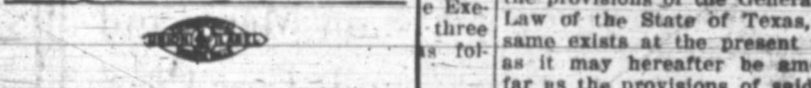

Mr. Sheehan is the caucus nominee of the Democratic members of the New York legislature for the United States senate, and if elected will succeed Senator Dewey, but after several ballots taken, it begins to look as if the Democratic caucus was going to be forced to make another nomination. The opposition is strong enough to defeat the wishes of the caucus, and unless another selection is made it begins to look as if New York will either elect another republican to succeed Dewey, or send him back for another six years. If the corporations want representation in the senate, they will find it a difficult task to improve on Senator Dewey.

With the calendar year ending December 31st, exports of wheat amounted to \$22,000,000, as against \$40,000,000 for the year 1909; corn \$24,000,000, as against \$24,250,000 in 1909; flour \$45,000,000, as against \$50,000,000 in 1909; meat and dairy products \$108,000,000, as against \$131,000,000 in 1909; cattle, hogs and sheep \$9,500,000 as against \$16,000,000; mineral oils, \$88,500,000 as against \$99,750,000 in 1909; cotton, \$520,000,000 as against \$481,000,000 in 1909. While cotton exports brought more for the year 1910, the quantity exported was less than for the year 1909, the higher price for which it was sold making the difference.

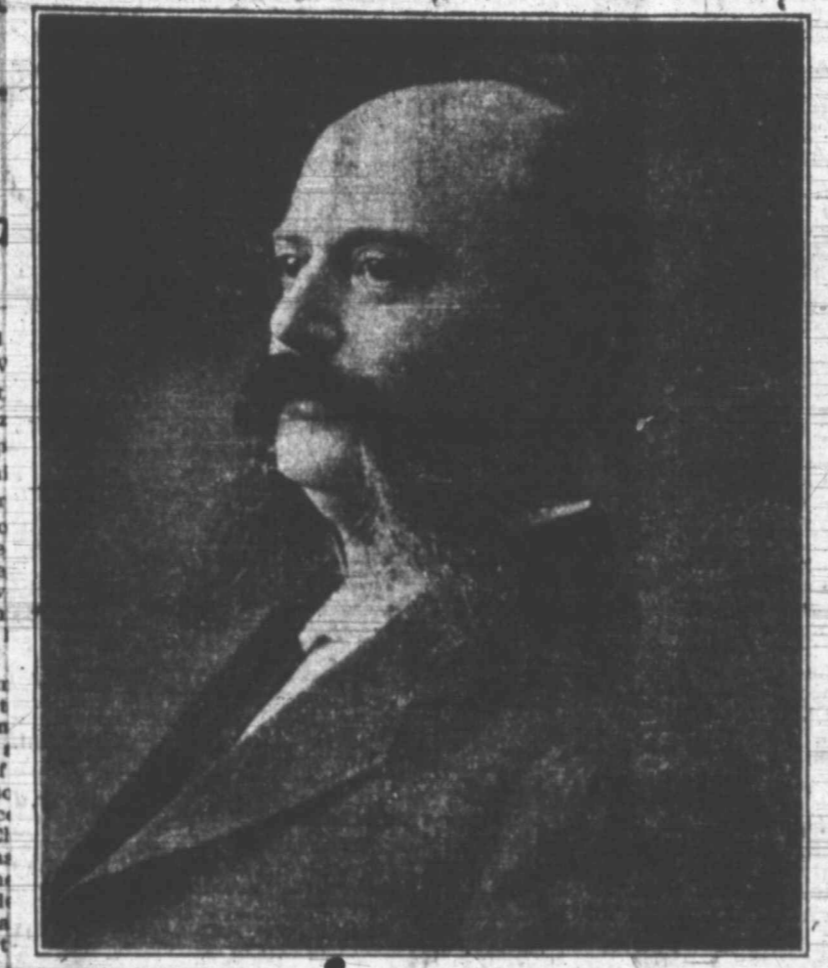

THE FIRST STATE BANK OF ELECTRA RECEIVES CHARTER AND BEGINS BUSINESS

The organization of the First State Bank of Electra, mention of which has been made in a previous issue of the Times, has been perfected and a charter received from the state, granting permission for the operation of the institution under the banking laws of Texas.

