MEXICANS CALL IT A YANKEE TRICK

SO DESCRIBE KILLINGS AT DOUGLAS AND BLOWING UP OF MAINE.

CIRCULARS ARE ISSUED

Charge Is Provoked By Use of Word Belligerents in American Paper.

By Associated Press. Eagle Pass, Texas, April 28.—"The killing of Americans at Douglas, Arizona, during the battle between revolutionists and Mexican soldiers was a Yankee trick, as was the destruction of the Maine in the harbor near Havana, Cuba," is a printed statement in a circular issued broadcast today by officials of C. P. Diaz, signed by Jose Politicos and practically all other officials. The circular was occasioned by the use of the word belligerent in the headlines of an American paper at Monterey.

At Monterey, the word was used in describing rebels as well as federals and the Mexicans evidently think "belligerents" too dignified an appellation for rebels. The circular says that even "Yankee senators who mostly desired it, could not find cause to apply that word." It referred to the destruction of the Maine as a "Mere Trifle."

Copies of the circular have been sent to the Washington state department.

Department Takes Exception.

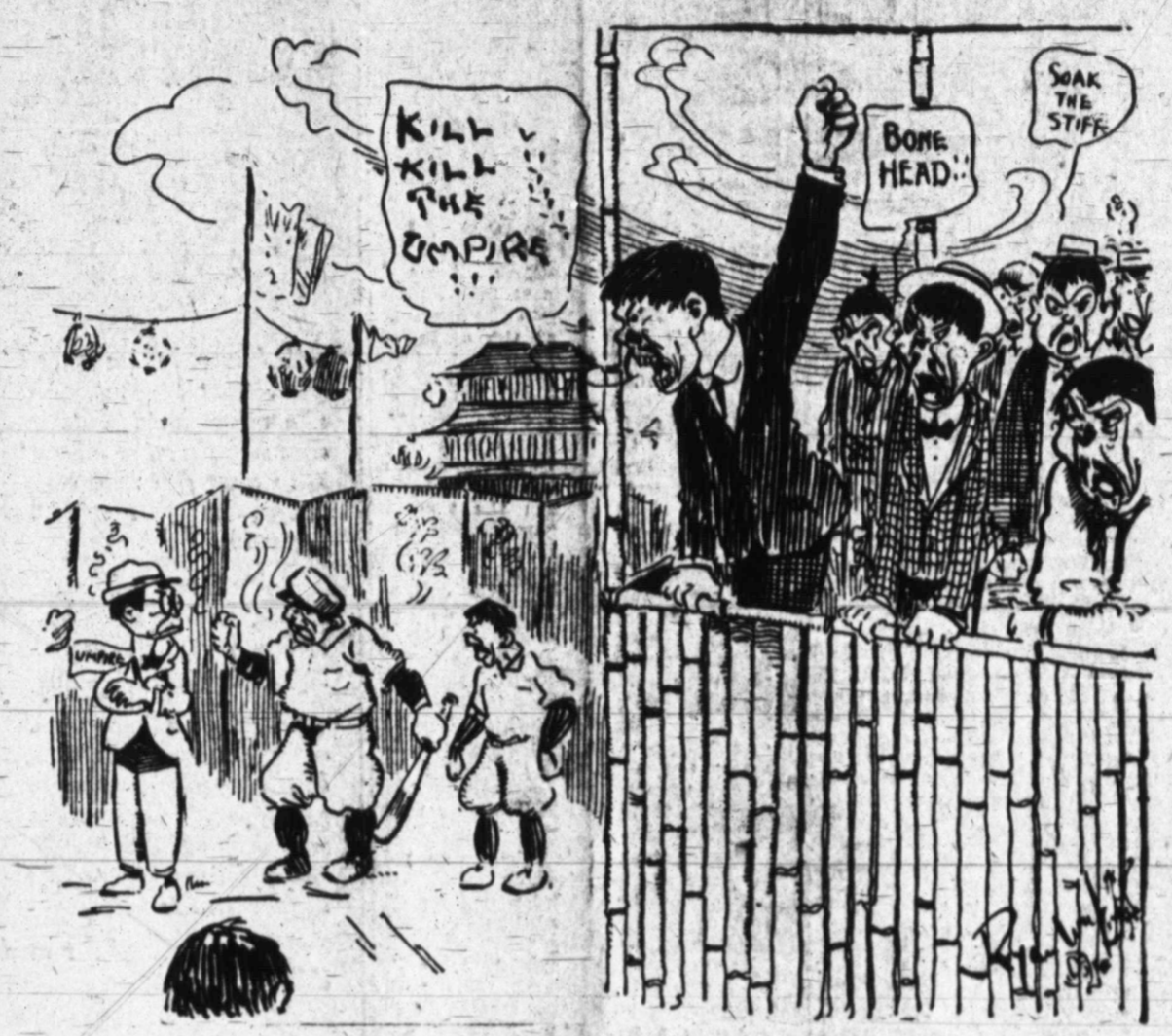

ARRANGING FOR LAKESHORE MEET

MEETING HELD IN THIS CITY YESTERDAY BY BOARD OF MANAGERS.

PLAN EDUCATIONAL MEET

Numerous Features Are Being Outlined for Success of the Occasion.

An educational day, as one of the most important features of the Lakeshore Assembly here next July will be arranged by the program committee according to reports made to the board of managers of the assembly at a meeting here yesterday. The project has the hearty approval of this board and according to reports has created widespread interest.

As outlined the plan is to devote one day exclusively to an educational program. On this day the heads of all the Methodist colleges in the state are expected to attend. During the day there will be an athletic meet in which the star athletes of the different colleges will participate. Addresses will be delivered by presidents of the Texas colleges and universities and there will be oratorical contests, debates and a concert at night in which all the colleges will be represented.

Interest in educational matters among the Methodists in Texas was never so strong as now and it is believed that one of the greatest educational rallies ever held in Texas can be arranged.

Final arrangements for sleeping quarters for the visitors at the assembly have been arranged. The board of managers yesterday closed a contract with the Freese-Brin Furniture Company for 1000 cots. These cots will be placed in the amusement circle which it is computed would accommodate 1500 sleepers or more. One hundred tents will also be erected and these together with the hotel, the Irish-Lads headquarters and the camp houses already on the grounds will accommodate 2,000 people or more.

