\$25,000 MORE FOR **NEW POSTOFFICE**

WICHITA FALLS WILL GET PART OF ADDITIONAL MONEY ASKED FOR.

REPORT BILL FAVORABLY

This Makes Total of Seventy-Five ship. Thousand for Postoffice in This City.

Wichita Falls gets an additional appropriation of twenty-five thousand dollars for the government building in this city, according to word received here from Washington yesterday afternoon. This means that a total of sev- it is estimated that twenty thousand enty-five thousand dollars is available for the new postoffice in this city, which will make possible the erection of a handsome and substantial struct- fovorites.

dollars was secured several years ago for a government building in this city, but the money has never been used, as it was felt that the size and postal business of this city demanded a larger building. Congress was asked for an additional appropriation of seventyfive thousand dollars this year, which would have made a total of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. While Wichita Falls did not secure the full additional amount asked for, she secured enough more to make a handsome structure possible.

The appropriation has not yet been made, but has been formally reported by the committee on Public Buildings, which practically assures its passage. The site for the building here has already been purchased, being at the southwest corner of 9th street and Ohio Avenue.

Other Texas cities whose requests for additional appropriations were favorably acted upon include Austin, Belton, Bryan, Clarksville, Cuero, El Paso, Eagle Pass, Denison, Galveston, Marlin, Huntsville, Weatherford, Paris, Longview, Yoakum and others.

NEW CITY CHARTER.

May Be Brought Up at Coming Called Session of Legislature.

When the state legislature meets in special called session next July, as recently called by the governor, it is likely that the bill for a new charter for Wichita Falls will be presented, if Governor Campbell can be persuaded to incorporate it in his call. When a special session was proposed several months ago, this matter was brought to the governor's atention and he promised to act on it if he decided to call the legislators together. It is probable that the matter will be taken up at once locally and steps taken to secure the new charter without waiting until next year.

Honor Memory of Marquette.

Prairie du Chien, Wis., June 17 .-The memory of Pere Marquette, who visited this locality two hundred and thirty-seven years ago in exploring the upper Mississippi valley, was honored Highlands and excites little comment today by the unveiling of the base of a handsome monument to be erected to the famous misionary and explorer. The ceremonies took place in the grounds of St. Mary's Academy, where the memorial is to be erected on a commanding site overlooking the Misgreat French explorer stood when he discovered the Father of Waters.

The base of the menorial unveiled today cost \$1,200 and was paid for by popular subscription. It is seven feet square and ten feet in height. The column surrounding the base is of granite, a Greek Corinthian, eighteen feet in height. The statue will be a copy of the one by Trentanove which in the Statuary Hall of the national capitol at Washington. It represents Pere Marquette in the garb of a priest, and holding in his right hand a chart of the Lac des Illinois. The statue is to be a gift to the academy from the Order of Notre Dame.

The entire memorial will stand 40 feet in height. Its location is one of the historic spots of the Northwestthe site is of old Port Crawford, the first fortification erected on the upper Mississippi and around which cluster many associations of early frontier





EVIDENCE OF DEVELOPMENT.

David Wallace Was Defeated Politically for Advocating Advancement.

David Wallace, formerly of Indianapolis, Governor of Indiana from 1837 to 1840, and father of Gen. Lew Wallace, had two curious experiences. In 1840, at the end of the first term as governor, and at the height of his popplarity, he declined nomination for reelection (that was under the old Constitution) for fear of the odium attaching to his support of the internal improvement system; yet he lived to see Indiana rid-ironed with railroads.

Joseph A. Wright, a member of the egislature in 1837, and afterward governor of Indiana, minister to Prussia and United States senator, in a speech against internal improvements, said: 'Nothing is to me so chimerical as the idea of running 200 miles of railroad in Indiana. Of all things they are the most obnoxious, they were never intended for any other purpose than to connect large commercial cities like Liverpool and Manchester, or our Eastern cities. Your canals, and now especially your macadamized roads, will benefit the whole country; roads that the farmer can put his team on. haul 6000 pounds as easily as he can now haul 3000; roads that any citizen in the country can use.

The era of modern progress had not vet dawned. Governor Wallace's other he was beaten for re-election to Congress because he had voted for an appropriation to enable Prof Morse to build an experimental line of telegraph from Washington to Baltimore, yet he lived to see the country covered with network of telegraph wires and assisted in celebrating the laying of the first Atlantic cable. The incidents illustrate the rapid development of modern inventions, yet they are not unusual.-Indianapolis News.
