By Associated Press. El Paso, Tex., June 10.—Shortly before midnight last night the eastbound passenger train of the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad was held up near East Robart, N. M., by a lone bandit, who hearded the occupants of the tourist sleeper into the private car of Superintendent Hawks, attached to the rear of the train, compelled them to deposit their money and valuables in a heap and made his escape with his plunder across the desert toward the mountains. Rough estimates place the value of the haul at several thousand dollars. Hastily organized posses are in pursuit of the robber.

NEW SCHOOL PLANS ARE TAKING FORM----RECENT BOND ISSUE APPROVED

The school board is perfecting its plans for the construction of the newschool building in the western part of the city and hopes to be able to begin work at an early date. It has been decided to arect a 2-story, eight room structure of brick or stone, on this site. The estimated cost of the proposed building will be about eighteen thousand dollars.

It has also been decided to erect two new buildings, as originally planned. The location of the other school has not been determined and action will probably not be taken until the money is in hand. Part of the proceeds of the bond issue will be used for putting down walks around the schools and making other improvements. Neither of the new schools will be ready for occupancy when the fall term opens. but the congested conditions that have prevailed during the past session will be obviated by the use of the new high school building. DEAL FOR PACKING PLANT NOW DEFINITELY CLOSED

Cost Will Be Much Larger Than Was at First Planned-Work Will Be Started on August 15th.

The deal for the packing house here has been closed. It's capital stock will be one million dollars, instead of \$350,000 as originally planned. It will have a capacity of one thousand head of cattle and twenty-five hundred hogs per day.

Work will start not later than August 15, and the plant will be completed within eight months thereafter.

TRESTLES BURNED ON NORTHWESTERN

TWO ARE DESTROYED BY FIRE DURING NIGHT IN BECKHAM COUNTY OKLAHOMA.

Damage is Seing Repaired by Construction Gang as Rapidly as Possible.

The Wichita Falls and Northwestern suffered the loss of two trestle bridges in Beckham county, Oklahoma last night, by fire, a total of ten bents being destroyed by the flames. The loss is estimated at about fiften hundred dollars. The damage will be repaired in time for this afternoon's northbound train to go through and the passengers on this morning's

Several empty oil cans were found

in the ruins of each trestle. The loss was discovered this morn ing in time to prevent any trains attempting to cross the places mentioned and there was no damage further than the destruction of the bridges. Laborers were put to work immediately and will probably have the damage entirely repaired by late this afternoon. The passengers on the southbound were transferred across the breaks and arrived here only shortly behind time.

The two trestles were on each side of a small community called Carter. There is no station at this point, the nearest being at Kempton. The citizens of Carter appealed to the corporations commission of Oklahoma to compel the Northwestern to establish a depot there, and similar action was brought by two other towns in that section. All the cases were decided favorably to the Northwestern. Carter is a religious colony, having been established by a certain sect, and practically its entire population consists of members of this sect.

While the finding of the oil cans at the scene of both fires leaves little, doubt as to the cause of the burning trators. It is understood, however, that the Northwestern will scave no stone unturned in invesigating the af-

Silver Jubilee of Oregon College. Corvallis, Ore., June 10 .- A week of celebration began here today at the Oregon Agricultural College in honor of the completion of the first quartercentury of its existence as a separate institution. Preparations for the celebration have been going forward for several months and an attractive program for the event has been arranged. Dramatic performances and social functions are scheduled for the first two days. Sunday morning the baccalaureate sermon will be preached by the Rev. F. W. Clampett of San Francisco. Monday and Tuesday will be the big days of the celebration. President Kerr will preside at the jubilee exercises and the principal address will be delivered by W. F. Herrin, chief counsel of the Southern Pacific railroad, who graduated from the college in 1873. Tuesday afternoon the graduating exercises will be held, when President James M. Hamilton of Montana Agricultural College will be the chief speaker.

The Oregon Agricultural College is among the most progressive institutions of its kind in the United States. It is one of the numerous "land grant colleges," founded under the authority of the Morrill act of congress in 1862 and the Hatch act of 1887. As there were no state colleges in Oregon in 1868, the legislature gave the interest upon the educational fund to Corvallis College, a private institution in Benton county, which was then under the control of the M. E. Church. South. None of the land was sold for a number of years, and the legislature made small annual appropriations for the support of the school: In 1885 the church voluntarily relinquished its claim and the state assumed control. Two years later the cornerstone was laid for the first of the college buildings, now known as the Administration Building. From this humble beginning the college has grown until it now has eighteen buildings and campus and grounds covering 224 acres.





Besides this, Othello killed Desdemonia because he loved her, while the "chances' 'above compared have been butchered by a like mistake, but without love.

Of course, the play will not be perfect until lago is known. But when he is known, Shakespeare's Michael Cassio will be miraculously reproduced in the person of O. B. Colquitt.

"Poor Tom is a cold" in "King Lear" brings both admiration and pity into the heart at the same time; but poor dead Hamlet, as you said in your silent, sad contemplation, "frailty' thy name is woman," so must we say here in this agitated political atmosphere of Texas, "Foolishness, thy name is politics without brains."

Pan-Presbyterian Council.

Dublin, June 10.—Presbyterians from all over the world have arrived in Dublin to attend the Pan-Presbyterian Council, the sessions of which were formally opened today and will continue through the greater part of the coming week. The council is not a legislative body, but it nevertheless exerts a wide influence on the affairs of the denomination throughout the world. Church and religious questions covering a wide range, are slated for discussion at the present general council.

The delegates and visitors in attendance number nearly five hundred and include many eminent Presbyterian divines, educators and writers. Among the countries represented are the United States, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, France, Austria-Hungary, Germany, Russia, Italy, Greece, England, Ireland, Scotland, Spain, Switzerland, China, Japan, Ceylon and South Africa. Among the American delegates present at the opening was Mrs.. Clark, wife of Representative Champ Clark of Missouri.

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
