the circumstances of the tragedy. It was rumored at the time that sensational disclosures would be made and that the arrest of one or more Marine Corps officers on the charge of being concerned in the death of Lieutenant Sutton might follow. Numerous witnesses were summoned, but after a thorough investigation the board arrived at the same verdict as its predecessor, namely, that Sutton had come to his death by his own hand. The mother still maintains, however, that her son did not die by his own hand, but that his death was the result of a conspiracy.

## LIVE OVER OLD TIMES.

Old-Time Players Remember Forrest at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 5.—In pursuance of a custom inaugurated many years ago, the anniversary of the birth of Edwin Forrest, who was born in this city, March 9, 1806, was observed today by the inmates of the Actors' Home at Holmesburg, which institution was founded by the celebrated tragedian. Here, surrounded by pictures, books and stage mementoes that made up the great art collection owned by Forrest, the venerable actors and actresses, bent with the weight of years, gaily repeated the scenes of their former triumphs on the stage. The entertainment was attended by numerous invited guests, among them being a number of well-known players now filling engagements at the local theatres.

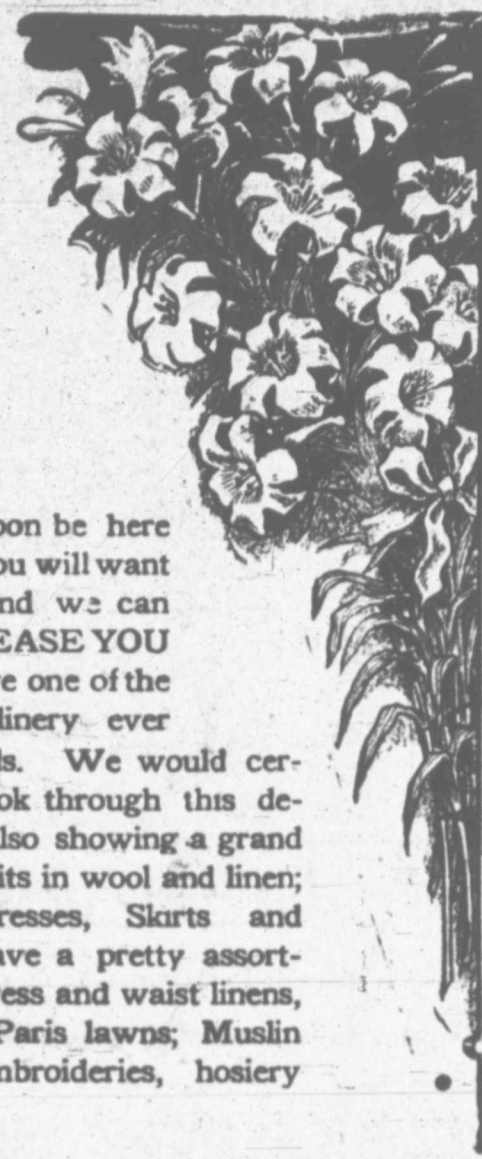

# Life of Wizard Schaefer

Some Sidights on the Career of One of the Greatest Billiard Players of the World.

Jacob Schaefer, surnamed "The Wizard," without dispute, was the greatest of all billiard players and did more for the development of the game than any other man, living or dead. To him belongs the credit for the modern scientific game. He led the way and there is scarcely a large city in the world where Schaefer's wonderful skill in the manipulation of the balls was not admired at some time in his lifelong career as a billiard expert.

Jacob Schaefer was born of German parents, in Milwaukee, Wis., on Feb. 2nd, 1855. Before he had reached his tenth year his parents moved to Leavenworth, Kas., and there the boy, at the age of fourteen, first became interested in the game. He progressed rapidly and at the age of fifteen he was the acknowledged champion of Leavenworth. In 1872, Schaefer played his first match game at the four-ball game with Adam Kessler, then champion of Wisconsin. Schaefer won, 1,500 to 502. He next defeated Lew Shaw, who afterwards became an expert finger billiardist, 100 to 800, for a purse of \$100. In 1873, he was matched against Slosson at French caroms, 400 points up, for a purse. The game was played in Indianapolis and Slosson won, 400 to 289.

While in San Francisco, a year or so later, Schaefer challenged any player on the coast and was matched against Franz Kraker, at French caroms, 600 points up, for \$2,000 in gold. Schaefer won with an average of 12 and by a score of 600 to 551. Then Schaefer went to New York. He entered the French carom tournament there in 1876, but finished next to last, being defeated by J. Dion, Rudolphe, Slosson, Garnier and C. Dion. In 1878 he was defeated at the same game by Slosson in Chicago.

