# Dakotans study gasohol prospects here

A North Dakota corporation with \$420 million to spend is looking over this area as a possible location for one or more 50-million-gallon gasohol plants, Tommy Wheatley, member of a temporary area board, announced Monday.

Area farmers met at Sunny-side Tuesday night to sound out local reaction to the proposed plants. Another area meeting is scheduled for 8 p.m. tonight (Thursday) at the Muleshoe Civic Center, where the po-

tential farmer-owned ethanol plants will be discussed. Clayton Litchfield, president of Grains Products International, Inc., will participate in the discussion. A Panhandle-Plains plant, if built, would produce alcohol from

corn, milo or wheat for use in gasohol. According to Wheatley, the corporation has obtained funds to build ten 50-million-gallon plants. He said \$420 million, primarily from investment bankers, has been pled-

ged toward the gasohol plants. A temporary board, composed of Wheatley, Guy Austin of Oklahoma Lane, Gary Don Glover of Lazbuddie and Morris Killough of Muleshoe, is currently studying the proposed gasohol plants.

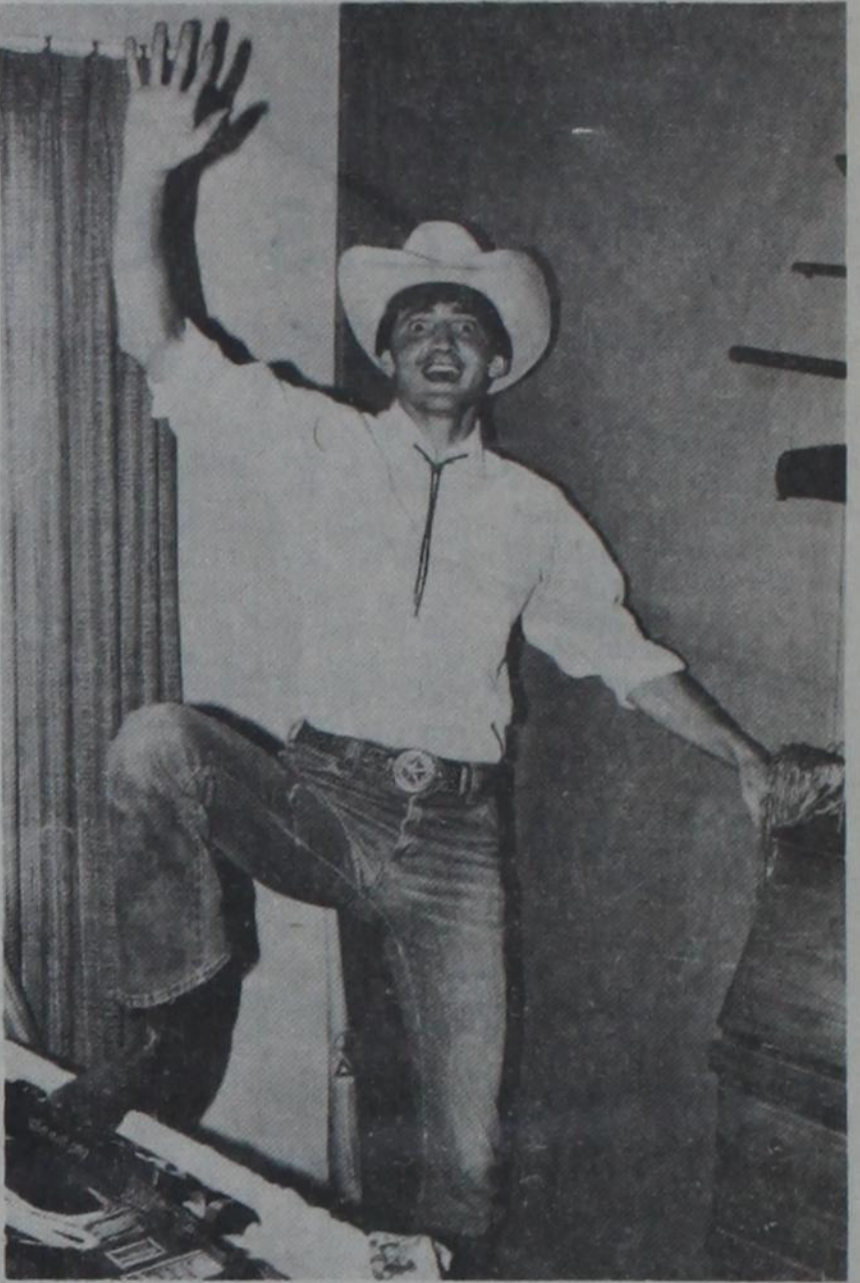
## Harvest good, prices great

Grain prices continued to climb this week as hopeful farmers started filling their hoppers with the first 1979 wheat. Wheat opened Wednesday at \$3.86 per bushel. That's \$1.02 higher than the same day last year, \$1.01 above the current loan rate, and 57 cents above the USDA's "reserve release level." Yields around the county so far are fair—20 bushels or better per acre on the first dryland wheat—and later yields are expected to be better. But it's the price that's the big news. A strong wheat market could help the county's beleaguered farmers meet their higher fuel and production costs on the crop and pay off the indebtedness many have incurred during recent low-market years. The wheat harvest sets the stage for a bigger crop harvest to come this fall. At planting time, wheat—the county's original crop—ranked third in planted acreage (80,644), behind corn (103,141) and cotton (83,194). But because of cool, wet weather, many farmers are replanting their cotton acreage with sunflowers and soybeans. This shift may move wheat into the No. 2 position among the county's crops this year. Marvin Jones of Nazareth kicked off the county's 1979 wheat harvest last Thursday when he delivered the first load of the year to Star Grain. His