Dr. L. S. Barton, of Decatur, R. E. Goodrich, of Stamford, and G. W. Barron returned to their homes this afternoon after attending the session of the board of managers. The other members of this board are Dr. Bishop, of this city and Rev. Roach of Bowie. Rev. Roach remained here to look after some details in connection with the advertising campaign.

CHINA HAS REBELLION FIGHTING AT CANTON

FOR EIGHT HOURS. By Associated Press. Washington, April 28.—Representative Reilly of Connecticut has introduced a bill in the house for an eight hour day for all mail carriers and clerks in first and second class post offices, eight hours to be consumed within the limit of ten consecutive hours, for a prorata compensation for all work in excess of eight hours. The measure has met with favor from many members of congress.

THOUSANDS ARE FLEEING FROM CITY TODAY AS RESULT OF TROUBLE.

ANARCHY IS RIFE THERE

Soldiers Whose Terms Have Expired Are Deserting the Army in Droves.

By Associated Press. Hongkong, China, April 28.—Rebellion and fighting broke out at Canton last night and thousands are fleeing from the city today. Refugees arriving here say that anarchy is rife among soldiers whose terms are expiring in great numbers, and today the British consul at Canton declares that the situation is serious. The viceroys at Canton escaped but fire did great damage to his palace. The rebels have explosives and many of them were arrested last night in connection with the rebellion.

Fighting began when a revolutionary leader and his followers surrounded the viceroys' palace, set it afire, and then interfered with the efforts of others to extinguish it. Fighting then began which lasted all night, the revolutionists fighting with rifles and bombs. Troops under Admiral L. suffered considerable but got control, closed the city gates and began a search for arms and ammunition. One cause of the trouble seems to have been the propaganda of anarchists in the army. The government has asked steamship companies plying to Canton to suspend sailings, lost arms and ammunition be smuggled into the city. Many of the rebel leaders have been imprisoned.

There was one decision, one draw and two quit giving the fight to their opponents. Hereafter there will be boxing contests among the enlisted men every Thursday night.

Can Bring Fish Into The State

By Associated Press. Austin, Texas, April 28.—C. E. Mead of the Attorney General's Department has held that Arkansas fishermen cannot be taxed for bringing fish into Texas. The decision was on complaint from Cass county that Arkansas fishermen by this practice were hurting the Texas trade.

