#### IS PARDONED BY GOVERNOR

Many Have Always Believed That Porgery Was Committed. (Dallas Times-Herald)

That the pardon recently granted W. J. Dent by Governor Colquitt contained a provision that he should re side in Virginia in the future was de veloped here today by a visit of Mr. Dent to Dallas. Mr. Dent passed through Dallas on his way to Virginia and was a caller on Judge R. B. Sea, of the criminal district court between trains. It was while talking to Judge Seay that it was developed that Mr. Dent would in the future have to make his home in the Old Dominion. The Dent case was one of the most famous cases in the criminal his tory of Texas. It is also one of the most preculiar cases. Fifteen or more years ago, a man by the name of Isaacs was convicted of the murder

of Sheriff Magee of Hemphill county Following his conviction, relatives of Isaacs and his friends, employed Mr. Dent to work for a pardon, Isaacs having been given a life sentence in Isaacs Disappears.