dryland Early Triumph wheat had an approximate yield of 14 bushels per acre, a test weight of 62 lbs., and moisture content of 12.3%. Lynn Ehly of Star Grain reported that the elevator had taken in half a million pounds of dryland wheat by Monday, and that "it's looking better all the time." Most elevator operators reported it will be another week before the irrigated wheat is dry enough to harvest. When the thrashing gets into full gear, the harvest will take only two weeks if the weather holds, most said. Bruegel & Sons, Inc., received its first load last Thursday, also. It came from Carl Bruegel. Also cutting a first load Thursday was W. L. Hansen of the Dodd community, who delivered it to the Dodd Elevator. Jerry Jones delivered the first load to the Flagg Grain Co. Friday, J. R. Brown reported. Castro County Grain Co. also received its first load Friday. It came from Gerald Graham of Sunnyside. Dimmitt Agri Industries, Inc., got its first wheat Friday when Houston Lust delivered a load to the co-op's South Elevator. Donald Runyon delivered the first load to the co-op's South Elevator in Dimmitt Monday, and he also carried a load to the co-op's Flagg leg the same day. Receiving their first 1979 wheat Monday were Prairie Grain at Hart, Sunnyside Grain & Supply (from J. C. Holbrooks, Webb Farms and Lonnie Wilson), Easter Grain (from S. L. Garrison), and W&C Grain (from Willis Farms). The harvest kicked off Tuesday for Farmers Grain Co. at Hart, where Ricky Mitchell brought in a load from the W. T. King farm.

## Jerseys worth \$1,690 stolen at high school

Approximately 174 football jerseys valued at \$1,690 were stolen in two separate thefts during the past week from the Dimmitt High School field house, Coach Wayne Garner reported. The first theft, totaling \$1,140, occurred June 13 or 14. According to police reports, entry was gained through an unlocked door into the weight room. The room is left open during the summer for athletes to lift weights and is usually locked by 9 p.m., Coach Garner said. Police first thought entry to the storage area of the field house was made with a knife or sharp object, used to push the door bolt back. Following the second burglary, however, Coach Garner said apparently someone had a key to the equipment room because the door had been re-opened during the weekend. The school does not carry insurance on the jerseys. Police are investigating the thefts.

