DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS ARE ELECTED AND ORGANIZATION PERFECTED TODAY.

150 STOCKHOLDERS HERE

Company Has Paid Up Capital of \$175,000 and Authorized Capitalization of \$600,000.

The organization of the Wichita Southern Life Insurance Company of Wichita Falls was perfected at a meeting of the stockholders held at the Wichita Theatre this afternoon. Represented at the meeting were about 150 of those who have invested their money in this enterprise.

This company, which gives promise of being one of the strongest in the state, starts off with a paid-up capital of \$175,000 and with an authorized capital of \$600,000. However, as one of the speakers expressed it this afternoon, this does not represent the entire assets of the company, which, when considered in connection with the men who have interested themselves in the enterprise, may be estimated at a million dollars.

The meeting convened at the opera house at 2 o'clock this afternoon and was presided over by E. P. Greenwood, who has been largely instrumental in organizing the institution.

Following the report of the committee on credentials, which was adopted, the by-laws of the organization were read by Secretary Griffin, and after a few minor changes were made, the draft was adopted by a unanimous vote.

While the committee on credentials was preparing its report, interesting talks were made by Mr. Callaway of the Southland Life Insurance Company, of Dallas, Mr. Wright, a prominent attorney of Dallas and by Jas. A. Stephenson, president of the Southland at Dallas.

Following the meeting of the stockholders, a meeting of the directors was held for the purpose of electing officers of the company and for the transaction of other business, which proceedings were had too late for publication this afternoon.

Tonight a banquet to the stockholders and other guests will be held at the Lakeside Hotel at Lake Wichita, which is expected to be a fitting conclusion to this important occasion in the history of Wichita Falls.

DOBSON AND MARCUS ACCEPT FRANCHISE

Dobson Leaves for Dallas to Meet New York Parties Interested in Project.

Dobson and Marcus this morning filed with the city secretary their acceptance of the terms of the franchise for an electric light and power plant, which franchise was granted at a recent meeting of the city council.

T. E. Dobson of the company left today for Dallas on business connected with the proposed enterprise, where it is understood he is to meet New York parties who are to become interested in the proposition in a financial way.

The gentlemen securing the franchise state that they will immediately place an order for the conduits for the business section of the city which will be laid immediately upon arrival and in the meantime orders will be placed for other material with which to construct the plant.

The firm of Keinenburg & Co., foreign immigration agents, have recently established headquarters in Houston, for the purpose of bringing farmers from Germany to Texas. This firm has purchased large tracts of land in Harris county which will be cut up into small farms and settled with substantial German farmers. A demonstration and experimental farm will be established in the settlement and the German farmers will be instructed in the most successful methods of farming in Texas.

Heretofore the immigration movement to Texas has been largely from the northern and eastern states, but foreign immigration is rapidly increasing and the movement of the south Texas firm in inducing German immigration is to be commended as the good citizens of every nation on earth in Texas, and Texas gives them a warm welcome.

The Neils Buck Company of Chicago has Just Purchased 10,000 Acres of Fruit Land in Bee County, Texas, which is to be cut up in small tracts and sold to settlers in the near future.

The purchasers are large contracting builders of Chicago, who employ several thousand people and the land is to be sold to the employees of the company only. One hundred families will arrive within the next few days and others will follow later on.

Texas has thousands of acres of land that is ready and waiting for desirable settlers from other states and the plan of the Chicago firm in providing homes for their employees is a compliment to the good judgment and foresight of the promoters of the idea.

PEACE IN 30 DAYS IS THE PREDICTION

FATHER OF INSURRECTO PRESIDENT SAYS OVERTURES HAVE ALREADY BEEN MADE.

PRES. DIAZ WILL RESIGN

Limanour Will Be Named as His Successor in Forecast.—Starvation in Northern Mexico.

By Associated Press. San Antonio, Texas, March 28.—Francisco I. Madero Sr. and Gustav Madero arrived here from New York this morning. Madero said peace in Mexico was assured within 30 days.

He said there already had been diplomatic exchanges and that the office of vice president occupied by Corral would probably be abolished. Diaz he believes will resign after a few weeks, Limanour succeeding.

He said he was not certain that Limanour would accept the presidential nomination but believed it certainly would be tendered him. The meeting place of the peace plenipotentiaries was undetermined, he said, but would probably be at San Antonio.

Seven War Zones Decried.

