MINNESOTA TO WELCOME TAFT

Factional Politics Will Be Eliminated and Democrats and All Brands of Republicans Will Unite in Welcome.

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 23.—Minnesota is preparing a cordial welcome and elaborate entertainment in honor of President Taft, who will arrive in the State tomorrow for a stay of two days. Factional politics will be eliminated as much as possible. Prominent Democrats as well as leading Republicans of the State have been invited to meet the President tomorrow at Mankato, which will be the first important stopping place on his Minnesota-itinerary. In Minneapolis and St. Paul also the Democrats are expected to take part in the reception and entertainment of the distinguished visitor.

The presidential special train is due to arrive at Mankato at 10:30 tomorrow morning. Four hours will be spent in that city and during that time the President is expected to deliver a public address, attend a luncheon given by the commercial organizations and afterwards take an automobile ride about the city.

The presidential party will leave Mankato at 2:30 in the afternoon and is due to arrive in Minneapolis at 7:35 in the evening. Between Mankato and Minneapolis brief stops will be made at Fairbault and several other places.

Upon the arrival in Minneapolis five infantry companies of the Minnesota national guard and several other military organizations will escort the President from the union station to the Auditorium, where he is to deliver an address. The entire party will form a march over a mile in length, will be brilliantly illuminated, and places of business all along the way will be lavishly decorated. Governor Eberhart, Senator Clapp and other prominent public men of Minnesota will occupy seats on the platform at the Auditorium.

The President will spend the night at the Radisson Hotel and the following morning will go to St. Paul. Features of the St. Paul program will be an address before the faculty and students of the University of Minnesota, a luncheon given by the Young Men's Republican Club, a public reception in the afternoon and an automobile tour of the city.

NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF UNITARIANS

More Than 1500 Leaders of That Denomination Gather at Washington For Annual Meeting.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 23.—More than 1,500 leaders of the Unitarian Church, including scores of prominent divines, gathered in Washington for the twenty-fourth national conference which was formally opened in All Soul's church this morning with a sermon by Rev. James De Norman, D. D.

Tomorrow morning the first regular session of the conference will be held in Memorial Continental Hall, at which President Horace Davis of San Francisco will preside. Reports will be presented from the American Unitarian Association, the Unitarian Sunday School Society, the National Alliance of Unitarian Women, the Unitarian Laymen's League, and the Young People's Religious Union.

The subject of "International Peace" will be discussed Tuesday evening by Rev. Edward Cummings of Boston, Rev. Jenkin Lloyd Jones of Chicago and Rev. William C. Gannett of Rochester. Wednesday morning will be devoted to the discussion of sociological problems, to which the church is devoting more attention each year. The speakers at this session will include Mrs. Florence Kelley, secretary of the National Consumers' League; R. W. Hebbel, secretary of the New York State Board of Charities; Prof. Edward C. Elliott of the University of Wisconsin.

Vaccination Against Typhoid.

(By Gordon Lloyd, M. D.)

Have you been vaccinated against typhoid? In India, Egypt, Malta and Crete vaccination against typhoid is now as much in use as vaccination against smallpox.

During the occupation of Cuba by the American troops in an encampment of 10,000 soldiers not vaccinated against typhoid there were 100 deaths; in another encampment of 12,000 men who were vaccinated against typhoid, there was not one death from typhoid fever. Vaccination of troops in India has reduced the typhoid mortality to less than one-fourth of what it formerly was.

A significant fact is that physicians all over the country are having themselves inoculated against typhoid, showing how great is the faith of medical men in this prophylactic measure. The English army, the United States army and the German army are now vaccinating troops and in most large cities in America, one may now be vaccinated free of charge against this disease by public health officers.

England first adopted it during the Boer war, and the United States followed soon thereafter, the war department having first sent a special mission to Calcutta to carefully study the effects of the new treatment.