VERNON KEY RATE HAS BEEN REDUCED

Special to the Times. Vernon, Texas, April 28.—The key rate of fire insurance in the city of Vernon is to be reduced from 82 cents to 74. This has been announced by G. W. Monroe of Dallas, a hydraulic engineer and member of the state fire rating board, who was in the city for the purpose of conducting an investigation into conditions concerning fire risks in Vernon. The reduction was agreed to because the water supply at the city pumping station is now adequate for all purposes.

During his stay in the city Mr. Monroe quietly investigated conditions in and around the business houses, and as a result of his observation handed down some timely advice as to how to secure further reductions, stating that with certain improvements the rate could be reduced to 54 cents.

If Mexico is annexed it can get in as one of the counties of Texas without creating a disturbance.—Brooklyn Eagle.

Property Owners Must Make Sewer Connection

In compliance with instructions from the city council, City Attorney Householder is notifying property owners who have failed to provide sewer connections with their premises that they must install such connections at once. It is the intention of the city authorities to prosecute all violators of the city sewer ordinance and the names of more than one hundred property owners who have failed to furnish such connections have already been secured.

Each of these has or will receive a letter something like the following: "I beg to call attention to the fact that there is on premises owned, occupied and controlled by you, a discrepancy in violation of the ordinance of the city of Wichita Falls. This becomes a violation by reason of the fact that there is in the alley and adjoining your premises a sanitary sewer pipe of the city. You are therefore urged and requested to connect your premises with the sewer system at once."

English Premier is Advocate of Treaty

London, April 28.—Beneath the entwined Stars and Stripes and the British Union Jack, Premier Asquith today addressed a notable meeting which pledged its support to the Anglo-American complete arbitration proposal, which President Taft made. Asquith and Balfour also eloquently favored the treaty but both said it would not mean disarmament at present.

Premier Asquith presented a resolution favoring the treaty and Balfour, leader of the opposition to the government, seconded it. Asquith said: "Seed which the President of the United States cast fell on ground prepared to receive it. That which a few years, even a few months ago, might have been regarded as a dream of idealists not only passed into the domain of practical statesmanship, but has become a settled purpose of two

great democracies. It is not for us to dictate or preach to other nations, but if the United States and Great Britain renounce war, a step will be taken of immeasurable and incomparable significance in the onward progress of humanity."

Premier Asquith said that the treaty would not mean an alliance between the two countries.

Statesmen Speak on Arbitration. London, April 28.—In response to the call of the Lord Mayor a large and representative gathering of citizens met at the Guildhall today to discuss the subject of Anglo-American Arbitration. The meeting was addressed by Premier Asquith and A. J. Balfour, leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons.

Postoffice to Weigh Every Piece of Mail

On May first Uncle Sam will begin the most stupendous accounting task ever undertaken in the history of the world. For thirty-one days from that date every single piece of mail received and distributed at every postoffice in the United States, Alaska and other possessions will be counted and accounted for under sixteen different classifications together with the time consumed in handling each piece. The mere accounting, that is writing down the figures, will keep one man more than busy in a postoffice like Wichita Falls and in some of the larger cities scores of accountants will be required, to say nothing of the extra labor of the clerks in separating and counting the different pieces and keeping track of the time consumed in handling the different classifications. Postmaster Bacon has asked for such help, but as yet has received no reply from the department at Washington.

The accounting is believed to enable the postoffice department to arrive at the cost of handling each class of mail and is believed to get figures to substantiate Postmaster General Hitchcock's statement that the magazines are being carried at a loss and to break down the opposition to an increase in the postage on this class of mail.

The separate classifications on which the local postoffice has been ordered to keep an accounting are as follows:

- All first-class mail.
- Second-class mails with separate accounting for newspapers, magazines, transient, local delivery and free delivery in the county.
- Third-class circulars and other matter.
- Fourth-class congressional franks including departmental matter, letters and other matter.
- Foreign letters, other matter, registered.

GLOOM ENSHROUDS THE U. S. SENATE

GLORY AND PRESTIGE OF SEN-
ATORIALITY IS WANING IN THAT
AUGUST BODY.

NEW MEN A GREAT FACTOR

Trouble Has Been Encountered in Com-
mittee Assignments With
Other Work.

Washington, April 28.—There is deep
gloom enshrouding the Senate. The
glory of prestige and seniority is wan-
ing, and the men fresh from the bust-
ling v. i. togas still unrumpled, de-
mand the best committee assignments
and aspire to display their oratory be-
fore they have been a year in office.
With Senatorial courtesy and diplo-
macy the elder statesmen bow to these
demands, but in unaccountable ways
things go awry and confusion results.

