For nearly an hour last night Prof. Martin with his fireworks entertained an audience of over a thousand people. **Silver Jubilee of Oregon College.**  
Corvallis, Ore., June 10.—A week of celebration began here today at the Oregon Agricultural College in honor of the completion of the first quarter-century of its existence as a separate institution. Preparations for the celebration have been going forward for several months and an attractive program for the event has been arranged. Dramatic performances and social functions are scheduled for the first two days. Sunday morning the baccalaureate sermon will be preached by the Rev. F. W. Clappett of San Francisco. Monday and Tuesday will be the big days of the celebration. President Kerr will preside at the jubilee exercises and the principal address will be delivered by W. F. Herin, chief counsel of the Southern Pacific railroad, who graduated from the college in 1873. Tuesday afternoon the graduating exercises will be held, when President James M. Hamilton of Montana Agricultural College will be the chief speaker.

The Oregon Agricultural College is among the most progressive institutions of its kind in the United States. It is one of the numerous "land grant colleges," founded under the authority of the Morrill act of congress in 1862 and the Hatch act of 1887. As there were no state colleges in Oregon in 1862, the legislature gave the interest upon the educational fund to Corvallis College, a private institution in Benton county, which was then under the control of the M. E. Church, South. None of the land was sold for a number of years, and the legislature made small annual appropriations for the support of the school. In 1885 the church voluntarily relinquished its claim and the state assumed control. Two years later the cornerstone was laid for the first of the college buildings, now known as the Administration Building. From this humble beginning the college has grown until it now has eighteen buildings and campus and grounds covering 224 acres.

**Oklahoma Capital Election.**  
Oklahoma City, Okla., June 10.—One of the most exciting campaigns in the history of Oklahoma closed today. Tomorrow a special election will be held throughout the state to decide the question of a permanent location for the state capitol.

The congressional enabling act admitting Oklahoma to statehood provided that the seat of government should not be changed from Guthrie before 1913, and after that year shall be located by a vote of the people. Oklahoma City, which desires to become the state capital, decided to take Time by the forelock and secured the passage through the legislature of a measure providing for an immediate election to decide the proposed change in 1913. Its claims to the seat of government are based upon advantages of location, easy access by railroad from all parts of the state and the further fact that it is the metropolis of Oklahoma.

The election bill names Guthrie, Shawnee and Oklahoma City as candidates for the capital, but it is generally conceded that the real contest is between Oklahoma City and Guthrie. The claims of the former are bitterly contested by Guthrie and the threat is made that if Oklahoma City secures a majority vote at the polls tomorrow the matter will be taken to the Supreme Court for final decision.

In addition to the question of the location of the state capital tomorrow's referendum election will also decide the proposal to repeal that section of the state's constitution which prohibits foreign railroad corporations from acquiring the property of domestic corporation, or those organized under the laws of Oklahoma.

 Denver, Colo., June 10.—From all sections of the United States delegates and visitors are in attendance upon the fourteenth annual convention of the National Congress of Mothers, which began here today and will continue for five days.  
 The program embraces a discussion

of numerous topics dealing with the physical, mental and moral welfare of the child by a number of well known men and women of America. Rural and city homes, the art of home-making, saving the babies, helping the erring boys and girls, mothers' responsibility in the prevention of infant mortality, social life in high schools and

universities, a sane Fourth of July and home education are some of the problems that will be given attention.

### COMET FACTOR IN CHINESE RIOT.

Natives Took It as Sign for Loss of Empire.

Among the reasons which Prof. C. H. Robertson in his lecture last night at the Young Men's Christian Association advanced as the cause of the recent race riots in China were Halley's comet, famine, the rates for rice, the oppression of the people by the officials, the labor disturbances caused by the English consul.

"The Chinese," he continued, look upon the comet as the sign of the partition of their empire among the foreign powers. There has been considerable antiforeign agitation, anyway, and when the comet came forth into the sky this was looked upon as a sure sign that foreigners were to gain the upper hand."