## 'Hart Days' plans enter final stage

The 1979 Hart Days, set for July 18-21, promise to be four fun-filled days for young and old alike, and will feature an assortment of activities including a parade, carnival and queen's contest. Plans for the celebration are entering the final stage. The Hart Days Committee met Monday night to hear reports from organizations about their planned activities, and to discuss carnival plans. Advance tickets for the carnival will go on sale July 2, priced at 10 for \$4. Tickets will remain on sale through July 9 at a savings of \$1 per 10 tickets, if purchased early. Tickets may be purchased at the Farmers State Bank from Jonalyn Jones, or at the city hall from Virginia Reed. This year's carnival will be bigger than last year's with five adult rides and four kiddie rides, and will run all four days of the celebration. 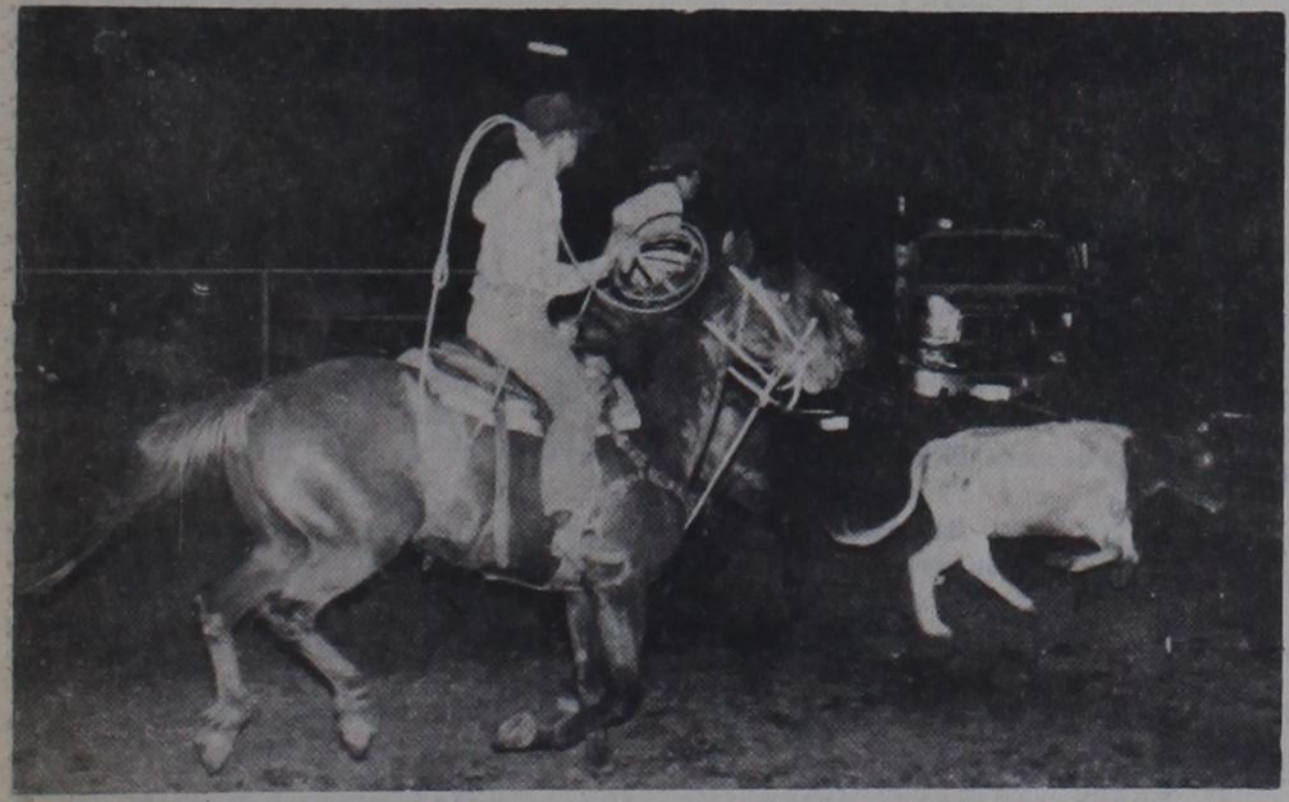
## City in 'good shape' auditor's report says

The city of Dimmitt is "financially sound" and "in good shape," according to an auditor's report read Monday night at the regular session of the city commission. Harold Irlbeck of Brown, Graham & Co. told commissioners the city has assets totaling \$2,009,274.56. Revenue from the past fiscal year totaled \$713,274.86, while expenditures ran \$680,573.86, leaving the city \$32,701 in the black. "We're in good shape," City Manager Garnett Holland said after the audit report. "We're financially sound if we don't cut axes." Commissioners also gave final approval to the 1979-80 city budget following a third reading. Projected revenue for the city in the coming fiscal year is \$1,428,107, while the expected disbursements total \$1,312,512. In other action, the city joined the county and school district in approving a personal property tax on automobiles. In a letter urging the commission to pass the tax law, City Tax Assessor-Collector Andrea George warned commissioners that the city would lose approximately \$35,000 in revenue if autos were exempted from taxation. Mayor Elmer Youts and Holland said they doubted that the figures would be that high if autos were exempt, but voted with the commission to pass the tax. Commissioners Monday also approved firemen's requests for a Cascade System for the fire department. Fireman Rex Cowert explained that the system refills air-park bottles which allow firemen to breathe while fighting fires with noxious flames. Commissioners voted to pay