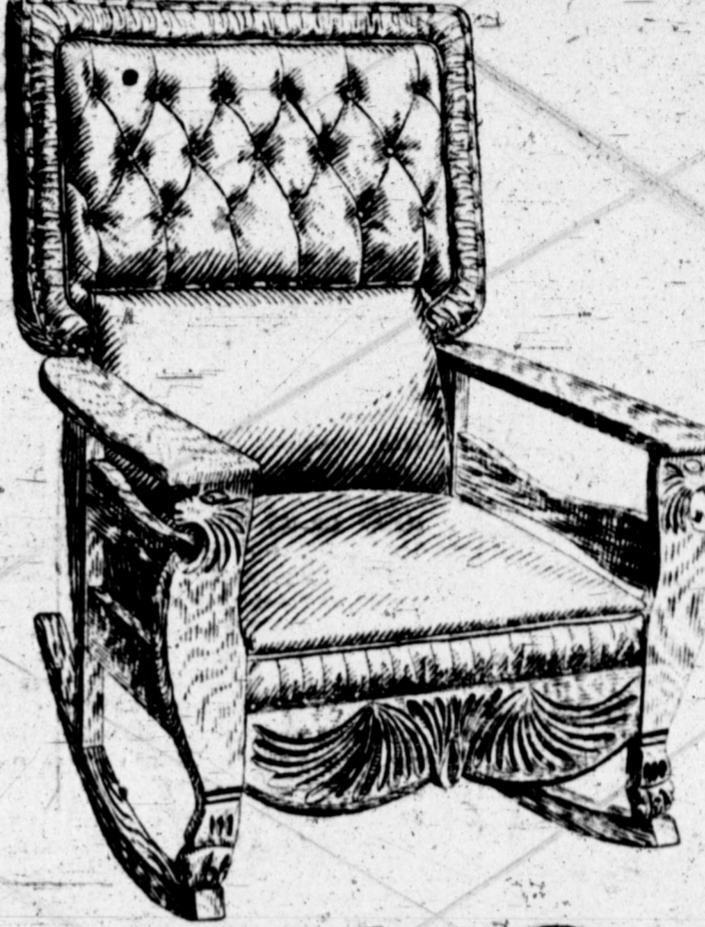

**WILL PROSECUTE VANDALS IN FUTURE**

Secretary Anderson Sunday afternoon discovered the identity of six of the boys who have lately been secretly entering the Y. M. C. A. rooms during the absence of the secretary and attendants and committing acts of vandalism such as spitting in drinking glasses, throwing cigarette butts on the floor and leaving the place generally in a littered and filthy condition. He will report the depredations to the parents of the boys involved and if there is a repetition of the outrages he will take steps to see that the perpetrators are prosecuted.

Boys and possibly men have been entering the Y. M. C. A. rooms through a broken window glass. After repeated depredations Secretary Anderson and the assistant secretary took turns Sunday in maintaining a watch from a secreted place. About 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon Secretary Anderson, who was then on watch was rewarded by seeing six boys crawl through the window and proceed to seat themselves at once on the tables for a game. When the secretary stepped from his hiding place there was a lively get-away, but Mr. Anderson succeeded in recognizing all of the intruders before they scrambled through the window. He believes that others in addition to those six have been responsible for a part of the depredations, a repetition of which will likely get the guilty parties in trouble.

Rev. Ham's Statement Challenged.

Rev. Ham in his sermon at the tent last night, made and elaborated a comparison to which I wish to take exception. The comparison was between Bob Ingersoll and O. L. Moore, in which he said in part that Colonel Bob with all his eloquence never made anyone better, happier or wiser and that all his influence was evil. I have before me the October American Magazine containing the first installment of LaFollette's autobiography. This is his tribute to Ingersoll: "Ingersoll had a tremendous influence upon me, as indeed he had upon many young men of that time. It was not that he changed my beliefs, but that he liberated my mind. Freedom was what he preached. He wanted the shackles off everywhere. He wanted men to think boldly about all things; he demanded intellectual and moral courage; he wanted men to follow wherever truth might lead them; he took a powerful hold on my imagination; he was a man bold, heroic figure."

Next Saturday there will be unveiled in Peoria, Ill. (his home town) a statue of Robert G. Ingersoll. Prominent men from all over the country besides his own town people who knew him intimately will be there to do him honor.

So much for the evidence. Now it seems to me that if Rev. Ham has come to this town to save souls it is a pretty bad start on his first night to make a deliberate misstatement of that kind. Certainly there were plenty of educated people in that audience who would resent such an attack upon a dead man by a man who by the nature of his position and the place and time, could "get away with it" without being contradicted. Jesus Christ was a lover of truth. His professed followers should at least try to follow His footsteps.

Up to date, work on the addition to the Wichita River bridge is progressing in a most satisfactory manner, and it was announced today that all of the concrete work had now been finished, and that it is expected to begin work on the wooden framework necessary for supporting the steel in the next few days.