The new Congress is an unevenly
yoked and ineffective team. In the
house business is proceeding swiftly
and but for the many things which the
new masters there find in need of over-
hauling, there would be a cheering
prospect for summer vacations spent
at sea and shore, or on the Chautau-
qua lecture platform.

In the Senate, how different! Re-
organization has dragged slowly. The
assignment to committees have seem-
ingly been more difficult to negotiate
than an international treaty of comity
and comradery. There was an early
insurgent demonstration in which
dozen Republicans cavorted and
brought in an ultimatum regarding
committee plans. They were told that
they should get their hearts desired.

The Democratic insurgents held a sim-
ilar gathering and found that they
held all the trumpets, but when they
had reached a working agreement with
the democratic regulars and had elect-
ed Senator Martin, an alleged corpor-
ation sympathizer, to leader of their
minority caucus, they found it a mat-
ter for surprise that he should appear
to vacillate on the steering committee
such men as Bankhead and Fletcher,
whom the insurgents declared to be
very good friends of the railroad in-
surgents. The Steering Committee was
promptly credited by the insurgents, or
progressives, in both parties, with the
intention of packing the committee on
Interstate Commerce so that no leg-
islation hostile to the railroads could
get out of the committee at this ses-
sion. Perhaps, too, they argued, the
Committee on Privileges and Elections
would be so organized that any dis-
tasteful measure referred to it, such
for instance, as the one providing for
the direct election of senators by the
people, would be gently smothered and
never allowed to see the light.

Starting out with the assumption
that they could compel what they con-
sidered fair treatment if soon came
to this, that any important committee
assignments have been received with
great thankfulness by the republican
as well as by the democratic insur-

gents. The former have been declaring

**ECLIPSE OF SUN
THIS AFTERNOON**

Will Attract Considerable Attention Throughout the Entire Country.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—If conditions are favorable the southern and far western portions of the United States will be treated to a partial performance by old Sol late this afternoon when he hides himself behind the moon. At best, however, the view of the solar eclipse will be a very unsatisfactory one so far as the North American continent is concerned. As a partial eclipse it will be visible in that part of the United States lying south of a line drawn from Cape Henlopen on the coast of Delaware, to Astoria, Oregon. On the Pacific coast the eclipse begins at about 3 p. m. All along the eastern coast south of Washington there will be a very small partial eclipse, the sun setting with the eclipse on it. In New York and New England and throughout the Dominion of Canada the eclipse will be wholly invisible.

The path of the total eclipse is a very large one, but it is wasted almost wholly in the southern waters of the Pacific Ocean, extending from southeastern Australia to Central America. The only points on land where observations can be made are in the Samoan and Friendly Islands, where totality will last nearly five minutes.

The best points for the observation of this strangest of all heavenly phenomena are the upraised coral formed islands known as the Vavua and Tofua of the Samoan group. The hills and mountain peaks there rise from 1,500 to 2,000 feet in the air from the placid waters of the Pacific. On these islands eminent groups of scientists sent out by universities and royal societies have set up instruments with long, unpronounceable names for the purpose of taking observations of the eclipse. The Solar Physics Observatory, at South Kensington, England, has sent to the island of Vavua an expedition headed by Sir Norman Lockyer. Another notable party of German scientists, headed by Dr. Wegener, has established quarters on the island of Tau in American Samoa.

During the few minutes of total eclipse the scientists hope to obtain photographs which will enable them to define at least two or three of the uncertain chemical elements of the sun. It is known that there are seventy-five such elements; of these sixty have been detected and definitely determined and fifteen yet lack definition.

Heretofore it has almost been found impossible to transport the best instruments to the favorable points of observation, but today more different kinds of strange things are to be pointed at old Sol than ever before in the history of that gentleman. The British expedition took with it three great telescopic cameras in order that photographs might be taken of the corona—the radiant light which during a total solar eclipse surrounds the dark disc. Each telescope is of a different scale in order that varying photographs may be obtained. The expedition has also a six-inch prismatic camera which contains four prisms each of which is ten inches square. The prisms, acting between the sun and the lens, split the light into different colors, each color indicating a different element.

**INTERURBAN LINE
IS TO BE SOLD**

Ten Miles of Grade, With Charter, Profiles, Maps and Blue Prints.

