NOTES OF PROGRESS THROUGHOUT TEXAS

REVIEW OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT DURING PAST WEEK.

NOVEL CLEAN UP PLAN

Joint Committee Inspects Premises of Mart Business Houses Once Each Week.

Ground has been broken for the Stone & Webster interurban-railway that is to be constructed between Dallas and Waxahachie. Cars are to be in operation between the two cities within the next twelve months.

An election will be held in Dallas, on July 22nd to decide whether or not \$500,000 shall be voted for the improvement of Dallas county roads.

On June 27 property tax payers of Waco, will decide whether they favor issuing bonds to the amount of \$200,000 for street improvements, sanitary storm sewer systems, etc.

Work on the public roads under the \$35,000 bond issue recently passed at Sour Lake, is progressing rapidly and three county roads will soon be completed.

The Directors of the Texas State Fair at Dallas, have authorized the construction of a Dairy building. The building is to cost \$20,000, will be 20 by 100 feet and will contain twenty stalls with rooms for weighing food and feeding milk and butter.

The citizens of Bryan, recently held a rousing good roads meeting at which it was proposed to build a macadam road across the entire county. An election will be called soon for the purpose of voting a bond issue.

Gainesville has a new glove factory which has just been put in operation and gives employment to twenty people.

The election at Dayton, Tuesday, June 6th on the proposition of bonding the county for \$275,000 for the purpose of building good roads carried by a large majority.

A good roads movement has been inaugurated at Breham, that promises to bring excellent results. A meeting has been called for the early part of next week, and it is expected that five hundred citizens of Washington county will be present. Petitions are being circulated for a bond election in that county.

Mr. J. A. Edson, President of the Kansas City Southern Railway has been in Fort Arthur, for the purpose of locating a site for the erection of a new sugar refinery. Mr. Edson, in company with other officials will make a trip over the proposed site of the sugar refinery and it is expected that work will begin at once.

Great Commoner Purchases Farm. It is announced from South Texas, that Hon. W. J. Bryan, and his brother, Chas. W. Bryan, have just completed the purchase of 30 acres of land near Houston, for the purpose of engaging in the culture of oranges.

The land is in the richest section of Harris county, in the citrus fruit district. Mr. Bryan will have his orchard in readiness for the fall planting.

This is the second farm purchased in Texas by the great Commoner, and is evidence of his faith in the future greatness of the State.

Laredo Builds New Ice Plant. The citizens of Laredo, have organized a stock company, and have erected a modern ice plant, with a capacity of sixty tons of ice per day.

The building is situated in the richest section of the city, and is equipped with modern machinery and was constructed at a cost of \$20,000. Marking the formal opening of the plant the citizens of Laredo held an informal reception in the building at which were present the leading business men, Federal, Army and Municipal authorities. Ice beverages were served to the crowds in honor of the new "cooling industry" and talks were made by some of the leading business men touching on the general prosperity of Laredo, and that section of the state.

Combinations Are Safe. Uncle Sam's recent inspection of the nation's wardrobe has developed rather startling and unexpected information in regard to the popularity of combinations among the American people. He finds that combination garments in underwear have shown an increase of 2,000,000 suits over last year, which is an increase of 311 per cent. All of which goes to show that the common people consider combinations safe and reliable.

Melons At Mission. It is reported from Mission, Texas, that the watermelon growers of that section expect to have an increased production of melons of several hundred car loads this year over that of last.

Mission was one of the first places to ship melons this season, the first car load leaving there the early part of May. The Texas watermelon is fast gaining in its race for supremacy with the Georgia product and is giving the "Georgia Sweet" a run for its money.

Texas Potatoes. Mr. H. M. Morrow, of Harlingen, reports that the yield from a five-acre potato patch on a farm in the Harlingen Valley this year will be 900 bushels. The crop of production was only \$75.00 for fertilizers, besides the cultivation; the crop will bring an average price, of \$1.00 per bushel, making a handsome dividend on the investment.

The time has come in this country when all opposition to the construction of good roads has practically disappeared, and it is probable that within a few years a system of good roads will radiate from every city and every town.

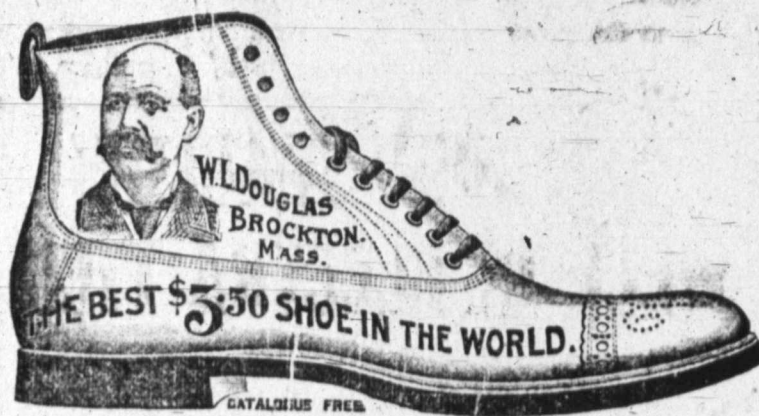

DELEGATION MAY CHANGE

Several Congressmen Opposed to Senator Are Stated for Early Retirement.