El Paso, Texas, March 28.—Francisco Madero, provisional president of the insurrectos have formally abandoned Guerrilla warfare and has established a regular army corps in order to gain foreign recognition of the hellegency. Madero has decreed seven war zones, the insurrectos in each zone constituting a corps. Pensions are promised for widows and children. Madero becomes "Supreme head of the insurgent army."

Thousands Are Striving.

By Associated Press. El Paso, Texas, March 28.—Thousands of non-combatants in Northern Mexico are struggling to get out of the country. Many are women and children without means of transportation. Seventeen families are trying to be admitted to the United States at this point. In the Big Bend section of Texas it is reported that aged men, women and children are starving.

Big Bend refugees were forced to leave their cattle and other means of subsistence behind when they crossed the border. Many of them are families whose younger men are said to be fighting for the insurrectos. From Juarez numerous families are moving to the American side because of the repeated rumors of impending insurrecto attack, but business in Juarez is still undisturbed. Refugees from the interior say they are tired of fighting to preserve their property at the risk of their lives.

Mail advices from Alamosa Sonora, confirm the report that the insurrectos have slaughtered every federal official in the town of Guaymas, Chihuahua, all were killed and shot. A young telegraph operator alone escaped. He fell beneath the dead crawling out twelve hours later and going bare-footed to Chiapas—forty miles away.

SUIT OF YEARY VS. SHERIFF RANDOLPH

Former Deputy Sues Sheriff for \$99.40 Alleged to Be Due Him.

The case of Charlie Yearly vs. R. L. Randolph is on trial in the Justice Court today. This is the case where in Mr. Yearly, who formerly acted as Deputy Sheriff is suing Sheriff Randolph for the sum of \$99.40 alleged to be due him, \$40 being for his services as deputy sheriff and the remaining \$59.40 for money advanced in handling a prisoner.

The case is being tried before a jury and the hearing of evidence was begun immediately after the dinner hour, a verdict being expected late this afternoon.

FAMINE IN EASTER LILIES THIS YEAR

By Associated Press. New York, March 28.—There is to be a famine in Easter lilies this year. The crop, according to wholesale florists here, is only about one third as large as last season. This applies to the production on American soil. The quantity of flowers that comes from Bermuda for the Easter trade is small compared to the quantity used.

The cause for the decrease in the crop in this region is said to be blight or vitality of the plants.

"We heard a good deal of the blight that fell upon the Bermuda lily a few years ago and it is precisely the same thing that is attacking the plants here," declared an officer of the wholesale florists' association. "Bulbs cannot grow in the same soil season after season without fertilization."

Steamship companies declare that comparatively few Easter lilies will be imported this year, probably not more than 10,000 in all. Last season the total sales by New York wholesalers reached 5,000,000 blossoms.

Rumored That President Diaz Is To Resign

By Associated Press. Mexico City, March 28.—The San Antonio report to the effect that President Diaz will resign is regarded as having some foundation but it will not occur until after the re-establishment of peace.

The secretary of the Boy's Corn Club at Kemp has notified Secretary Day of the Chamber of Commerce that six new names have been enrolled since Saturday and that it was expected that as many more new ones would come in before the time limit has expired.

Good reports have also been received from other clubs and the membership is not going to fall far short of two hundred in this county.

HAVE PLACE FOR SURPLUS DIRT

Some Would Have Dirt Excavated for Paving Use on Street to Floral Heights.

There is a movement on foot to induce the city council to use the surplus dirt that will have to be moved from the paving district, in grading one of the main streets leading through the residence section of the city. Several prominent business men have taken the matter up and will urge the importance of this work.

They contend that the surplus dirt and gravel, which must be deposited somewhere, cannot be used to a better advantage than in this way, it being pointed out that a large per cent of the travel goes out in the direction of Floral Heights and the Lake, to such an extent as to justify the placing of either Eighth, Ninth or Tenth street in first-class condition, thus connecting with the county road to the Lake. The Lake road is now being improved by the county and it is the desire of those who have interested themselves in this matter to have a connection between that thoroughfare and the city such as is justified by the travel that will develop as the importance of the Lake increases as a pleasure resort. Those who have discussed the matter with a Times reporter are not advocating the improvement of any particular street other than one of the three mentioned and are willing to leave it to the city authorities to select, just so a well improved street is provided.

While this matter was not taken up at the meeting of the Chamber of Commerce this morning, it was nevertheless discussed privately by a number of those present and it is likely that the matter will be brought to the attention of the city council by petition or otherwise at an early meeting.