In 1878 Schaefer defeated John Flack at Boston in a cushion carom game, 300 points up, for \$1,000, Schaefer allowing Flack a discount, and winning the game 300 to 299. In 1879 he won the New York tournament at French caroms. He defeated Slosson for \$1,000 and the championship, at French caroms, in 1879 in Chicago and again in New York in the same year. He was defeated three times by Sexton in 1881, and again in 1882. He finished second to Dion in the cushion carom tournament in New York in 1881. In November, 1886, Schaefer was defeated by Slosson at cushion caroms in Chicago, and again in April, 1887.

At the first championship game tournament in New York, February, 1879, Schaefer finished third, and was defeated by Vigneaux in Paris in December, 1880. Schaefer defeated Slosson in April, 1881, and was defeated by Slosson in 1884. In January, 1885, Schaefer again wrestled laurels from Slosson. With a single average of 40 and a grand average of 20 1-3, Schaefer won the first balkline tournament, 8-lach balk, in Chicago, March, 1883, and lost with Vigneaux in Paris, 3,000 to 2,895. He defeated Slosson in Chicago in May, 1884, 800 to 344, with an average of 35 1-10, and a 12-inch balkline game in January, 1884, with an average of 14.

Slosson defeated Schaefer for first prize in a 14-inch balkline tournament in New York in May, 1885, and he was tied with Vigneaux and Slosson in the triangular 14-inch balkline tournament in Chicago, in November, 1885. In December of the same year he was defeated for first place in the same kind of tournament by Slosson. Another triangular tournament in the same month, between the same players, was won by Schaefer, who made the highest run and best single and grand average, the latter being 23 3-3. Schaefer defeated Vigneaux with a grand average of 26 25 3-4 in a five-night, match, 14-inch balkline, in New York, in January, 1886, and again in March with an average of 25 1-2.

Schaefer defeated Slosson in Chicago in April, 1887, 14-inch balkline game and made an average of 17 7-9. In a 14-inch tournament in St. Louis, January, 1888, he defeated Slosson, making one single average of 50 and a grand average of 24 56-131.

In the balkline tournament at New York, 1890, Schaefer, although crippled by rheumatism, won second place. The following April he won the Chicago handicap 16-inch balkline, tournament with a grand average of 25. Although

previously beaten at that game by Slosson, Schaefer defeated Slosson on January 22, 1892, for the world's championship at the 16-inch balkline game, 800 to 592. Schaefer never contended for the 18.2 championship until the New York tournament in 1909, when he ended third, or next behind Sutton, with Hoppe fourth. One of the most famous games Schaefer ever played was his discount game against McCleary, in which he finished the 3,000 points in a single run, the largest run ever made in a three-ball match.

Schaefer's health, never strong, completely broke down in 1909, and he was compelled to retire and seek the bracing climate of Colorado, where he died yesterday.

