

Wealthy Man in Mexico Does Honor to

Douglas, Ariz.-Pisa has her Campo Santo, where rest in marble arcades the notables of the past; Genoa has her garden of marbles, where exquisitely carved angels weep over the heroes of Piedmont-but Glenwood Springs, across the border in New Mexico, has the only cemetery for burros in all the world.

This odd little burial ground is presided over by George Krauss, who is said to be the son of a Pittsburg brewer, and who combines with his duties as sexton of the burros' burial ground the day watch at the village powerhouse.

Every person who has lived in the Southwest knows that the burro is with the prospector the forerunner of civilization on the desert and semi-arid mesas of Arizona, Nevada and Southern California. The burro eats cactus, even the kind that the wizard Burbank has not deprived of its dangerous whiskers; he risks the fangs of the ratler and the bite of the hydrophobia skunk. He is to the silent pilgrims of the arid gulches what the mottled Arab steed is to the Bedouin of the plains of Africa; he is the camel of the bold hunter, the Pullman car of the silver seeker. Occasionally a Western Tennyson sings his praises in an ode with broken feet, but a dead burro has never been a holy thing, except at Glenwood Springs. Here his

The Insurance Law.

It seems, from the report of Senator Claude Hudspeth of El Paso, that Governor Campbell is almost persuaded to call a special session of the legislature to repeal the present insurance proper position on the head. law. The practical operation of the law, especially in the greatly increased and one-sided power it allows the insurance companies, has surprised the News, as well as Governor Campbell and several others, and, lest the favorable opinion formerly expressed should be misleading, the News must avail itself of the privilege of modifying the view it has heretofore expressed. Apparently the law was designed that women should come to church to harmonize risks, but not to raise rates: that is, to classify risks so that greater risk should bear a higher rate of insurance. In other words, it was assumed that the chief intent of the law was to adjust rates more on the peculiar merit of each particular risk peculiar merit of each particular risk ular among women of various nations, than was formerly done, and if it had and with its disappearance among the accomplished this in a fair and just manner there would have been little fault to find. To that extent it was in the line of economy and equality. But the way it has been applied in numerous cases which have come to the knowledge of the News, wherein rates have been largely increased and even rendered prohibitive, and the injustice thereby inflicted, make it evident that something is radically wrong, either manner of its application, or, in both. OWEN FOR DIRECT ELECTION.

Says Corruption in Legislative Bodies

Could Be Prevented.

Washington, June 1.—"It will be better for this country," said Senator Owen of Oklahoma, "when members of Congress and state legislators and municipal legislators are chosen by the direct vote of the people and when the people have the right of recall by the nomination of a successor to their public servants. The people will never abuse their power."

The senator was speaking in the Senate in favor of a resolution intro-duced by him, in accordance with the wishes of the legislature of the state of Oklahoma, providing for the submisison of a constitutional amendment for the election of senators by direct

vote of the people. Such an amendament he said, would prevent the corruption of legislatures would prevent the improper use of money in the campaigns by men ambitious to obtain a seat in the Senate, and would compel candidates for the Senate to be subjected to the severe scrutiny of a campaign before people shoulders of every indian for the lift-ing up of our Bharata Mata to the fitted men. Further, he said, it would popularize government and tend to inrease the confidence of the people in the Senate, "which has been to some txtent impaired in recent years." It would also prevent deadlocks, he con tinued, due to political contests in which various states from time to time

had been left unrepresented.

If the beverages themselves do no change from season to season, then their names and titles must respond to the whims of Dame Fashion. Once upon a time a cherry sundae was a Merry Widow. Now it is Chantecler. The chocolate nut sundae was called Sagi Harins for a while, then Alice Roosevelt, and now the Jungle—the compliment having been shifted from daughter to parent.

Whenever a play makes a big hit or a man does a big thing the soda clerks are among the first to make use of the event. They made up a Wright Brothers frappe and a North pole sundae. They invented a Taft soda and a Peter Pan phosphate. They can't afford to lose an opportunity or to let any other shop or business get ahead of them. So they spend what spare moments they have in inventing new things and new names for old things.—New York