YOUNG DETECTIVES FOIL BANK ROBBERS

YOUTHS WATCH SUSPICIOUS TRIO THEY SEE IN VACANT HOUSE; PREVENT ROBBERY.

ROBBERS ARE FIRED UPON

File on Handcar Which is Derailed by Obstruction and Two Men Are Captured.

By Associated Press. Corsicana, Tex., March 28.—Blair Cassel, "Rusty" Tickle and Mat Tickle, three young men, prevented the robbery of the Purdon State Bank last night. Seeing three suspicious men leaving a vacant house at 8 o'clock in the evening they watched the bank until 2 o'clock this morning from a hotel from where they had a full view of the bank. At 2 o'clock the suspected trio entered the bank by prying open a door.

As the young men peered across the dark street from the hotel—they saw the flare of matches lighting in succession in the bank as the robbers looked about. Then one robber came to the door gazing up and down the street to see if it was empty. The young detectives at that moment opened fire, bringing the other robbers from the bank on the run. The highwaymen sprang four hundred yards to a point where they had a handcar in waiting. The robbers seemed about sure of their escape when they plunged upon an obstruction placed upon the track by citizens of Corbett who had been notified by telephone.

Revolvers cracked on both sides, but the aim was uncertain in the darkness. Two of the men were captured while the third escaped.

The prisoners gave their names as John Blair of Shelby County, Texas, and McKennon of Caddo Parish, Louisiana. They say that the man who escaped compelled them to accompany him at the point of a revolver.

In the bank, near the safe, a pint bottle of nitro-glycerine was found. No weapons were found on the prisoners, and each had a half dollar.

The association extended its sympathy to those bereft of relatives in the Washington Square fire.

STRONG FIGHT AGAINST THE WOMAN SUFFRAGE

Former Suffrage Leader Now Opponent Will Address Illinois Legislators.

Springfield, Ill., March 28.—Opponents of woman suffrage have planned to make a vigorous attack on the senate bill giving the ballot to women when it comes up in the house today or tomorrow. Miss Phoebe Cousins of Washington, D. C., former leader in woman's suffrage ranks, but now a vigorous opponent, is in Springfield armed with a speech to be directed against the present legislative bill.

The word is out to start the fight with a rush, sweep the suffrage adherents off their feet by unexpected bursts of opposition wind up with an adverse roll call.

A combination of senators and representatives have secured women to oppose the suffrage bill, while they back apparently in a judicial frame of mind, awaiting the signal to kill the measure.

4 Year Old Child Has Suicide Mania

New York, March 28.—The King's County hospital in Brooklyn has an unusual patient today in youthful Ella-worth McDonald, who although only four years old is afflicted with a suicidal mania of pronounced type. The child is apparently normal in other respects.

Almost since birth, the parents say, the youngster has been obsessed with a constantly recurring desire to destroy his life. In his efforts to kill himself, the child has driven sharp knives into his body, attempted to toss himself into bonfires, swallowed poison, pounded his head on the stone pavement and even starved himself for days.

The lad has thrived in spite of his many suicidal pranks, but his mother is almost a nervous wreck because of the alarming experiences she has undergone.

The child's favorite time to attempt suicide is when his mother reproves him for a trivial offense. Without hesitation the child on such occasions has seized a knife and begun hacking away at his face. Several times he has been caught climbing into the kitchen stove and once only the intervention of an aunt kept him from leaping into a bonfire in the street. His eyes were badly bruised on one occasion in an attempt to gouge them out with a teaspoon.

A series of X-ray photographs of the lad's skull are being taken in an effort to ascertain whether any abnormal growth is responsible for his mental condition.

NEW YORK HORSE CARS ARE TO QUIT BUSINESS

Warning Issued by Slocum Survivors' Association to Prevent Bestowal of Undeserved Rewards.

New York, March 28.—Thirty-six lines of New York street cars, most of them short horse car routes of a past generation, will pass out of existence in a few days, the companies having taken steps to surrender the franchise and tear up the tracks. The action of the companies will mark the passing of all but three or four of the old horse car lines which still remain within the boundaries of the metropolis. The lines have been unprofitable for years and are now regarded as unnecessary.

English Shoemakers Coming to America.

