y Associated Press. Philadelphia, June 13.—Hamilton landed on Front street and Erie avenue in this city at 9:28 a.m. He reach ed the field circled about several times rose to about two hundred feet and then shot to the earth. A tre-

mendous crowd cheered him. The distance is eighty six miles, and was made-in one hundred and thirteen minutes, unofficial time. The feature of the wonderful achievement was the ease with which Hamilton picked up and followed the Pennsylvania Railroad train, traveling with almost lightning speed. He started on his return trip to New York at 11:30 a. m.

Thes defeat of the proposed railroad amendment to the Oklahoma constitution at the polls of that state Saturday, while it made the construction of the Devol-Lawton extension of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern less likely, did not necessarily knock out the building of that line. Had the amendment carried, the extension would have been ertain, as it would have made the financing of the road an easy matter. It's defeat makes it much more difficult to find purchasers for the bonds. but the officials of the Northwestern have not given up and will make every effort to build the extension in spite of the disadvantages under which they will be laboring.

J. A. Kemp, president of the Northwestern, leaves tomorrow for Chicago. He will return shortly in company with a number of bankers from that city who have invested locally and will endeavor to interest them in the proposi tion. If he can secure the support of these capitalists the line will be comstructed. While the defeat of the amendment was due to the opposition of the administration and the corporation commission, the big lines in Oklahoma are charged with having materially aided in bringing it about. Another amendment to this same section, having the same general effect as the one defeated Saturday, but modified in some respects, will probably be submitted to the voters of Oklahoma support of the administration, making





HOUSES WITHOUT CHIMNEYS.

Santa Claus of the Future Will Have His Troubles.

If Santa Claus is as enterprising as he is represented to be, he is very busy just about now developing a method of filling stockings without climbing down chimneys, because the electric light companies, electrical engineers, manufacturers of lectrical specialties and other designing persons with electric axes to grind, are doing their honest best to abolish the familar flues that have so long served the benevolent purposes of the good saint. The house without chimneys has already appeared and its attractions are so alluring that it is likely to be copied extensively

Where chimneys are there dust and grime and soot and ashes and smoke and coal dust and toil and trouble and soured tempers and appalling bills are also. Any householder would be glad to get, rid of these afflictions if he could retain the heat for the sake of which they are endured. That these and an almost endless hist of other comforts and conveniences can be had without the chimney or any of its accompaniments in any home in which ordinary electric lighting current is available has been abundantly demongan, at Kennedy's Jewelry Store, 609 strated. Indeed, the electrical experts have passed beyond the stage of showing that electric household appliances will work and are now busy making economy tests to establish their cheap-

A citizen of Schenectady, N. Y., without waiting for the importunities of designing salesmen, built a handsome esidence in which there was no chimney, furnace, register, radiator, base burner, gas fixture or/cook stove. By making inquiries of the coal dealer, the contractor and the local electric light company and then doing a few simple sums in arithmetic, he established the fact that electric heating, cooking and lighting appliances could be installed as cheaply as the usual steam heating outfit and coal or gas ranges with their necessary chimneys, and that the cost of operation would be as low, or at least that any small increase would be more than offset by enhanced comfort and convenience. When this model electric house was described to the New York Electric Society, the fact was developed that t was by no means the only one of its kind.

Other houses at Schenectady and elsewhere have been heated successfully by electricity, though some of them having been built before the dawn of the electric era may have left over chimneys, steam radiators and other relics of a less advanced age. In fact, tireless inventors have made electricity in the household as handy as the proverbial pocket in a shirt.

With an electric outfit housekeeping becomes a delight.-Technical World.