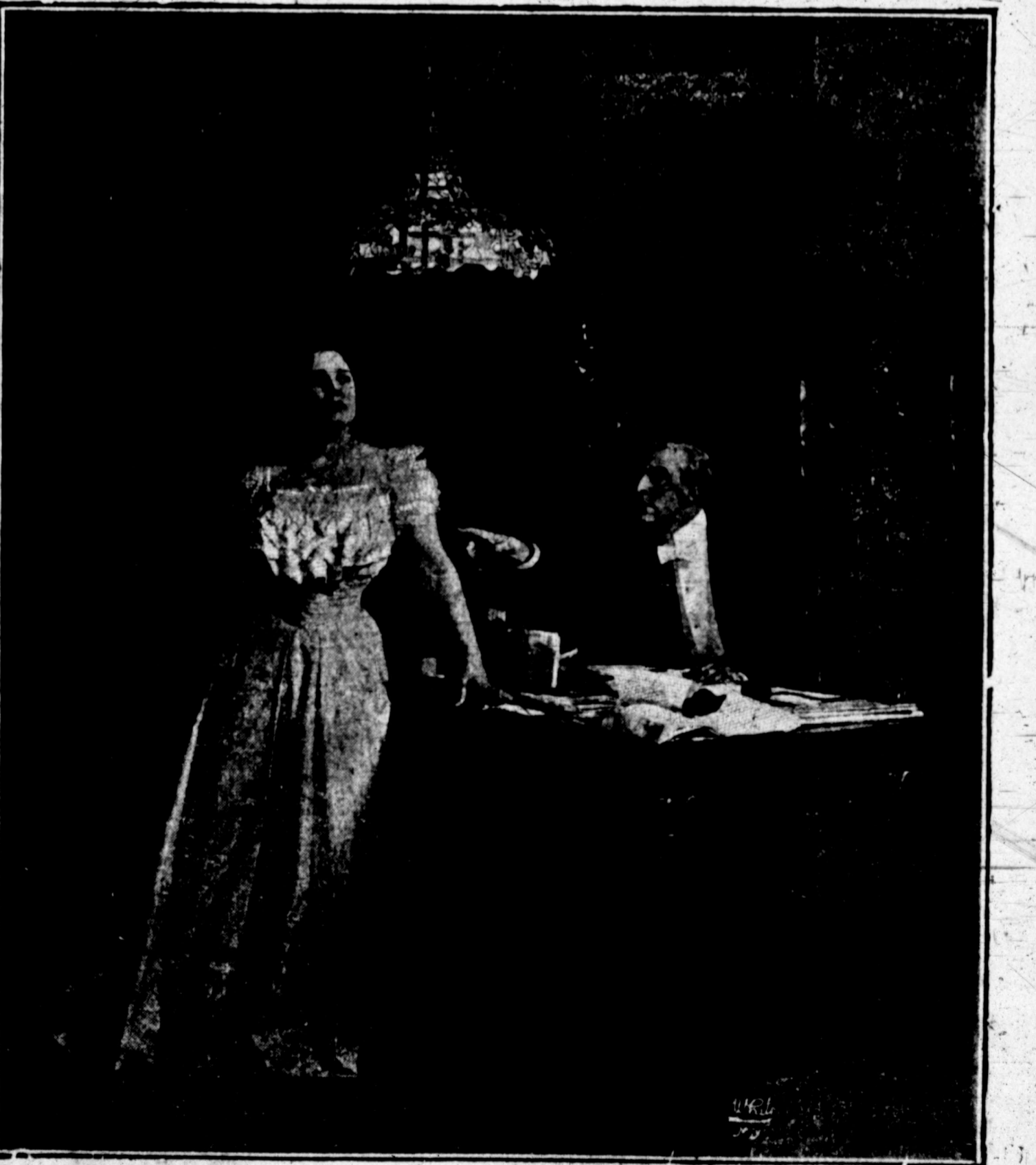
The foreman of the steel gang has arrived and is now engaged in arranging the necessary material, most of which has already arrived and is now on the ground, and attending to other details, all of which will be disposed of as soon as possible in order that the bridge may be completed on schedule time.

It is not thought that much delay will be necessary in rushing the bridge to completion on account of the fact that not only has all of the necessary steel arrived but an efficient gang of workmen, well organized, are now employed by those in charge, and for these reasons it is hoped to be able to open the bridge for traffic even sooner than was at first expected.