The institution, which succeeds the Waggoner Bank of that place, starts off under most favorable auspices and a noticeable increase in the amount of the deposits is already shown by the books of the institution. The officers who have been elected to direct its affairs are as follows: P. P. Langford, president; G. E. Nance, vice-president; E. A. Dale, cashier; T. M. Hoxie, assistant cashier. The directors are P. P. Langford and N. E. Martin of Wichita Falls, and E. A. Dale, E. R. Brewer, G. E. Nance and T. M. Hoxie of Electra.

The men who comprise the board of directors are among the best known citizens of the country, men in whom the public have the greatest confidence, both in their ability to handle the business of the institution and in their honesty, integrity and general good citizenship.

P. P. Langford, who occupies the position of president, is active vice president of the City National Bank of Wichita Falls, and one of the best known and most successful bankers in Texas. Mr. Langford has been in the banking business in Wichita Falls for a number of years, coming here when the population was scattering and the banking business necessarily limited. By his close application, he has not only kept the business in advance of the development of the country, but has also contributed much to the progress of Wichita Falls and the surrounding territory. So successful and satisfactory has been his banking career that he is recognized both as a pioneer in the business and as one of the best posted men on banking matters in this section of the state.



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COMMENTS OF THE TEXAS PRESS.

Decatur News: The extraordinary interest that has been manifested in fruit growing, scientific farming and boys' corn clubs by the farmers of Wise county and the business men of Decatur, has been a good thing for the whole county. The farmers and fruit growers and the boys' corn growers have all made money and are getting in shape to make more the coming season. The towns and country people have been brought closer together; have become better acquainted and a better feeling prevails all around.

Somerville Tribune: The Santa Fe has long been bothered about a sufficient water supply for engine and general use in connection with the round house at this place. A few weeks ago the drillers started on a deep well. Saturday at a depth of 116 feet a fine stream of water was brought in. A test was made Monday in engine No. 696 and so far has produced 666 2/3 gallons per hour. As soon as the test was pronounced satisfactory the local officials received a wire to sink another well at once 100 feet south of where this well is located. The local officials and water service men are growing over this test and feel as if the Santa Fe water problem at Somerville has been solved.

Arlington Journal: The message of Governor Campbell, as the Journal predicted it would be, was a warm document and did not afford the opportunity to slap the governor's face. The message contains some very wholesome recommendations which it is hoped the legislature will enact into law. But they are such as have been forced upon our executive not by his own initiative, nor his favoring them, but by the overwhelming demand of public opinion and need. The Journal will give its readers facts as they develop and shall keep them posted on the proceedings and the trend of matters. On the whole, the body is a splendid set of men.

Groesbeck Journal: It is very amusing to hear the criticisms of Governor-elect Colquitt, for his expressed determination to cut off useless expenditures in the State departments and give the people an economical administration, coming from those who have heretofore cried out in agony of spirit at the ruthless extravagance practiced by the legislature and the several institutions. Then it was levying unnecessary and unwarranted burdens and tribute upon the people, and said the taxes. Now he is trying to "cripple and impair the usefulness of the departments." It is to laugh, not at the inconsistency but at the "damp-hoollishness" of some folks.

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MORE COUNTIES NEEDED.

At Least They Are Wanted, For Measures Have Been Prepared Creating Them.

Austin, Tex., Jan. 20.—Owing to the rapid development of the state many sections have found the necessity of more counties imperative, according to the ideas of people located in areas where it is necessary to take three or four days to get to court.

Palfurria is the first county to be proposed. Evans is the second, while Erin is being discussed.

Evans, if created, would be taken from Edwards, Kerr, Bandera and Uvalde. The town of Laker is proposed as the county seat. It was once a county seat and the representative of the people who seeks the creation of the new county, H. E. Vogel, declares the necessity for a new county exists.

A strip twenty-three miles long and nine miles wide would be taken from Uvalde on the northern border, leaving two corners on each side of the strip, each containing a large town.

At present the people are forced to go about seventy-five miles to get to Stock Springs, nearly as far to get to Bandera, the county capital of Bandera, and fifty miles to Uvalde.

