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WILL DRILL WELLS NEAR LAWTON, OKLA

C. D. Cunningham, Representative of Pennsylvania Company Takes Leases There.

A decided and immediate revival in gas and oil fields around Lawton is promised from the fact that oil investors from other fields are invading Lawton daily with the promise of sinking numerous wells within the next few months.

C. D. Cunningham, the representative of a big Pennsylvania company who has been here for the past several weeks looking over the field left today to secure drilling equipment. He has completed the work of securing what leases he required and promises to return within thirty days to set up his rigging.

Mr. Cunningham declared before leaving that he would be able to sink a well to the depth of eighteen hundred feet within forty days after his drillers start. At that depth, he hopes to find gas or oil in commercial quantities.

The Marple well is said to be progressing nicely now and it is hoped that something will break loose in the next few weeks.

R. L. Lunsford, agent for the state school land department in charge of segregated mineral lands, is here today arranging to place state land already segregated on the lease market.

With Mr. Laford, is W. O. Childs, a drilling contractor and oil well operator from the Cleveland, Okla. fields. Mr. Childs is looking over the local field with the intention of securing some leases, and if satisfactory tracts can be secured, will probably sink a number of wells.

The new Cunningham leases are located south and east from the Marple field.

Another new company, whose name is not given out at present, has secured five thousand acres of leases farther south and west and expects to put down wells at once.

Shriners' Tribute to Schley.
Reading, Pa., Oct. 26.—Rajah Temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, this afternoon paid the first public tribute to the late Admiral Schley. Following the memorial exercises the Shriners marched to Penn common and planted a weeping willow tree in memory of the Admiral.

WOMEN MADE ALTUS COUNCIL BACK UP

City Officials Received Order Calling an Election to Vote On Model Pool Hall Ordinance.

Altus, Okla., Oct. 27.—Determined women of Altus, mostly members of the W. C. T. U., ministers and others stormed the city council in a body Tuesday night, and made that body "back up" on an election called to decide whether or not pool and billiard halls should be permitted to operate in the city under a "model ordinance." Upon the proposal of the pool hall men that if the council would initiate the ordinance without a petition the promoters would bear the expense of publication and election, otherwise they would secure a petition of 15 per cent of the voters and initiate an election under the initiative and referendum.

Altogether the pool halls have been twice voted out within the last year; the council accepted the proposition and ordered the election. When the women heard of it, business "picked up." They called a mass meeting, visited the council chamber in a body and after making their representations the council rescinded their action decided that if the election was held it must be initiated by the pool hall men in the regular way.

More than five hundred persons were present and the district court room was crowded.

Taft to Keep Busy in Chicago.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 27.—From the moment when President Taft arrives in Chicago tonight until his departure from the city next Monday afternoon every minute is to be turned to account. His public appearances and his public addresses will be more numerous than in any other city visited on his present transcontinental trip. Among the important ceremonies, conventions and social functions in which he will participate will be meetings of the American Mining Congress and the Chicago Bar Association, the dedication of the new naval training station at North Chicago, the annual dinner of the Chicago Association of Commerce, and the laying of the cornerstone of the new Hamilton Club building. In addition to delivering speeches more or less brief at each of these functions the President is scheduled for addresses at the Chicago Sunday Evening Club and at the luncheon to be given in his honor by the Hamilton Club.

Recent statistics credit New York with 2000 motor trucks, Chicago with 900, Boston with 450, Philadelphia with 400 and Pittsburg with 300.