New York, March 28.—English shoemakers have determined to compete for the American trade and six experts will visit American and Canadian cities during the next twelve months to demonstrate what they consider to be the superiority of British workmanship. A statement which has just reached this country from Edward Lewis, president of the British Boot and Shoe Manufacturers association, says:

"When American shoemakers invaded England they were received with open arms, their being then a better style of boots than the English make, but we have not only adopted but improved upon the American style.

"No doubt we have learned something from the Americans. We were asleep when they came but now we have turned the tables on the invaders and the Americans are using English leather in preference to their own. The average life of the English shoe is thirty per cent longer than that of the American article.

Grand Jury to Investigate Frauds.

Lockhart, March 28.—A searching investigation of the charges of fraud in the Caldwell County local option election was enjoined on the Grand Jury yesterday by Judge Jones of the District Court. A writ of injunction issued last week will be heard Wednesday. Judging from his charge the writ will stand and prevent a recount unless fraud is first shown.

COTTON MILL FUND REACHES \$195,250

SUBSCRIPTIONS NOW ONLY \$4,750 SHORT OF THE \$200,000 REQUIRED.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Directors Hold Regular Session This Morning—Several Important Matters Come Up.

A total of \$195,250 of the \$200,000 cotton mill stock to be placed by the citizenship of this city has been secured, leaving a balance of but \$4,750 to be raised. At the last meeting of the Chamber of Commerce prior to that of this morning the total was \$183,700 which amount was increased \$11,550 by the reports of the committeemen today. The additional subscriptions reported were as follows: Anderson & Patterson's list, \$2,500; C. W. Bean, \$3,000; Miles O'Reilly, \$2,900; J. C. Ward, \$600; Brown & Cranmer, \$100; Moore & Richolt, \$1,500; J. M. Bland, \$250; F. H. Day, \$700.

Of the amount subscribed, \$3,500 was by Mrs. Rebecca Petrot, which subscription was made in a letter from Morris Petrot, Jr., at Philadelphia to Anderson & Patterson.

Following the announcement of this progress in the work of raising the required amount the different committees were continued for the purpose of securing the balance by the time of the arrival of Mr. Carter, which will be within the next two weeks, as indicated in the telegram published in the Times of yesterday afternoon.

Other matters considered by the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their meeting this morning was a communication from the Corlath Engine and Boiler Works in reply to the notice of Secretary Day that negotiations had been called off. In the communication they stated that they had not abandoned the idea of moving their plant and asked for a few weeks additional time in which to further confer with the stockholders. It was the sense of the directors that any further negotiations with the company would have to be along new lines and that for the present the matter would be permitted to rest pending the negotiations for the cotton mill.

A communication was read from a company in Kirkland, Kan., that desired to establish a cigar factory at this place which would employ about twenty-five men. The matter was referred to the committee on factories after the meeting had voiced the sentiment that a hearty welcome be extended, but no bonus offered.

A letter was read from the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce announcing an excursion of about 125 business men of that city to visit this place on May 16, as heretofore published in the Times, which communication was referred to the entertainment committee.

Secretary Day made a report of the meeting of the Boys' Gown Clubs in this city Saturday, emphasizing the importance of the work and the value of the address of Col. Esail.

Some discussion was had with reference to the campaign of advertising but no action was taken further than an agreement of the advertising committee to hold a meeting within the next day or two, possibly tomorrow.

Wichita County can well be proud of the boys who form the Boys' Corn Clubs in this county. A brighter, cleaner and more interesting set of boys could hardly be gathered together than those who met here Saturday to organize the Wichita County Boys' Corn Club. Any visitor who attended any of the sessions of this meeting must have felt very proud of the farmer boys of Wichita County. They were as bright as new dollars and entered into the spirit of the meeting with an enthusiasm and an intelligent attention that was praiseworthy. With such citizens in the meeting as the members of the Boys' Corn Clubs, the future of Wichita County is in good hands.

Next Tuesday is the day for the election of three aldermen for Wichita Falls. According to the ruling of the Attorney General it is yet ample time for candidates to get into the race. There is no one better acquainted with the needs of the city than Judge Rye, and should he consent to become a candidate for one of the aldermanic positions the people of Wichita Falls could not do better than elect him.

If the newspaper accounts can be relied on, there is not the least doubt but the death of one hundred and forty-one people in New York on last Saturday night caused by the burning of a ten-story structure was due to negligence on the part of the city authorities in permitting such a death-trap to be erected. The owners, too, should not be held blameless. Doubtless it was the property of some old skin-dint who was too infernal stingy to equip it with proper fire escapes and if he has any money left, so much of it as is necessary should be taken away from him by law and given to those who are made to suffer by his neglect.