Commissioners to serve in these remote regions are hard to secure and there is much law-breaking, overlooking owing to the difficulty of taking prisoners, witnesses and others to the county seat.

Messrs. Hornby and Randolph, as representatives of the district affected, are awaiting the attitude of their constituents before taking action. Mr. Randolph went home owing to illness and nothing will be done until he returns.

The county of Erin will be created from the Epworth League grounds, the Alta Vista Hotel and Padre Island by Pat Dunne of Corpus Christi. The measure has not been prepared. Mr. Dunne while in Austin is an anti, but at home a pro, as the island of Padre is so narrow that an anti would not be able to navigate the length of its 200 miles, more or less, without falling in. Pat is a friend of the "peep" and asked that the Express not mention that he occupied a front room at the best hotel in town.

Barton is Elected.

Austin, Jan. 20.—After having been in session for nearly two hours today the board created and provided for by the penitentiary law recently enacted elected A. M. Barton to be auditor of the penitentiary system. The appointment is not effective, however, until the new law goes into effect, Jan. 26. Mr. Barton is well known throughout the state, having been for over three years of the administration of former Governor Campbell, his private secretary. From the private secretaryship, Mr. Barton was appointed financial agent of the penitentiaries, which position he now holds, but which he says he will relinquish upon the taking effect of the new law. Mr. Barton is well posted upon the penitentiary affairs of the state and understands its financial condition.

The position of auditor of the penitentiary system provides a salary of \$200 per month and expenses, that is actual traveling expenses and the auditor must make his home at Huntsville. Mr. Barton has made his home at Huntsville since he has been financial agent.

The members of the new penitentiary board, Messrs. Ben Cabell, L. M. Little and R. W. Brahan, were here today conferring with Governor Colquitt preparatory to taking charge of the system on next Friday. Governor Colquitt said he would not send up the names of these appointments for confirmation by the senate until the law becomes effective, therefore it is not expected that the senate will have a chance to act upon these appointments before that time. Under the new law, the old board is automatically dissolved, and in view of this situation, the new board wants to take charge as soon as possible.

There were quite a number of applicants for the position of auditor, among them being former Comptroller J. W. Stephens, Sam Carter of the treasury department; L. E. Tension of Bosque county; S. M. Branch of Huntsville; W. B. Townsend, secretary of state under the Campbell administration, who was an applicant, been appointed secretary of the Bankers Trust company of Fort Worth, a new corporation recently chartered. Mr. Townsend will accordingly make his home in Fort Worth.

The board to select an auditor for the penitentiary system is composed of the attorney general, state treasurer and comptroller. The meeting was held in the office of Comptroller Lane.

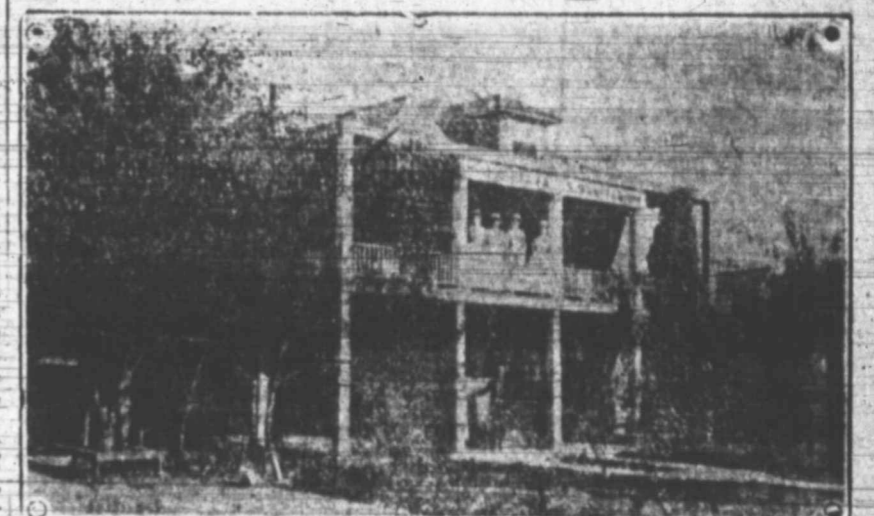