Prof. Robertson spent seven years in China, coming back to this country just a year ago. He is one of the best authorities on Chinese political questions. He speaks again at the Young Men's Christian Association Sunday at 4 o'clock on "Reform Movements in Japan."

"I think one reason why the comet had so much effect on the people of the world is that it appeared in the sky in May. You will notice that all of the strikes and all great agitations usually take place in this month. People move the first of May. At that time of the year there is a stirring movement in the body which tends to make unsettled conditions among the people."

"Among the good influences in the Chinese empire I would name the fine educational work of the American missionaries, who have done more in this line than the missionaries of all the other countries put together; the Young Men's Christian Association and the attitude of the American government toward the Chinese."

"For bad," he should say the patent medicine dealers, the tobacco dealers, the American and Japanese brewers, the gamblers and the fake lawyers are vying for honors.

"China is undergoing one of the most wonderful reform movements that the world has ever known. There is taking place an absolute revolution in politics. A ten years' program is being carried out to make the government constitutional."

"Along educational lines schools are being built and the number of students is increasing at the rate of 150,000 a year. Along religious lines, temples are being turned into schools, idols are being buried or put in warehouses, and it is beginning to be realized that Confucius is insufficient for the needs of the Chinese people."

"In the midst of these changes it is no wonder that riots should occur."  
 Prof. Robertson, in 1902, became secretary of the international committee of the Young Men's Association, and was located in Hankow, China. His special responsibility was among the officials of the empire.—Denver Post.

ing picture shows, or at least some of them, have entered into close competition with the worst kind of dime novels so far as their pernicious influence is concerned. That these complaints are by no means groundless has been shown in many instances. The other day a boy of ten years, who for two years has been an enthusiastic patron of the moving picture shows, was arrested for burglary in the Bronx. The boy climbed the fire escape of an apartment building, entered one of the apartments through an open window and stole some money and jewelry, which he found on a dressing table. "I saw a man in one of the moving pictures rob a house just like that," the boy said, when asked how he came to enter and rob the apartment, "and it looked so easy I thought I would try the same thing."

If it's in a man, it is bound to break out sooner or later. A young man, dressed in black, carrying a Bible and a bundle of religious poems, took his stand on Fifth Avenue and Twenty-ninth street the other evening and soon attracted quite a large crowd by his eccentric actions. Whenever an automobile approached the crossing the young man would rush out into the roadway, wildly waving his Bible and yelling to the automobilists about the sin of motoring and his purpose of saving the innocent children from "uggernauts." Several times the young fanatic came near being run down by automobiles, the chauffeurs of which paid no attention to the harangue. Finally the young man was arrested and sent to Bellevue for observation of his mental condition. He said he was leading a campaign against motoring, for the sake of the children.

An interesting ceremony took place in Plymouth Church, Brooklyn Heights, the other night. The four flag and a banner presented in the same church by Henry Ward Beecher on the third Sunday in May, 1861, to "Beecher's regiment," before it went to the front, were returned to the church. Less than two dozen of those who went to the front that day sat in the pews on that occasion. The Beecher regiment, the first Long Island regiment to go to the war, was organized under the auspices of the church, and while the recruiting was in progress the volunteers slept in the lecture room of the church. It was known as the Sixty-seventh New York Volunteers and did distinguished service during the war.

New York is to have a municipal opera company, whatever that may be. The solo singers are to be fifty young men and women who are employed in the city's department stores. The chorus will consist of 100 other young department store employees, who earn from \$6 to \$15 a week and who consequently cannot afford to have their voices trained. The organizer of the company is a German music teacher, connected with a prominent boarding school for girls in this city, and he

is backed by one of the singers of the Metropolitan opera company. A trial of applicants for solo positions in the municipal company was held the other day and about forty young men and women presented themselves. The organizer of the company was astonished at the remarkably excellent quality of many of the voices and expressed himself confident that there would be no difficulty in filling all solo positions with excellent material. The company will offer "La Boheme," "Pagliacci" and "Michael Angelo" in the first two weeks of next January, and will then make a tour of two weeks, returning to New York for another season of two weeks.

