





******** Advertising Texas in the North. The Chronicle is heartily in sympathy with any movement looking to the proper presentation of the resources and attractions of Texas to the people of the northern portion of the United States, but there is no doubt that there has been and can be advertising more harmful than helpful and if land men in Houston and vicinity and from other parts of Texas carry out the pending proposition to take a train of Texas "boosters" through the North they should give the movement a practical, instructive turn, or the time and money which will be spent will bring poor results.

The policy of advertising towns and cities and sections and even of states in magazines and newspapers has been widely adopted, and with good results beyond all question. Texas adopted the plan in 1882, and the number of inquiries which resulted was amazing. The then commissioner of insurance, statistics and history was authorized to use a part of the appropriation for his department in a number of papers in the United States and Europe, and soon there began to pour in inquiries from every civilized land on earth, and they continued to come until it looked as if there would never be a stop.

The proposition to advertise Texas by sending or taking a train of Texas land men trough the North, supplied with literature and other means of advertising, is a good one but-the Chronicle believes there is danger of doing harm unless much care is taken and good judgment is exercised.

If the movement is wisely conducted it can be made of much good. Disclaim ing any intention to advise or prescribe plans for the expedition, the Chronicle, influenced by a sincere desire to see the purpose successfully executed takes the liberty to suggest that all the lietrature used should be carefully edited, and that all statistics should be verified by official records or supported by affidavit. 