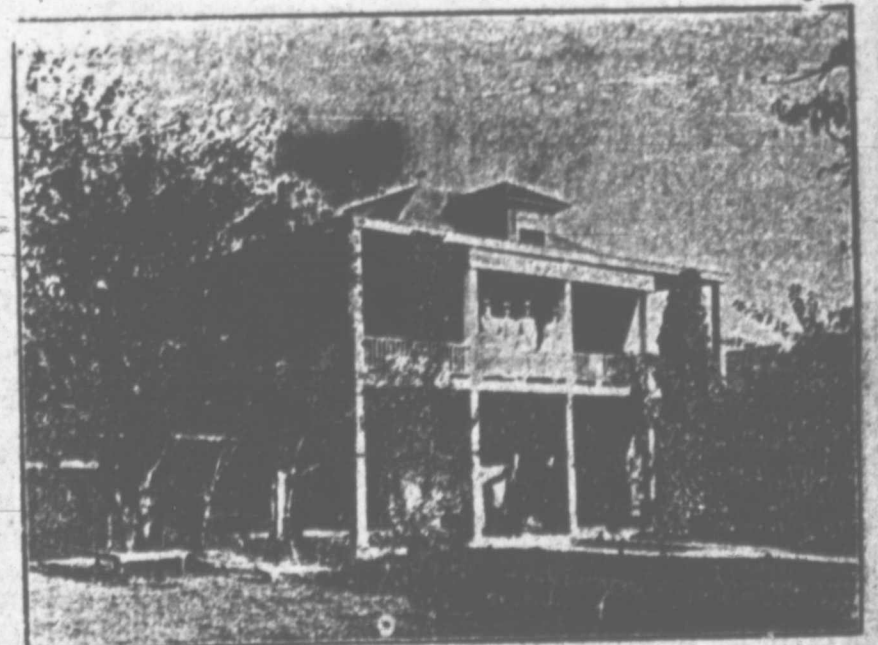

## Women Who Carried Anti-Liquor War Into the Halls of Congress



Legislation aimed at keeping liquor advertisements out of the mails, prohibiting liquor salesmen from entering "dry states and strengthening the provisions of the laws relating to interstate traffic in liquor is the object of the visit to Washington of Mrs. Lillian M. N. Stevens and Miss Anna A. Gordon, president and honorary secretary, respectively, of the National Woman's Christian Temperance union. The anti-liquor fight in Washington of Mrs. Stevens and Miss Gordon is an outgrowth and part of a movement by the union in the states. The two anti-liquor advocates have already spoken in several large cities of this country and will go abroad in May to attend the triennial world's convention of the union to be held in Glasgow June 4-11. Mrs. Stevens is the successor of Miss Frances Willard as president of the union, becoming its acting president in 1898 after Miss Willard's death. Miss Gordon was Miss Willard's private secretary for twenty-one years.

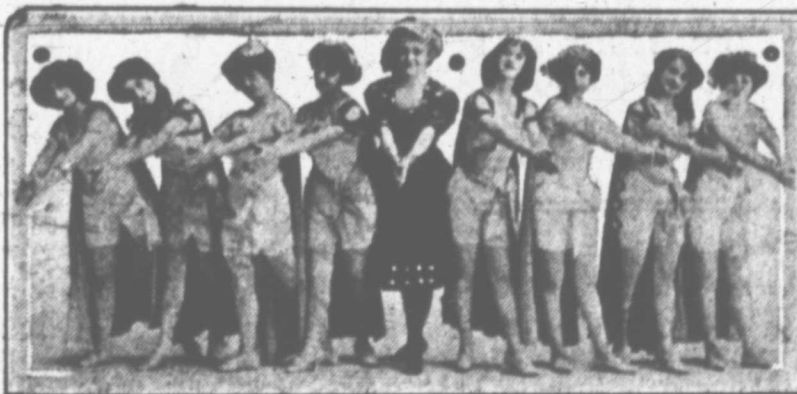

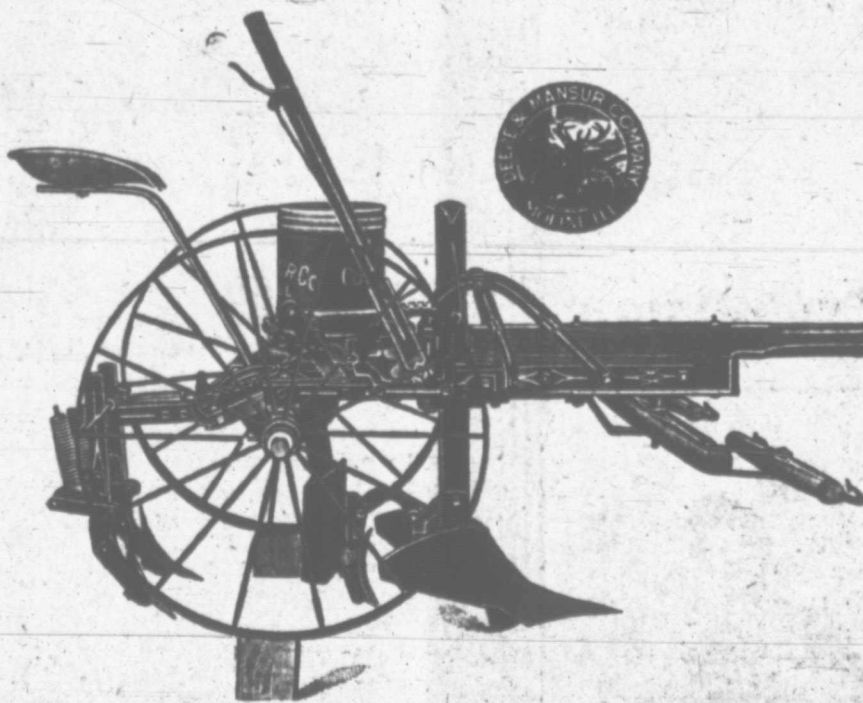