**AN ORDINANCE RESTRICTING PARKING ORDINANCE NO. 365**  
**AN ORDINANCE RESTRICTING PARKING IN CERTAIN AREAS ABUTTING U.S. HIGHWAY 385 AND TEXAS STATE HIGHWAY 86 THROUGH THE CITY OF DIMMITT, TEXAS; ESTABLISHING A PENALTY FOR NON-COMPLIANCE WITH THIS ORDINANCE; AND PROVIDING A PROCEDURE FOR THE EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF:**

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, after having called a special emergency meeting on this the 6th day of June, 1979, after due posting of such meeting; and,

WHEREAS, the City Commission in said meeting having been informed by the State Highway Department that striping of U.S. Highway 385 and Texas State Highway 86 must be stopped until such highways have certain areas designated as a no-parking area; and,

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, deems the passage, promulgation, and enforcement of the provisions hereinafter contained necessary for the protection of the public safety and general welfare of the community and of all its citizens in the City of Dimmitt, Texas;  
**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas:

The Dimmitt Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the following provision:  
**SECTION I - DELINEATING PROHIBITED AREAS**

A. It shall be unlawful for any person operating a motor vehicle or owning one to allow said motor vehicle to be parked or left unattended without taking the necessary precautions for an emergency stop on the street known as U. S. Highway 385 from the northern boundary line for Etter Street continuing northward to the north city limits of the City of Dimmitt, Texas.

B. It shall be unlawful for any person operating a motor vehicle or owning one to allow said motor vehicle to be parked or left unattended without taking the necessary precautions for an emergency stop on Texas State Highway 86, also known as Bedford Street, in that area bounded on the east by the west boundary line of Northwest Fourth Street and on the west by the western line for Northwest Tenth Street as extended across West Bedford, also known as Texas State Highway 86.

C. It shall be unlawful for any person operating a motor vehicle or owning one to allow said motor vehicle to be parked or left unattended without taking the necessary precautions for an emergency stop for that portion of Texas State Highway within an area beginning with the east boundary line of East Third Street on Bedford Street east and extending to the eastern city limits of the City of Dimmitt, Texas.

IT BEING UNDERSTOOD that the above areas designated as no-parking areas are those areas adjacent to or continuous with the marking of North Broadway, also known as U. S. Highway 385, and Bedford Street, also known as Texas State Highway 86, said marking being commonly known as a continuous left hand turn lane.

**SECTION II - PENALTY**  
 Any person violating this ordinance shall be cited to appear

before the Corporation Court of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, to show cause why they should not be found in violation of the provisions of this ordinance. Any person found in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to a penalty by payment of a fine to said Corporation Court of not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$200.00 upon a finding of guilty of such violation.

**SECTION III - EFFECTIVE DATE**

The City Clerk of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, is hereby directed to have the descriptive caption as well as the penalty clause of this ordinance published in the local newspaper for two (2) consecutive weeks informing the general public of its nature and penalty. This ordinance is to be effective from and after its date of passage with the penalty for enforcement to be effective as of the date of the second publication as required by law.

**SECTION IV - SAVINGS CLAUSE**

The invalidity of any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, word or words, shall not invalidate any other part of this ordinance. It is the intent of the City Commission in enacting this ordinance that the provisions are separable and that no provision hereof shall become inoperative or fail by reason of the invalidity of any other provision.

AND, WHEREAS, an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of health, safety and general welfare of the public, that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, all rules to the contrary requiring three or several readings of this ordinance are hereby waived, and this ordinance shall become effective as of the date of its publication as hereinabove set out and as required by law.

**PASSED AND APPROVED** in special emergency session of the City Commission of the City of Dimmitt, Texas, at 5:00 p.m. on June 6, 1979.