The election for school trustees for the independent school district of Wichita Falls occurs on next Saturday. The board as at present constituted is as follows: W. J. Bullock, T. J. Taylor, W. W. Brown, M. J. Gardner, J. L. Downing, L. C. Hinckley and W. E. Frieze. All the board, it is understood, have expressed a willingness to serve another term, if re-elected, and so far as is known there are no other candidates spoken of. The old board has served the people well, and so long as that is the case there is no necessity for making changes.

SPOKANE HAS GOOD

COMMISSION PLAN

Five Commissioners Were Chosen From 92 Candidates at a Special Election.

Spokane, Wash., March 29.—What is declared by experts to be the most advanced practical plan of municipal government by commission in America is now in operation in Spokane. Five commissioners, chosen from among 92 candidates at a special election on March 7, when women exercised the right of the ballot for the first time in the history of the city, were formally inducted into office on March 14, retiring Mayor Nelson S. Pratt and ten councilmen. The commission has been organized as follows:

Mayor and commissioner of public affairs, William J. Hindley, formerly pastor of Pilgrim Congregational church.

Vice chairman and commissioner of finance, Robert Fairley, formerly city comptroller.

Commissioner of public utilities, Charles M. Fassett, formerly president of the Spokane chamber of commerce.

Commissioner of public works, David C. Coates, printer, former lieutenant governor of Colorado.

Commissioner of public safety, Zora E. Hayden, retired lumber mill operator and capitalist.

The first three were elected for terms of five years, the last named for three. The salary is \$5,000 a year, the bond of each being fixed at \$25,000.

The commissioner of public affairs appoints and supervises the city engineer, corporation counsel and inspector of weights and measures; the commissioner of finance controls the books and offices of the city treasurer and auditor; the commissioner of public utilities has charge of the city waterworks and power plant, street railway, telephone and allied affairs; the commissioner of public works has supervision of streets, pavements and sewers, and the commissioner of public safety controls the police and firemen. The commissioners also look after all the ramifications of their various duties and may change and alter these by agreement.

Three civil service commissioners, to be appointed to serve without pay, demand the merit system, examinations, probations, investigations and removals on charges. The purpose is to make permanent all municipal appointments, calling for special fitness, so that a faithful public official may plan a career and fit himself accordingly, without fear of displacement by disfavor.

Another feature of the charter is the provision for publicity. All the meetings are open to the public, and all ordinances and other notices must be published in the Official Gazette, which is distributed free of charge. The mayor has no veto power.

The charter provides for the initiative and referendum and the recall. Fifteen per cent of the vote is required to recall any commissioner

Kansas now has a law prohibiting the publication of unsigned political articles in newspapers and also prohibiting the insertion of articles which tend to injure any candidate for public office.

The New Hampshire legislature, already the largest representative body of its kind in the world, will be increased by seven members at the next session as a result of the recent census, making a total of over 400.

The state campaign in Oregon early next year will include, for the first time in the history of the United States, the expression of popular choice by the voters of a state for candidates for President and Vice President.

First and second choice votes are not elected, the votes of the third choice are counted with the stragglers of the other two and the third choice selections fill out the five. The third choice men are elected by a simple majority.

The Spokane plan varies from all others by making the contest a free-for-all and not designating the office sought. There were 97 candidates at the beginning of the recent campaign. Three declined to make the race and two withdrew just before the election. It provides that candidates must not spend more than \$250 during the campaign, also making it compulsory to submit an itemized statement of expenditures and no-paid workers, carriages or other conveyances are permitted on election day.

Party lines are absolutely obliterated and personalities are eliminated. The candidate must take an oath that he represents no political party in the election nor any special interests.

Spokane did not win its new government without a series of stubbornly-fought battles. Late last fall Mayor Pratt, democrat, working with a republican council, composed of legislative and administrative branches, informally appointed a committee of business men to prepare a charter under the commission form. The draft was presented to the city council three months afterward, but the ten representatives paid little or no attention to it.

A petition, signed by more than 30 per cent of the voters, was then submitted to the council. This urged the appointment of 15 freeholders to formulate a charter. The council granted the request after some delay and eight business men, five representatives of union labor and two lawyers were selected. This committee embodied in its charter some of the best features of 100 plans in operation in the United States and submitted its work to the people, who adopted it by an overwhelming vote at an election on Dec. 27, 1910.

