



musele, accompanied by a spasmodic contraction of the little "flapper" or valve (the epiglottis) which guards the upper opening of the wind pipe. The diaphragm is a domeshaped muscle which forms the floor of the chest cavity and which descends rythmically about eighteen times a minute during normal breathing. Each descent of the diaphragm draws fresh air into the lungs and is a per-fectly normal process. When one fectly normal process. When one hiccougs however, the diapraghm jerks downward suddenly and air is drawn into the wind pipe so violently that the characteristic clucking sound results. Person seldom hic-cough during sleep.

This spasmodic affection of the reathing muscle may be brought on by any one of three general causes.
Distension of the abodmen from any cause, such as overeating may produce hiceoughing by a pressure upon the diaphragm. Likewise, a maliguant growth of abscess may press up, on the breathing muscle causing it to nodically. Again the swalowing of hot or irritating substances may bring on the trouble by direct stimulation of the diaphragm, but per-baps the most persistent singultus is the result of nervous disorders; thus much hiccoughing is purely hysterical and therefore; obstinate. Finally some writers speak of "idiophathic" cause. Everything must have a cause, however, and it is probable that such cases are really due to some hidden pressure or nervous condition.

Holding the breath while one counts
fifty is often sufficient to relive mild attacks, because when the breath is held the diaphragm also is held and forced to rest for a while. If the trouble is due to some trritating par-




