PETITION FOR LOCAL OPTION ELECTION

Proposed High License for Liquor Sell ing, Including Special County Road Fund of \$500.

Oklahoma City, Ok., Oct. 26.-The Oklahoma Local Option League today filed with Secretary of State Harrison copies of the initiative petition which will be circulated for signatures asking an election upon a local option and high license amendment to the Oklahoma Constitution.

The petitions, to be effective, must be signed by 15 per cent of the legal voters of the State based upon the highest vote in the last general election, within ninety days from today.

The proposed amendment has been revised several times. The State license fee is fixed at \$150, the county fee at \$250 and the city of town license is limited to a maximum of \$1,000, making a possible maximum Hoense fee of \$1,900 per annum

FORWARD MOVEMEN

Its Scope' Method and Purposes Outlined by Rev. George W. Truets.

The Men and Religion Forward Movement so far has falled to secure enthusiastic support in Wichita Falls, probably because its purposes and its plans are not sufficiently well known. These well admirably set forth in s address by Rev. Geo. W. Truett at Fort Worth recently and in part his iddress follows:

"The Men and Religion Forward Movement is not an organization, and does not propose to be." Dr. Truett said, "it is simply the laying of emphasis sis upon the work and plan and need for men in the kingdom of God working through the local church. The su-preme thing in the kingdom of God is the local church, and anything that draws away from the local church should not have our co-operation. hall the movement because it dignifies the local church, which is the seat of God's power and glory It is the very emphasis that we have been needing all along, for the chieflest thing in building up the kingdom God is the strengthening of the local church.

"Then this is not a lopsided move-ment. Some other movements have wrought well for a season, but they have been narrow and one-sided in their scope. The Laymen's Missionary movement laid emphasis only upon foreign missions, and while this is a good thing and deserving of the unitlated support of our men, home missions ought to have been emphasized at the same time, along with all sorts of Christian activity. For about a year ninety American cities will receive a week's attention from a team of experts that will conduct a school of methods in various forms of religious work and then leave the follow-up work to the local churches. In this way, it is hoped to reach nearly will of the churches of the country and through the churches reach the individual men.

"Specifically, there are five great aims to be accomplished by the move ment. Greet emphasis will be laid first upon bringing men to Christ and then training them in service. The movement is a nation-wide one and will stress the point that the supreme thing for a man is to be anchored to Jesus Christ for his salvation and then work to bring others to Christ.