Gainesville, Texas, April 28.—The property of the Gainesville, Whitesboro & Sherman Interurban Company is now being advertised for sale under a receivership sale, with J. T. Honeycut as receiver. The date of the sale is placed on June 6th. Mr. Honeycut has made the following statement as to the property which belongs to this concern and which is to be sold: "They have ten miles of grade, which is only partly damaged. They have the right of way practically all the way to Whitesboro and most of it to Sherman. They have about \$250 worth of surveying apparatus and possibly a few tools. The company has kept up the charter which goes with the other property, and they have the old profiles, maps, blue prints, surveys, etc. There is approximately \$50,000 indebtedness against the company."

The company values its property at \$50,000, according to the statement of Mr. J. W. Blanton.

LAND TITLE CASE AFFIRMED.

Supreme Courts Acts on Appeal From El Paso County.—Points at Issue.

Austin, Texas, April 28.—Chief Justice Brown rendered the only opinion written in the Supreme Court yesterday upon a trespass to try title suit from El Paso county, which was affirmed. It was the case of Patrick Breen vs. C. R. Moreland et al. The court listened to oral argument in the case of the Brown Cracker and Candy Company et al. vs. the City of Dallas, in which the question of the right of a city to fix certain boundaries for a reservation is challenged. This question is one of importance to all cities and upon which the Appellate Courts disagree. In this instance property owners are objecting to the reservation limits and have attacked the Dallas ordinance which has been upheld by the courts up to this time.

A number of lawyers were interested in this case. The ordinary laborer in the Amoy section of the Chinese empire receives wages equivalent to about 5 cents United States currency a day.

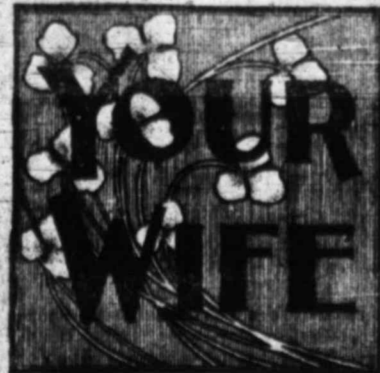

MILLIONS ARE DUE TO UNCLE SAMUEL

Balance of Trade is On Our Side of the Ledger to Amount of \$441,000,000.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—The world owes the United States \$441,000,000 for food, clothing and raw materials sold abroad. Only once has the balance of trade been higher in favor of this country, according to government figures. That was in 1908, when it was more than \$550,000,000.

Close observers of finance and trade predict a record-breaking fiscal year if the favorable condition continues until June. While opinion is divided over the significance of the fact that the balance for March was less than half the size of that of previous months, some point out that March a year ago produced a balance entirely in the other direction with an excess of imports of more than \$19,900,000.

MAKING EXPERIMENTS FOR ANTI-FLY CRUSADE

Endeavoring to Find Out Extent of Disease-Carrying Propensities of Insects.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 28.—Former City Engineer, John B. Hawley is making an experiment with flies, placed under a screen covering a box in which there is stable refuse, with the direct object in view of demonstrating the importance of screening such refuse at all stables.

"Many years ago," said Mr. Hawley, "I became convinced that the common house fly was very largely responsible for the transmission of disease, especially typhoid fever, dysentery and similar enteric troubles.

"After careful study of work done by others along this line, I wrote several papers on the subject, most of them delivered before some public association, such as the Mayors of Texas.

"I was obliged to take my figures as to the nature of the creature, his birth and development, from Jackson, Elgin, Mason and other investigators, and could not state, from my own personal knowledge, that it took just so long for the egg to develop into the grown fly from the pupa. It was also quite embarrassing to have statements as to the number of microbes found on the body of one fly looked at askance.

"Last fall, therefore, O. H. Lindgren, my laboratory assistant, and myself, began taking the regular bacteriological course of the Fort Worth Medical College under direction of Prof. Cook and Cowart, and after learning methods, fitted up my testing laboratory with all apparatus necessary to the full investigation of Mr. Housefly.

"We are at present running what some one has dubbed a 'fly farm,' securing breeding beds of stable and other refuse, exposing them to the flies for a few hours, and carefully noting developments of all stages until the mature fly comes forth.

"Later we intend to take the flies thus bred, allow them to feed on refuse of various characters and then examine and count the microbes on individual flies, both disease-bearing and otherwise.

"After securing proper microscopic records, I will endeavor to arrange slides which can be used in a stereopticon exhibit, which some one better adapted than myself to a lecture course, may use, in order to demonstrate to our people just exactly what our own Fort Worth flies are doing in their murderous career."
