## PROPOSED CHARTER FOR CITY OF WICHITA FALLS

CITY ATTORNEY HOUSEHOLDER IS PREPARING A DRAFT TO BE SUBMITTED.

### IT IS ONLY SUGGESTIVE

The Document Will Be Submitted to the Present Session of the Texas Legislature.

City Attorney Householder is preparing a charter for this city, as heretofore outlined in The Times, which will be sub-mitted to the Thirty-second legislature. In view of the interest attached to such a change in the city government, and in order to acquaint the public with its provisions, the draft will be reproduced in The Times in sections and the first installment is presented herewith. Mr. Householder wishes it understood that this draft is only suggestive and is subject to such revision as may be desired, even to the exent that the charter when adopted may be entirely different from the draft now be ing prepared. President Alvord gave a short history of the development of the industry. He advocated the use of soils as a means of preserving excellent feed during the drouths of summer and fall. He advocated the sowing of winter wheat and oats for pasturage and said the results from dairy farming had shown an income of \$600 from butter and \$800 from hogs fed on skim milk with only eight or ten cows. In this instance the total feed bill had amounted to only \$500, showing a net profit of