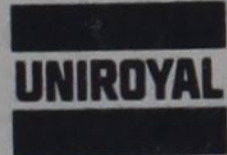

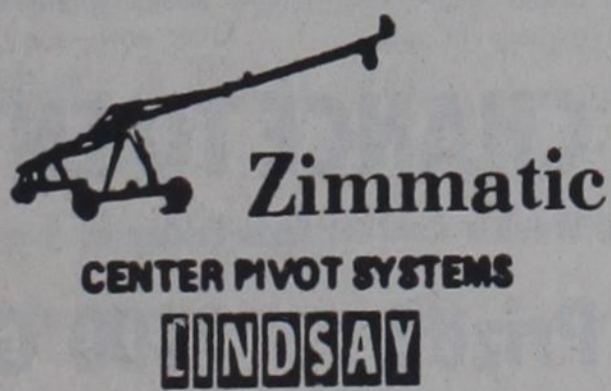

**ASCS notes**  
**Deadline date earlier**

July 15 is the final certification date. This date is 15 days earlier than prior years. If you have the crops planted and the required set aside, you should come in and certify the acreage to avoid the last minute rush. Accuracy is a must. Don't be careless and lose all program benefits.

1979 wheat disaster—Any acreage of wheat for grain that will not be harvested for grain due to a disaster must be appraised prior to making other use of the land. Acreage destroyed in any manner prior to appraisal will be assigned production and this could make the farm ineligible for payment.

Applications for low yield must be filed within 15 days after harvest.

Set-aside acres cannot be grazed from May 1 through October 31, 1979. Weeds, wind and soil erosion must be controlled. If planted to sudan, cane or etc., it cannot be baled or cut for hay at any time. Wheat cover on set-aside must be clipped prior to reaching the dough stage. Failure to comply with these requirements could cause you to be ineligible for benefits.

Fuel—Any producer who is having difficulty obtaining fuel for agricultural uses may obtain assistance from their local ASCS office. We have the necessary forms and will assist you in certifying to your needs.

Final planting dates—The final planting dates in Castro County for 1979 are: Cotton — June 1; grain sorghum — June 20; soybeans — July 1, corn — May 31. These dates mean you must plant or replant until the date specified. You may replant later if you want to.

CCC Loans—Commodity Credit Corporation loans for 1979 will bear an interest rate of 9% increase is reflected in the cost of money CCC borrows from the U. S. Department of the Treasury.

Social Security—to save valuable time and effort, before you go to apply for any type of benefits, call your local Social Security office by dialing the operator and asking for Enterprise 8-4132, and ask for a list of specific proofs that you should bring in to establish your entitlement.

You will always need your social security number and often your birth certificate and most recent tax return. Janice B. Ulmer, Social Security Representative, 1401-B, West 5th St., Plainview, will be glad to tell you what proofs you need and how to obtain them.

ELIGIBILITY for participating in all programs administered by the ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, creed, national origin, or sex.

**View from the Library**

"Hanta Yo" by Ruth Beebe Hill.

Hanta who?

I am always interested in American Indian books. Often I like to see how bad they are. The very worst ones are the ones which are translated from an Indian language to English. Something is always lost in the translation.

"Hanta Yo" is a "tour de force", says the jacket. I suppose that if one took thirty years to write a book it might be considered one. Yet just because it is a tour de force, doesn't make it a good book. Ruth Beebe Hill wrote the book with a full-blood Indian, a Santee Sioux, who wanted to help preserve the fading Lakotah language. That was her first mistake.

As far as I'm concerned you get what you deserve when you fool around with full-blood Indians. The second mistake she made was to let the fool Indian translate the English into Lakota and back into Lakota again to make sure it was "culturally correct." Although the text may be culturally correct the whole eight hundred page book is a bore.

As nice a reading diversion, it is a flop. As an expression of Indian communication and culture, the work is a glowing classic. It will be among those books like Scott Momaday's "House of Dawn" which reaches the very depths of American Indian experience and fully articulates it so that transcends all Indian stereotypes.

I might warn the reader, therefore, that should he be ambitious and read with an open mind, the work involved getting into the book and enjoying it might be worth the trouble, but remember, the reason Indians are in such bad shape now is because Americans never fully understood them and could never fully realize the richness with which they expressed their views.