Proceedings for injunction were instituted in the Spokane county superior court afterward. The people were sustained, but that did not clear the field. An appeal was taken to the supreme court of Washington, the six judges of which handed down a joint opinion, upholding the legality of the charter election.

A unique political organization, one of whose principles is that its members are not to seek political office, has been formed in San Francisco. Its object is to promote sound municipal government by the selection of non-partisan candidates.

State branches of the National Progressive Republican League have been organized in Michigan, Nebraska, Minnesota, South Dakota and Washington, while similar leagues are forming in Montana and some of the other Western States.

Winfield A. Huppuch, at present chairman of the New York State Democratic Committee, but who probably will resign soon because of his appointment as Public Service Commissioner, was at one time a paper hanger in Buffalo. Of late years he has been in partnership with Governor Dixie the business of manufacturing wall paper and wood pulp.

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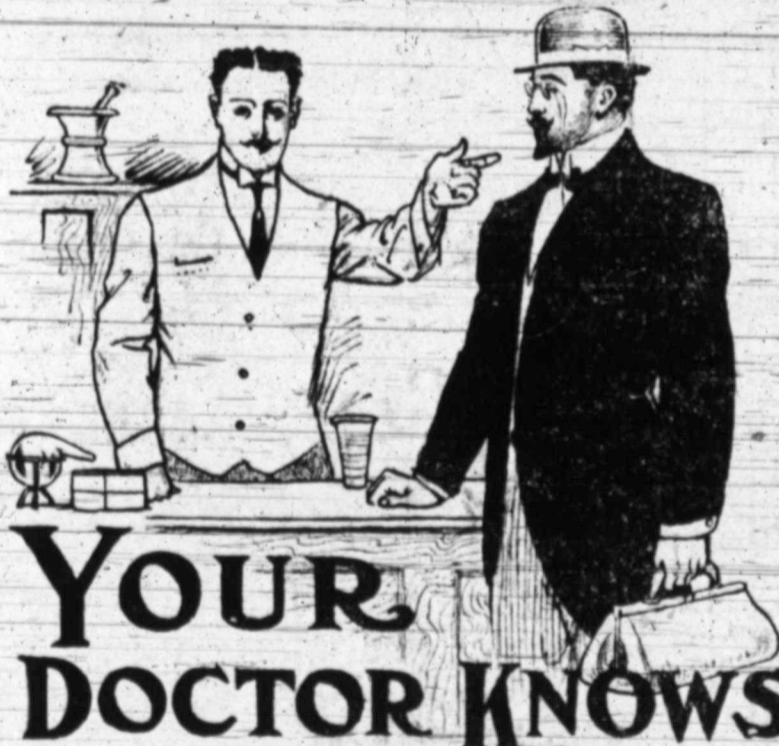
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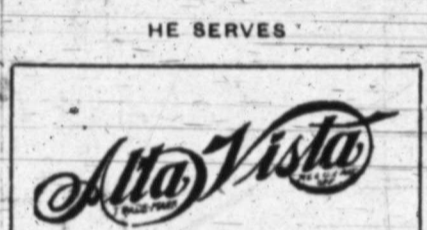

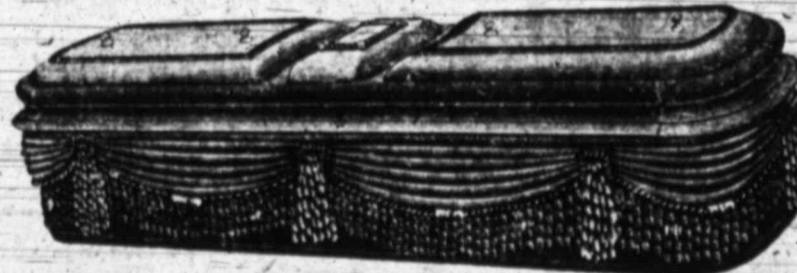

Atlee Pomerene, the new United States senator from Ohio, is forty-five years old and a man of Puritan habits, abhorring tobacco, intoxicating liquor and profanity. He is a successful lawyer and is said by his associates of the Ohio bar to be an exceedingly skilled debater and also an orator of eloquence.