An elderly man who only a few days ago had been a member of the school board of Newark, N. J., is in the New York city hospital with a broken spine and other serious injuries, with no hope of recovery. He was found in this condition in an alley near the Market street station of the Pennsylvania railroad and was unconscious at the time. He was revived, but either could not or would not tell how he had been injured. There seems to be some mystery about the man and his career. Although supposedly a man of means, he had been living in cheap lodging houses recently. No one seems to know anything about the circumstances of the man, and he refuses to give any information about himself and his movements immediately preceding the injury. The police authorities are interested in the cases and believe that the injured man knows in what way he sustained his injuries, but refuses to make a statement, so as not to give any clue to the authorities.

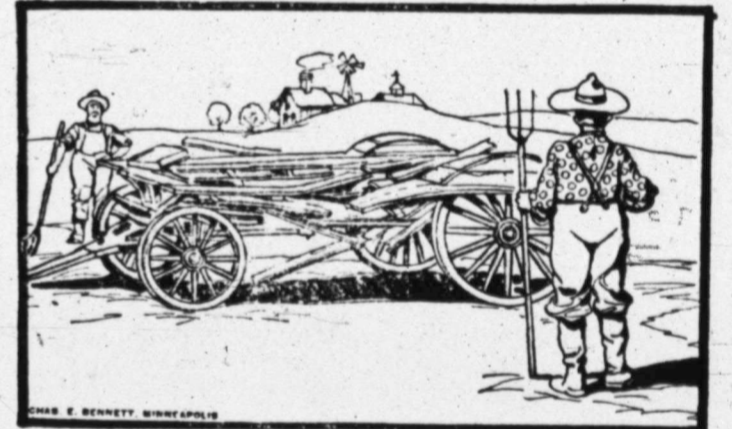

Bailey's Letter—New Play By Shakespeare II.

This time it is the "chances" of Colquitt instead of "Desdemona," and the cause of the tragedy is not a "handkerchief," but the "letter" that was written by Bailey.

There is, however some difference between the Moor of Venice and the personnel of the present play. In Venice there was only one Othello, but in Texas we have on the political stage as many heroes as there are pretended zealous friends, while Shakespeare's imagination could only give us one in the Moor of Venice. Besides this, Othello killed Desdemona because he loved her, while the "chances" above compared have been butchered by a like mistake, but without love.

Of course, the play will not be perfect until Iago is known. But when he is known, Shakespeare's Michael Cassio will be miraculously reproduced in the person of O. B. Colquitt.

"Poor Tom is a cold" in "King Lear" brings both admiration and pity into the heart at the same time; but poor dead Hamlet, as you said in your silent, sad contemplation, "frailty thy name is woman," so must we say here in this agitated political atmosphere of Texas, "Foolishness, thy name is politics without brains."

Pan-Presbyterian Council.

Dublin, June 10.—Presbyterians from all over the world have arrived in Dublin to attend the Pan-Presbyterian Council, the sessions of which were formally opened today and will continue through the greater part of the coming week. The council is not a legislative body, but it nevertheless exerts a wide influence on the affairs of the denomination throughout the world. Church and religious questions covering a wide range, are slated for discussion at the present general council.

The delegates and visitors in attendance number nearly five hundred and include many eminent Presbyterian divines, educators and writers. Among the countries represented are the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, France, Austria-Hungary, Germany, Russia, Italy, Greece, England, Ireland, Scotland, Spain, Switzerland, China, Japan, Ceylon and South Africa. Among the American delegates present at the opening was Mrs. Clark, wife of Representative Champ Clark of Missouri.

"Nighties" from "Sleeper" Trunks.