Somehow it just came out sounding fake—and so does "Hanta Yo" until the reader leaves his own world and drifts into the Indian world. I found myself gradually getting into the Indian conscience as I read the book. It wasn't easy though. The paragraphs were short, the description bleak and stark. As usual, with Indians, there was very little involvement personally with the characters. And, again, as usual with Indians, the richness of ex-

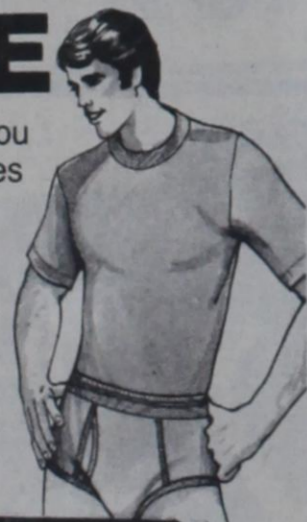

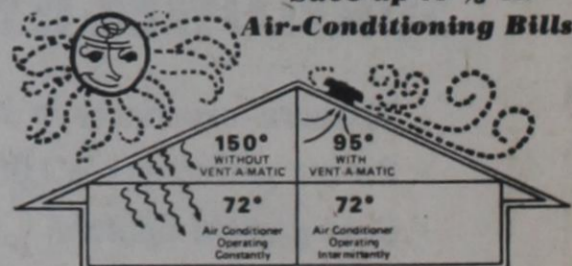

**Weight shows in summer**

By TERESA L. CRISWELL  
With the warm summer days, many of us are more conscious of how we look in our summery clothes and therefore are more weight conscious. A change in eating habits may be the answer to a more becoming figure and also alleviate some potential health problems.

A person 20% over his desired weight is obese, which makes up 15-40% of all adults. Obesity can contribute to high blood pressure, stroke, heart disease, kidney disease, gall stones, cirrhosis of the liver, and diabetes. Weight gain can also lead to feet and skeleton difficulties, shortness of breath after exercise, and increased surgical risks.

Many become overweight by a gradual gain over a long period of time. Eating habits are formed when you're young and the decrease in energy and calorie intake remaining the same, results in weight gain. Boredom causes people to overeat. Taking an interest in activities, gardening, career or hobbies can prevent boredom.

Obesity in the U.S. is thought to be a result of cultural change caused by economic influences. Labor saving devices result in less energy expenditure. Consider the energy saved when using a riding lawn mower versus a push type.

Before starting your reducing plan, visit your doctor to decide how much weight you need to lose. The recommended amount of weight to lose each week should not be more than two pounds.

The lowest calorie consumption to get enough minerals and vitamins is 1200 calories per day.

It takes 3500 extra calories to produce a pound of fat. For each pound of fat gained or lost, there must be either 3500 calories more or less in the diet than the body uses. If a person wants to lose two pounds a week, he should eat 7000 calories less each week or 1000 calories less each day to lose two pounds.

Crash or fad diets may be harmful to your health. Crash diets limit so many of the nutrients. It is also hard to keep off the weight lost because there hasn't been a change in food habits.

A balanced diet will allow for a large variety of foods and maintain a balance between all nutrients (proteins, fats, carbohydrates, vitamins, and minerals). The sensible diet plan will be lacking only in calories.

Select low calorie foods from the four food groups. For the milk group, select low calorie fluid or dry skim milk, buttermilk and cheese. You save 60 calories by drinking skim milk rather than whole. Milk and milk products supply you with calcium, protein, vitamin A, riboflavin and other nutrients.

Adults need two or more servings of milk daily, teenagers, four or more, children two or more.

Select two servings of 2-3 ounces of meat daily. This includes beef, veal, pork, lamb, poultry, fish and eggs. One cup of dried beans, dry peas, and nuts may be substitutes for meat. However, a serving of dry beans, dry peas, nuts or peanut butter is higher in calories than a serving of lean meat. Two ounces of lean meat provide 150 calories, one cup of cooked beans provide 220 calories and four tablespoons of peanut butter supplies 380 calories.

Meat and meat substitutes provide protein, iron, thiamin, riboflavin and niacin.

The fruit and vegetable group provides vitamin C and A. Eat one serving of a fruit containing vitamin C and one vegetable for vitamin A every other day. One-half cup of vegetables equals one serving. One-half cup of fruit is a serving; one medium apple, one small banana, one medium orange and one-half

grapefruit are considered a serving.

Protein, iron, B vitamins and carbohydrates are found in the bread and cereal group. Select four servings daily of bread, dry cereal, cooked cereal, rice, grits, noodles or spaghetti. A serving in the bread group is one slice of bread or one-half cup of cereal, rice, grits, and noodles.

I would like to share with a 4-H prize winning recipe.