Though no incumbent of the Speakership has ever been nominated for President since the national convention system was introduced, several former Speakers have received nominations for the office of chief executive of the nation. Among them were Henry Clay in 1844, James K. Polk in the same year, John Bell in 1860 and James G. Blaine in 1884. But no aspirant for the Presidency has made much headway while filling the Speaker's office. Speakers Samuel J. Randall, John G. Carlisle and Thomas B. Reed all failed to develop substantial strength as Presidential candidates, although their distinction as party leaders was unquestioned.

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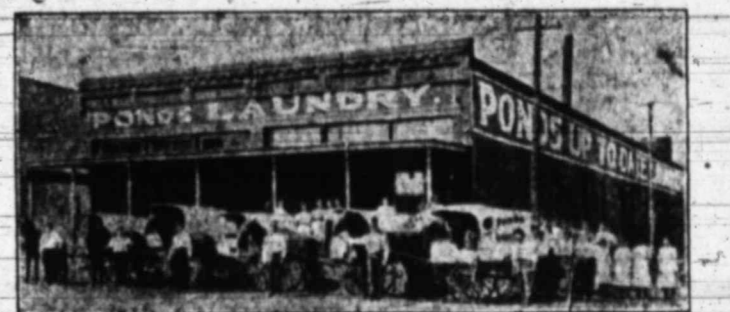

SOME AUTO DON'TS.

(From the Automobile)

DON'T skimp on the amount of lubricating oil just because the salesman tells you that the bearings are extra large—an extra allowance of grit might get in and rub the newness off the surfaces.

DON'T wait for a "spill" before making adjustments of the brakes.

DON'T test out the emergency brakes during an emergency—try them each morning before taking to the pike.

DON'T give the dry cells six months to dry-out and then switch over only to find that they are ripe for replacement.

DON'T stand for a sag in the live rear axle—take a half day off and tighten up on the bob-stays.

DON'T drill holes in the sideframes—if the designer thought that they were too liberal in size, he would have saved a little on the cost of metal.

DON'T empty out the gasoline tank and then go around it with a lighted candle—there will be enough gas left in the tank to teach you better.

DON'T allow the clutch to do service after it shows that it is not in fettle to hold the car—reface the clutch and avoid serious consequences.

DON'T spill oil into the crevices of the magneto. The windings are insulated with cotton and this vegetable fiber is not proof against the wiles of the lubricating material.

DON'T fail to supply the wants of the magnetos from the lubricating point of view—this means that a little of the good quality lubricating oil should be used.

DON'T tamper with the adjustments of the magnetos—if you do not understand that language, go it on faith until you come to a pilgrim who is suitably endowed.

DON'T batter up the insulation on the high-tension cables—rubber compounds is used for this purpose and it should be handled with care.

DON'T replenish the water supply from a convenient mud-puddle—a very thin coating of scale over the surfaces of the radiator will reduce its efficiency over 33 per cent.

DON'T go along the road with a steaming radiator—it simply means that the motor is being run on a retarded spark.

DON'T allow a motor to run without attention until it emits some strange noises—the damage may then be done.

DON'T allow your automobile to complain for lack of attention. A little attention every day is far better than a lot of work every Saturday.

DON'T place too much reliance upon ball bearings in the road wheels of your automobile—they may be ever so fine, but this is no reason why they should not be cleaned, inspected and freshly lubricated at reasonable intervals.

DON'T wait for the sun to shine on both sides of the street before cleaning up your automobile—it will soon be time to place the car in commission.

DON'T allow the extra tires to rest on the running-board subject to the abuse of light, hail, rain, dust and other enemies of rubber and cotton—get a case.

DON'T neglect the top. True, it is made of good material and will put up with a lot of abuse, but it will show that it is being neglected.

DON'T forget that the fates are appeased the more readily if you do a little of the work.

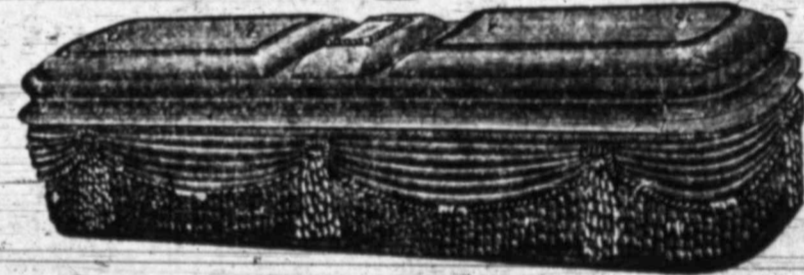
