New York, March 28.—The average Russian peasant bathes only three times from the cradle to the grave, according to Professor Simon Baruch, who is giving a series of lectures on Water" at Columbia University. SUBSCRIPTIONS NOW ONLY \$4,750 SHORT OF THE \$200,000 REQUIRED.