**LEMON CHICKEN WITH BROCCOLI**  
2 1/2 lbs. chicken breasts  
1 T. grated lemon peel  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
2 cloves garlic, crushed  
1 t. dried thyme leaves  
1 t. salt  
1/2 t. black pepper  
2 pkgs. (10 oz.) frozen broccoli spears  
2 T. margarine  
2 T. all purpose flour  
1 cup skimmed milk  
1 egg yolk, beaten  
Juice of 1/2 lemon rind  
1/2 cup hot water  
1 chicken bouillon cube

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Bone, skin, and wash chicken; dry well on paper towels. Arrange chicken pieces in single layer in shallow roasting pan, skin side up.

In small bowl, combine lemon peel, lemon juice, garlic, thyme, salt and pepper. Spoon over chicken, bake, uncovered and basting every 20 minutes, for 60 minutes, or just until chicken is brown and tender.

Meanwhile, cook broccoli as package directs; drain well. Arrange chicken and broccoli on warm serving plate. Melt margarine in a small sauce pan. Add flour and stir until smooth.

Dissolve bouillon cube in hot water and mix with the skimmed milk. Add liquid mixture gradually to flour mixture. Stir constantly over low heat until smooth and thick. Season to taste. Add egg yolk, lemon juice and lemon rind gradually to sauce.

Boil 1 minute, stirring constantly. Drizzle lemon sauce over broccoli and chicken. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese. Garnish with lemon wedges. Serves 6.

It will let you determine how many kilowatt hours you use in a given period of time — an hour, a day, a month or a year. That's how electricity is measured — by kilowatt hours (kwh) used.

Your residential electric meter will have either 4 or 5 dials

Electric meters are easily read from right to left as you look at the meter. If the pointer on a dial is between two numbers, write down the smaller number. When the pointer is directly on a number such as one (1) (see center dial above) then read it as 1 if the pointer on the next dial immediately to the right has passed zero (0). However, read it as zero (0) if the pointer on that dial to the right has not reached zero.

The dials above read (from left to right) 9-3-1-1-5. If, however, the pointer on the second dial from the right above was between 9 and zero then the center dial would read as a zero.

Now let's read the same meter 24 hours later

The later reading is 9-3-1-3-8. Subtracting the first reading, 93115, from the new reading of 93138 — the answer is 23. Thus you would have used 23 kilowatt hours in the 24 hour period. Each kwh costs approximately five cents

When you learn to read your electric meter, you will be able to see where your energy dollars go — then learn to use energy wisely & save!