Washington, D. C., June 13.—A number of the present delegation in the house from Texas are marked for slaughter as a result of the Bailey fight in that state. The Bailey men are going to make war upon several members who have devoted their time to fighting the junior senator. It is possible that the anti-Bailey men will attempt to repeal and in that way there may be a number of Texans who will no longer be members of the house after the present term.

Henry is to Go. Prominent among the men marked for defeat is Bob Henry, of the Eleventh district. Henry has been so long in congress that he is regarded as an old-timer. At the close of the present congress he will have sixteen years to his credit, which is a much longer service than that of the average man who comes to congress and is equalled by only one other man from Texas. Mr. Stephens, Henry has a very prominent position as chairman of the committee on rules and has already taken a prominent part in the house proceedings. But the ruler committee is not as powerful as in the days of Cannon, for much of its power has been spread about and given to other committees. As the speaker is not a member it lacks the prestige which his membership gave it.

Congressman Randall will not be returned because he will be a candidate against Bailey. "It let him down easy," said one of the Bailey men. "If he had not retired to run for the senate we would have beaten him for re-election."

Other Anti-Bailey Men Stated. Rufus Hardy, of the Sixth district is another man that Bailey has determined to defeat. Hardy is the man who espoused the Bryan movement in Texas. He has been a most persistent anti-Bailey man and has incurred the wrath of the junior senator. Hardy is now serving his third term.

Albert Burleson of the Tenth district, is not to be disturbed. He has been a very intense anti-Bailey man, but he has friends in Texas who will prevent any fight being made against him. Burleson has not been quite sure whether he would have to fight for his return to congress or not; nor was he certain that he would not find himself redistricted out of a chance to be returned. He might be placed in a district with a Bailey man and defeated, but that is not going to be done. Burleson is to remain undisturbed, both as to his district and as to any oncoming put forward by the Bailey crowd.

No Fight on Some. There are other anti-Bailey men upon whom there will be no fight because they have not been so intense antagonistic to the junior senator or because they have not really taken any active part in the fight against Bailey. But it is the intention of the Bailey men to make the fight aggressive. Men who have made it their business to fight Bailey will find fight on themselves. Those who have made or are making their campaigns on their opposition to Bailey will find they have a contest on those grounds and the Bailey crowd intend to make the fight without quarter.

SOVEREIGN CAMP W.O.W. MEETS AT ROCHESTER

Establishment of Tuberculosis Sanitarium in Texas Will Be Considered.

Rochester, N. Y., June 12.—The Sovereign Camp, Woodmen of the World, one of the largest fraternal and beneficiary orders in America, met here today in biennial session, with hundreds of delegates in attendance. The convention will probably remain in session for ten days or two weeks. A proposal to establish in Texas a tuberculosis sanitarium for members of the order will be discussed. Another matter to be acted upon is the proposition to erect an eighteen-story building in Omaha for the national headquarters of the organization.

BATting AVERAGES TO TRAIN PUPILS

BOSTON SCHOOL USES THEM IN MATHEMATICS TO GIVE INTEREST TO WORK.

HISTORY'S HANDMAID

Allied With Baseball Study Becomes Pleasure and Knowledge Desire.

Baseball batting averages and other sporting statistics are being used successfully with backward students of mathematics in the Newton Technical school of Boston.

They give the students an interest in the work that could not otherwise be stimulated, according to a report from the head of the mathematics department. Students who cannot be persuaded to attempt even the most ordinary problem where beans or apples or dollars are concerned will try almost anything that has a baseball player mixed up with it.

This strikes us as an excellent idea. It is so excellent, in fact, that its application should not be limited either to backward pupils or to mathematics. Why not make education in all its branches interesting to the boys by utilizing the popular interest in baseball and sports in general? Take history, for instance. Many pupils go to sleep over their history lessons quite regularly. And no wonder. With its monotonous repetition of battles, sieges, history, as presented leading events, dates history, as presented to the young and more expanding mind, is generally little more than a collection of dry bones.

But inoculate it with baseball interest and how quickly it brightens lives becomes altogether enthralling. What male pupil—what adult male even—would not feel that history was really worth while if it were treated somewhat in this fashion.

Washington had already played great ball around New York, Long Island and all over New Jersey. But the English world's champions believed they had the eminent southwark cannon and soldered during his brief engagement at Valley Forge. Their reports showed that his team was in bad condition and would probably enter the next series of big league games as an avowed candidate for the tail-end position.

But their guess was one of the wildest in history. It went way over the second baseman's head and out into right field. The fact was that Washington had pulled Baron von Stueben off the Prussian team, paying, it is said, a large sum for those days, when many players got less than even the governor of a state. And when the season began he showed up with a team that set the fans wild at both Trenton and Germantown.