**Catholic Young Men's National Union**

Washington, D. C., Oct. 23.—The capital today welcomed several hundred delegates to the thirty-seventh annual convention of the Catholic Young Men's National Union. After attending mass at St. Patrick's Church this morning the delegates marched to Carroll Institute for the initial business session. The afternoon was given over largely to seeing the sights of the city and tomorrow the delegates will make a trip to Mt. Vernon, after completing the business of the convention.

The Catholic Young Men's National Union was organized in 1875, and has branches in all the Eastern and mid-Western States. Its purpose is to establish a club for the young men of each parish under the direction of the pastor. The organization has established a department known as the Catholic Amateur Athletic League, which is affiliated with the Amateur Athletic Union. It has also established a literary committee, which conducts national and sectional essay and elocution contests and debates, a lecture bureau and a literary exchange.

## Stray Topics From Little Old New York

New York, October 21.—The generalist who constructed John D. Rockefeller blundered when he tried to prove that the great oil king was in truth a descendant of real kings. He overshot the mark when, for the sake of earning a royal reward, he attempted to link the humble family of eutonic origin from which the oil king undoubtedly came, with the decadent Pantagenes of England. He neglected to take into consideration the fact that there are other genealogists who are equally clever and having access to the same records, who, not having been consulted in the matter, feel at liberty to subject the findings or alleged findings of their more fortunate competitors to merciless scrutiny and criticism. Under the circumstances it was easy enough to prick the bubble of John D.'s alleged family tree and turn it into a huge joke.

Appropos John D.'s royal ambition, it may be interesting to note that he has quite recently—perhaps since he learned of his august ancestry—adopted a new style of hand-shake. He has always been quite democratic in his intercourse with the members of his hurch and has been in the habit of shaking hands with them before or after the service. His new style of shaking hands is said to be perplexing to his friends who do not quite know what to make of it. Some of his most intimate acquaintances think that it is not a manifestation of the natural reserve of a scion of royalty, which caused Mr. Rockefeller to change his method of shaking hands, but ferely his desire to protect his hands from altogether too vigorous pressure and from any injury to them which would make it impossible for him to play his beloved game of golf.

A tragedy of rather unusual human interest caused considerable stir in the "enement district on Charlott street" Newark, the other day. David Laskowitz, the owner of several tenement houses, visited one of his houses to collect the rent from his tenants. A few days before he had ordered the eviction of one of his tenants, a married man with two children, who was on month behind in the payment of his rent. Charitable neighbors took in the family and a few hours after his removal the patient died. The hard-heartedness of the landlord who had driven a dying man and his poor family out of their home for the sake of a few dollars, had caused considerable hard feeling among the tenants, especially among the women, who sympathized

with the widow and children of the dead consumptive. When Laskowitz arrived at the house, the women surrounded him, calling him "murderer" and "bloodsucker" and threatening him with heaven's vengeance. Laskowitz retreated and slipped quietly away through a side street. He had walked about two blocks, when he felt so weak that he had to sit down on a doorstep. A doctor was called, but when he arrived he found Laskowitz dead from heart disease. The women of the district feel quite certain that Laskowitz's sudden death was the punishment for his hard-heartedness.

One of New York's most interesting landmarks, the old Van Beuren mansion in Fourteenth street, has been dismantled and will be torn down in a few days. The latest occupant was Frederick T. Van Beuren, a son of Col. Henry Van Beuren. In whose lifetime the house was built more than seventy years ago. When the house was built the neighborhood was the fashionable centre of the city. The Van Beuren House, with its pretty garden formed only a small part of the property of the Van Beuren family. They own all the rest of the block to Fifth avenue, and considerable land adjoining. It was originally the Spingler farm, comprising about 22 acres, and was purchased by Henry Spingler in 1788 from John Smith, who bought the tract in 1762 from Elias Brevoort. Spingler sold less than \$5000 for the farm. It included all of the present Union Square which was taken by the city when the streets were cut through. The old Spingler farmhouse stood within the limits of Union Square. Spingler left no sons to inherit his estate and through his only daughter, who married a Van Beuren, the property came into the Van Beuren family.

Borough President McAneny and Commissioner of Accounts Fosdick are working on a plan to improve the appearance of the city by the removal of the big advertising signs which disfigure the fronts and roofs of many buildings in the central business sections of the city, particularly along Broadway. The Borough President is of the opinion that many of the big signs are constructed in violation of the building laws and he is searching for legal authority to declare war upon the big electric and other signs which are so conspicuous along the Great White Way.