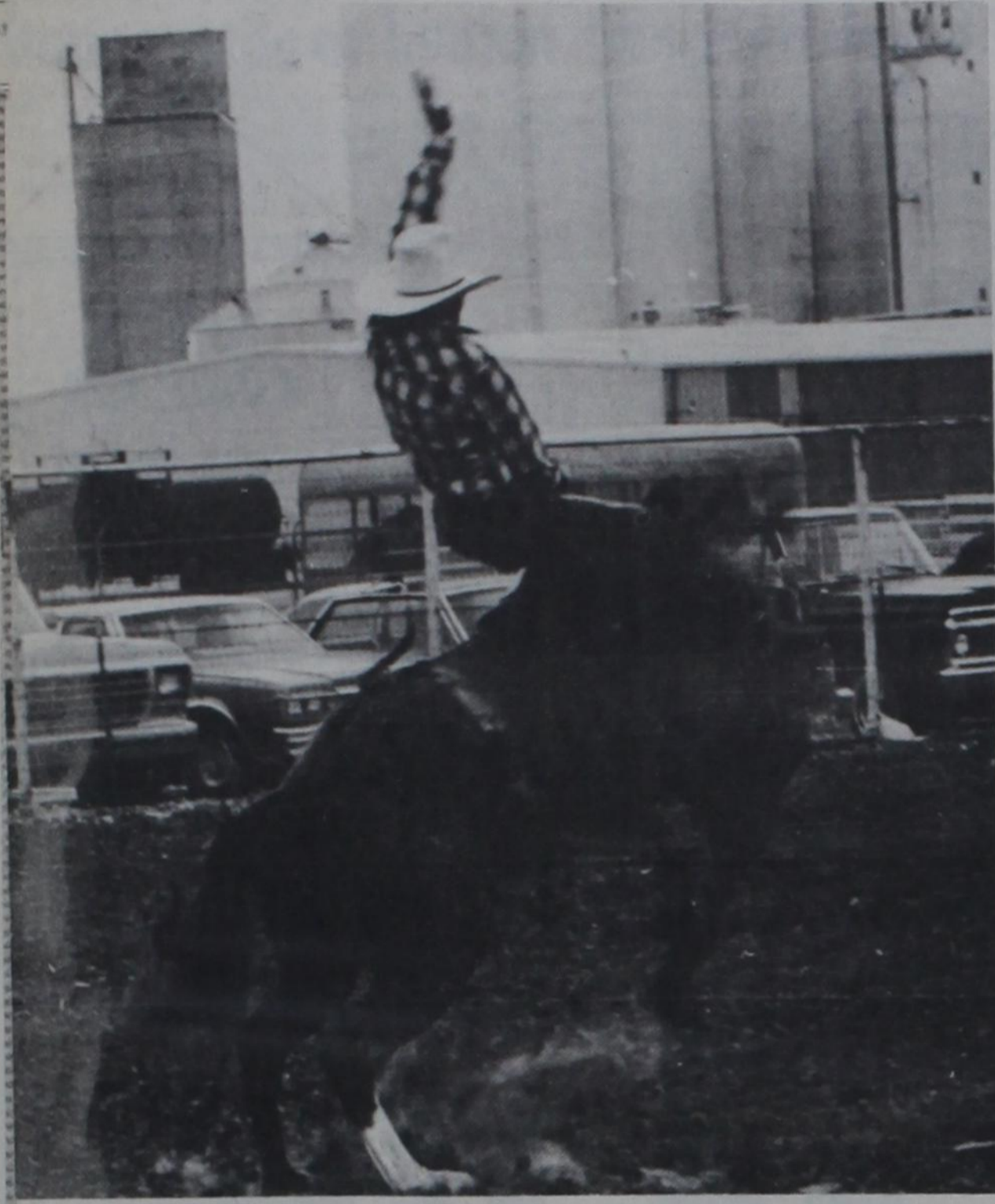

About his graduation in May from DHS, Armando said, "Graduation impressed me. We don't have it in Italy."

In addition to school-related activities, Armando tried several new things with his friends during the year.

He rappelled (mountain-climbed) with friends from the top of a Simpson Dairy silo, for want of any other "mountains" near Dimmitt.

Armando joined other AFS'ers from the area on a camping trip to Groom. During this outing Armando recalled, "I rode a horse... I got kicked by the horse!"

"America has a lot more opportunities than Italy," Armando observed. "School is easier here than in Italy, but you still can learn a lot," he added.

A Dallas Cowboys fan, Armando is taking lots of souvenirs back to Italy. He also received a "cowboy outfit" of boots, belt, hat, bolo tie, spurs and a Texas belt buckle.

Armando said he is also taking to Italy "the Texas accent... I'm pretty sure I picked one up."

### County sales tax rebates down \$5670.13 from 1978

Castro County received \$18,248.38 in rebates from the one-percent optional city sales tax during the first six months of 1979, according to State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

This figure is down \$5,670.13 from the total county rebates received during the same period in 1978.

Dimmitt received \$13,316.98 from the optional sales tax as compared to \$19,348.05 of last year's total.

Hart was rebated \$2,853.51 as compared to \$2,675.81 gained last year.

Nazareth was the only county town to gain in the sales tax refund, receiving

\$2,077.89 compared to \$1,539.25 received last year. According to Bullock, a total of \$218 million was rebated to Texas cities. This figure compares to \$196.4 million that cities received during the same six months during 1978.

Bullock said that June allocations for the more than 900 Texas cities will be \$67.7 million, compared to a 1978 statewide allocation of \$60.9 million for the month.

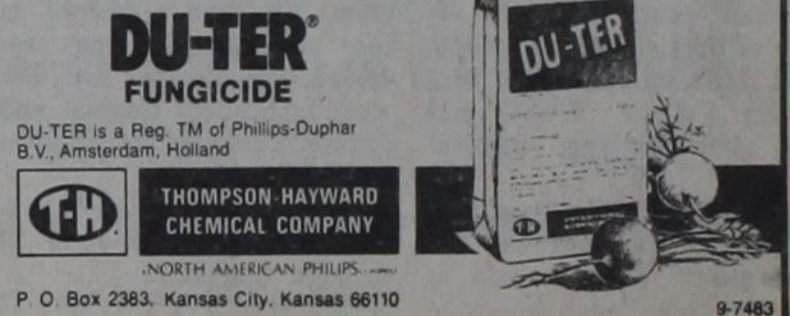