Perhaps this further illustration of the wisdom of infusing a certain amount of baseball lingo and style into history will serve to make the point even clearer to the lay reader. It relates to the great event that took place at Yorktown, Va., a little later than the incidents above mentioned. It was a great day at Yorktown; the number of paid admissions being pretty close to the record. "Cap" Cornwallis had his heavy hitters in fine trim and was expecting to crepe all over the hopes of the American team. His men had come up from North Carolina with a batting average of about four figures. They were also high up in other branches of the profession, and the taunts of excited fans, as a rule, made no more impression on them than a polite line of reasoning does, with Muggsy McGraw.

It looked a little like rain at first and the managers on both sides were looking blue. But the weather cleared. And thereupon was pulled off a contest that made every previous effort in that section look like a toy whistle beside a steam callpipe. Cornwallis' men simply could not get on the American ball. In the seventh inning the opposing team ran in De Grasse, a French big leaguer twirler. When the ninth closed La Fayette and Washington could be seen rolling up the pennant with a margin as wide as a front porch.

What can be done for history can obviously be done for grammar, rhetoric, geography, physiology, civil government, drawing and all other studies that young people are compelled to undergo.—Chicago Inter Ocean.

CULBERSON REAL LEADER OF SENATE MINORITY

Democrats Look to Texan to Fight for Party Principles in All Legislation.

Washington, D. C., June 13.—All through the democrats elected Senator Martin of Virginia minority leader, it appears that Senator Culbertson takes the real leadership of the minority and looks after the political interests of the party. It has already become apparent that Martin is working closely with the republicans. He is one of the politicians that prefers to have "underground understandings" so that everything done in the senate shall be merely a matter of carrying out what leaders have decreed. Naturally when the democratic leader is thus working with the republicans the political advantage is lost or nullified.

Senator Culbertson does not believe in that kind of work. He is partisan enough to keep things in the open, to

BAPTIST WORLD ALLIANCE AT PHILA.

Philadelphia, Pa., June 13.—Baptists are in possession of Philadelphia today. They fill railway stations, hotels, boarding houses, and street cars. Thousands of them are already here and thousands of others are on their way to attend the series of denominational conventions to be held in this city during the remainder of this month, and which promise to form one of the greatest religious gatherings ever held in America.

The first convention on the calendar is the gathering of the Northern Baptists, which had its formal opening today and will continue in session until the end of the week. This gathering embraces the annual meetings of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, the American Baptist Foreign Mission Society, the American Baptist-Publication Society and the Women's Home and Foreign Mission Societies.

Next week the North American Baptists will convene with delegates in attendance from all parts of the United States and Canada. Simultaneously the Baptist World Alliance will begin its sessions. The last named gathering will be attended by representatives of 20,000,000 Baptists throughout the world.

CREDIT MEN IN ANNUAL CONVENTION

Minneapolis, Minn., June 13.—The sixteenth annual convention of the National Association of Credit Men began in this city today and will continue four days. On the last day the sessions will be transferred to St. Paul. The attendance embraces more than one thousand delegates, representing the leading wholesale houses and manufacturing firms in all parts of the country.

The convention was called to order at 11 o'clock this morning by the president, F. H. McAdow, of Chicago. Governor Eberhart and Mayor Haynes delivered addresses of welcome. Responses in behalf of the visitors were made by H. G. Moore of Kansas City and H. E. Choate of Atlanta.

President McAdow delivered his annual address, in which he reviewed the history of credit men's associations and the salutary results achieved by them in placing business upon a sounder basis and in securing needed legislation. The address of the president was followed by the report of the secretary-treasurer, Charles E. Meek, of New York City.

The afternoon session was devoted to the reports of the standing committees and to addresses by James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railway, and H. K. Huntton of Stillwater, Minn. The session concluded with an address on "Reciprocity" by H. H. Pigott of Winnipeg.

SPECIAL ROAD LAW FOR WICHITA COUNTY

Legislature Will Be Asked to Give This County Act Similar to Lamar County Measure.

That the legislature, at the next meeting of that body, will be asked to enact a special road law similar to that now in force in Lamar county, was decided upon at the meeting of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce this morning. The matter was introduced by Wiley Blair who offered a motion that it was the sense of the meeting that a special act be requested of the legislature placing Wichita county under a road law similar to that in force in Lamar county, his motion embodying a request to the commissioner's court to co-operate with the Chamber of Commerce in securing such enactment.

The motion as made by Mr. Blair was adopted by a unanimous vote and it is expected that arrangements will be made to bring the matter before the legislature at the called session expected to be held in August, provided the Governor can be induced to submit the matter at that time.

The Lamar county road law authorizes the county or any subdivision thereof by a vote of a two-thirds majority of the resident property tax payers to issue bonds to any amount not exceeding one-fourth the assessed valuation of the real property for the purposes of constructing, maintaining and operating macadamized, gravel or paved roads.

The law provides for a Board of Permanent Road Commissioners composed of seven men, of which the county judge shall be the presiding officer, under whose direction the

roads of such bond issue shall be expended. It being provided that when bonds are voted by a subdivision of a county that the commissioner in that subdivision shall be a member of the board. The law, it is understood, further permits the expenditure of such fund within the city as in the judgment of the board is thought advisable in constructing such system of roads.

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