New York, June 10.—Society women, modistes and milliners jostled one another at the custom house today in frantic efforts to secure choice bargains at Uncle Sam's auction sale of the contents of a number of trunks confiscated by the inspectors many months ago. The trunks were the last of the lot seized on the discovery that an alleged syndicate was bringing goods in duty free by means of "sleeper" trunks. The articles placed on sale included a number of valuable Paris-made gowns, exquisite night robes, embroidery, waists and other articles of women's wear. Good prices were realized on a lot of forty-nine princess gowns, each of which bore the tag of a fashionable French modiste.

Tuxedo's Annual Horse Show.

Tuxedo, N. Y., June 10.—With an entry list that eclipses all previous records, the annual exhibition of the Tuxedo Horse Show Association opened today and will continue over tomorrow. The opening was attended by all of the members of the fashionable Tuxedo colony and numerous guests from New York City, Newark, Philadelphia and other places.

In addition to the usual classes for heavy harness horses, saddle horses and road races are to be given on the half-mile track which is owned by the association.

The chief interest in the show this year, as in the past, centers in the classes of horses used for pleasure—the carriage teams, park rigs, saddle horses and hunters and jumpers.

Harvard Clubs Meet.

Cleveland, O., June 10.—Cleveland is painted red today, not as is usually understood by the expression, but because the Associated Harvard Clubs of America are holding their annual meeting here. Boastful of the prowess of their college and attesting this spirit with cheers and class yells, and by leaving a trail of crimson flags in the center of the city, hundreds of graduates of Harvard have flocked here from all over the country for the two days' reunion and meeting of the associated clubs. President Lowell and a score of prominent educators and public men are in attendance and will be speakers at the annual banquet tomorrow night.

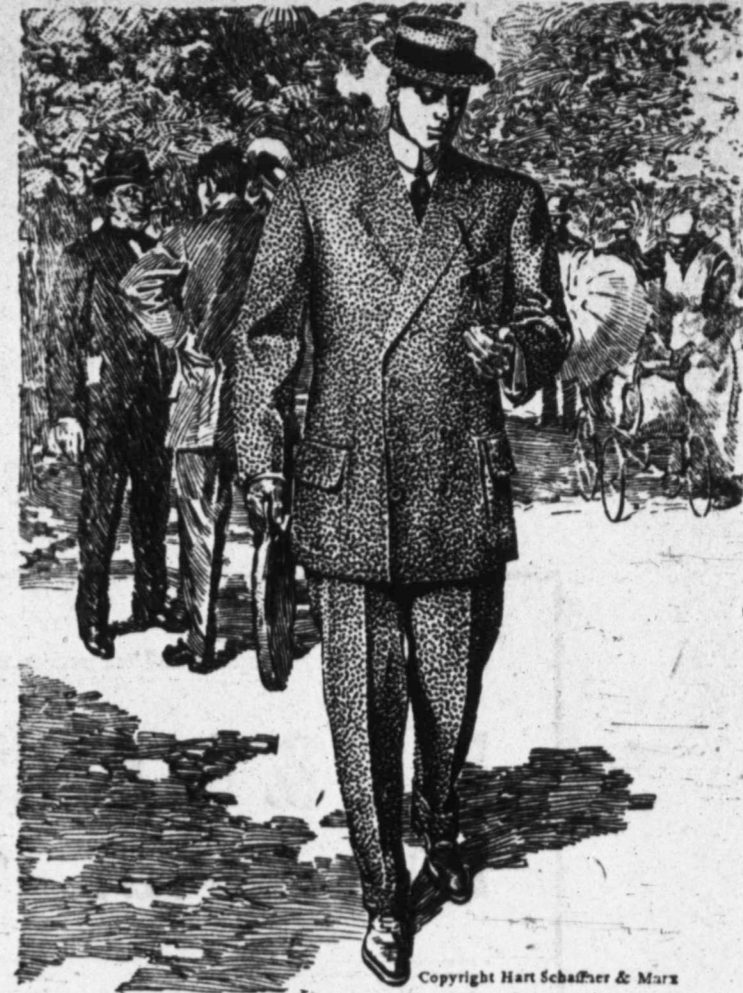
