KING AND QUEEN TO START FOR DURBAR

GREAT EXPENDITURE OF MONEY AND ENERGY IN PREPARATION FOR VOYAGE TO INDIA.

CHARTER SPECIAL SHIP

During Sea Voyage King Will Be In Communication With London By Wireless Apparatus.

London, Nov. 7.—After several months of strenuous work, accompanied by a tremendous expenditure of money and energy the preparations for the voyage of King George and Queen Mary to the coronation Durbar at Delhi are practically completed. Their Majesties, accompanied by a large suite, will sail this week on the Peninsular & Oriental liner Medina, which has been especially chartered for this purpose and, for the time of the journey converted into an auxiliary of the British Navy.

The Medina, 29,000 tons, is the newest and best equipped liner of the P. & O. Company and has been completely remodeled and re-equipped for this voyage. The ship will be under the command of Capt. Chatfield, Flag Captain of Rear Admiral Sir Colin Keppel, and will be manned and officered by the pick of the British Navy. Four first-class cruisers, including the Cochrane and the Defence, will form the convoy.

The royal suites of cabins are on the spar deck at the forward part of the vessel—the King's being on the port side, the Queen's on the starboard. Each suite comprises a sitting room, a bedroom, a small dressing room, and a bathroom. Both suites are paneled in white throughout, but whereas the carpets and upholstery in the King's apartments are carried

his Majesty's household; the Earl of Shrewsbury, premier Earl of England and a great friend of the King; Lord Stanfortham, private secretary to the King; Lieut. Col. Sir Frederick Ponsonby, equerry and assistant private secretary to the King; Commander Sir R. Havelock Charles, Surgeon to the King, and principal medical officer on the staff of the King and Queen during the visit to India.

The journey will be broken by two stops, one at Malta and the other at Aden. The ultimate port is Bombay and the arrival there is scheduled for December 2. The day of their Majesties' disembarkation will be one of addresses, processions, receptions and banquets, ending with a grand illumination.

During the entire sea voyage the King will remain in constant communication with London by means of a powerful wireless apparatus installed on the Medina. Everything has been done to insure the safety of the King and the Queen, not only on board of ship, but during their sojourn in India. The great coronation Durbar, which will be held in Delhi on December 12, is expected to surpass all previous durbars in magnitude, gorgeousness and attendance, as this is the first time in history that the British rulers will present themselves in person to receive the homage of their people in India. There will be magnificent ceremonies and festivities following the investiture on December 14. Early in January a Court will be held in Calcutta, and by the end of that month the King and Queen are expected back in England again.

The only States which have no form of suffrage for women are Arkansas, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Maine, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri, Texas and Nevada. Even in some of these States the women in the larger cities have been given the right to vote for school commissioners.

The man is now getting back. At any rate, the play that in no matter what respect illustrates the magazine article, must prove of broad interest and no little entertainment.

What To Eat and How to Prepare It.
Some of the old-fashioned breakfast dishes make the elaborate and too often heavy morning meals of today seem foolish and flat by comparison. Take for example this menu of days gone by.

Bacon Crisps.

See that the bacon has at least two stripes of lean and that it does not smell smoky. Trim it and slice it medium thin. Trim in a pan to fry, but do not allow it to become too brown or it will be brittle when it cools sufficiently to eat. Place it around the edge of the platter and place in the warming oven.

Fried Apples.

Four half of the bacon grease into another frying pan, placing the one in which the bacon was fried, aside. Pare and quarter good cooking apples and cut into medium thin slices. Turn the sliced apple into the bacon grease and fry until tender and brown. If they stick to the pan without cooking add a little butter and lard mixed, and a little water.

Eggs in Bacon.

Into the first pan break fresh laid eggs, being careful not to break the yolks. Baste them over the top with the bacon grease while they are frying. Do not cook too hard, and when done lift them gently into the center of the platter with its circle of crisp bacon.

Fruit in season may precede this old-fashioned breakfast. A cup of French drip coffee and a plate of golden brown toast complete the menu, sure to find favor on every table especially when a crisp autumn morning acts as a stimulant to the appetite.

A Full Neck Ahead.

It is claimed there are more laughs in Tim Murphy's offering for this season, "The New Code," than in a farce and more hands than in a melo-drama. Yet its highest pretension is only a comedy but of a fashion that attacks the risibilities from heretofore unexploited viewpoints.

"The New Code" deals largely in unexpected fun—unwinding thirty or more thousand feet of film (talking the parlance of the moving picture shows) that frequently is shown fragmentarily in everyday life and contact, but so far never consecutively behind the footlights.

Funny things are real things after all. The remembrance of something—an individual experience, or observation, is the after ripple that the audience adds to the laugh at the end of a line.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE TEACHER IN CITY

Sheep and Goat Raisers Want Tariff On Wool.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 7.—The Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association purposes fighting free wool and is working now to raise a fund with which to keep a paid attorney in Washington this winter to represent the association in an effort to prevent the passage of a free wool bill or other laws that might affect the future of the wool growing industry. It is pointed out that during the years 1893 to 1897, when wool and mohair were the free list, wool brought such a low price that 50 per cent of the Texas wool growers were forced out of business, and the enormous decrease in the number of sheep amounted to 38 per cent of the sheep stock of Texas during those years.

News From the Oil Fields

A new oil company composed of C. H. Clark, and L. O. Hivick, of this city, and H. Harbin, W. K. Ward and James Langford, of Waxahachie, Texas, hauled timber and commenced the erection of a derrick in the northwest corner of section 10 which belongs to Fisher and Newby. The location is one mile southeast and adjoins the east side of section on the south and Douglas on the east. L. C. Hivick, who will do the drilling for the new company, is one of the most successful drillers in the Electra field and has done most of the contracting for the Red River Oil Co.—Electra News.

Another development of great importance in the Electra field during the past few days has been the finding of oil in Red River No. 1 on the Allen lease on the west side of the field. This well is said to be good for from 150 to 200 barrels per day in the 950 foot sand. From this well to the Benson Little well on the east side of the field the distance is more than three miles. It is believed that pay production will be found in the shallow sands entirely across this area.

A large number of the oil men making their headquarters here have gone to Moran about one hundred miles south of here, where it is reported that the Producers Company is getting ready to bring in a third gas well. Two big gas producers have already been brought in in that section and a number of wells are being drilled.

OIL COMPANY WILL BE ORGANIZED THURSDAY

A stock company is being organized by local capitalists to drill three wells 7 1/2 miles east of town, on the Davis ranch, where experienced oil men say that the indications are unusually good. Fifteen thousand dollars is the amount with which the company will begin business, and one-third of this sum has been subscribed for by Louis Solinsky, an experienced driller and oil man from the Beaumont field. The remainder of the stock has already been taken over by local capitalists, and work on the location of the first derrick will probably begin next Monday, when material will be hauled to the scene of operations. A location for the first well has already been made.

TRAGEDY AT ABILENE SIGN PAINTER KILLED

Abilene, Texas, Nov. 7.—Ernest Miller, a sign painter, was shot and killed here last night about 9 o'clock, near his paint shop, on North First street. Last night eight shots were heard from Miller's place of business. Chief of Police J. J. Clinton and Policeman M. M. Newton and Ben Lister hurried to the scene. He defied the officers and shot several times. Chief Clinton fired once thinking to scare and subdue him, but without having that result, he fired again and the shot took effect in the right side, passing through both lungs and emerging near the left shoulder blade. Death resulted almost instantly from hemorrhage. The deceased lived alone in the back end of his paint shop. He was a German and had served in both the German and United States armies. He was about 65 years of age and drew a pension. Among other relatives he leaves two sons, one, Ed, whose address is said to be Harlem, Montana, and the other, William, who lives at Russell, Minn. Statistics on Liquor Consumption

More beer is consumed in the United States than in any other country of the world, according to a bulletin issued by the bureau of statistics of the Department of Commerce and Labor, and more distilled spirits than in any other country except Russia. The quantity per capita consumed in the United States is not, however, in the case of beer, as great as in Belgium, United Kingdom, Germany, or Denmark, while our per capita consumption of distilled spirits is less than that of Denmark, Hungary, Austria, France, Netherlands, or Sweden. Of wines, the quantity consumed in the United States is below that of Portugal, Spain, Germany, Italy, or France; and the per capita consumption is less than that of France, Italy, Portugal, Spain, Switzerland, Austria, or Hungary.

The quantity of malt liquors consumed in the United States in 1910 was 1851 million gallons, against 1,704 million in Germany and 1,397 million in the United Kingdom, that of Austria being 493 million, Belgium 12 million, France 376 million, and Russia 231 million gallons. Of spirits he quantity consumed in the United States was 133 1/2 million proof gallons, against 232 2/3 million in Russia, the per capita being in each case 1.45 gallons, against a little less than 1 gallon in the United Kingdom. The quantity of beer per capita consumed in the United States was, in 1910, 20.09 gallons, against 31.44 gallons in Germany. In the consumption of wines France leads the world 1,541 million gallons, or 39.36 gallons per capita in 1909. Italy in that year consumed 31.17 gallons per capita; Portugal, 27.39 gallons; Switzerland, 14.55 gallons, and the United States, in 1910, only 6.66 gallon per capita. Comparatively little beer is consumed in Italy, Roumania, Serbia and Russia; less than 2 gallons per capita annually, as against 20 gallons in the United States, 26 1/2 gallons in Germany, and 31 1/2 gallons in the United Kingdom. The principal countries in which wine consumption averaged less than one gallon per capita in the latest available year include Netherlands, the United Kingdom, Canada, Newfoundland, New Zealand, and the United States.

HUNTING SEASON IS

from Pennsylvania to New Mexico, where the hunting of wild turkeys is a feature, the season opens in November.

"Eight northern states which offer deer hunting, Vermont, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Wisconsin, Minnesota and North and South Dakota open seasons in November, varying from five days to a month in length, and in the South deer hunting begins this month in Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas.

"October witnessed the opening of the ruffed grouse season in most of the states still affording good shooting, at Pennsylvania, where an unusually abundant supply is reported this year, opened its season on November 1.

"The shooting of waterfowl has been in progress throughout most of the United States for one or two months, but two important ducking centers of the East, the Susquehanna Flats, at the head of Chesapeake Bay, Maryland and Currituck Sound, North Carolina, have been closed to duck hunters until this month. Duck shooting on the waters of New Jersey also opens in November.

"The hunting of black bears is not a general form of sport and in a few states bounties are paid for their destruction. Several states, however, remain the bear on the game list, with a fixed hunting season, and three of these in which bear hunting is still a prominent sport, viz., Michigan, Louisiana and Mississippi, open their bear seasons in November.

"November witnesses also the closing of some important seasons. By the end of the month deer hunting is over in the north except in Maine and New Hampshire. It may be followed in the south for additional periods varying from one month in Louisiana and Texas to three months in Mississippi. In New York and everywhere in the west the deer season is closed by the beginning of November. By the last of the month the prairie chicken season is over in every state in which these birds may yet be shot; and woodcock shooting has ended in all northern states in which woodcock may yet be found in comparatively large numbers, though in the south the season continues open."

(Recipe by Mrs. Mary J. Lincoln)
Mix four cups sifted pastry flour, one level-teaspoon soda, two level-teaspoons mixed flavors (except cloves), one-fourth level-teaspoon salt and two cups seeded and quartered raisins. TEXAS G.O.P. DELEGATION MAY GO UNINSTRUCTED

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 7.—An uninstructed delegation from Texas to the Republican national convention next year is believed by some of the leading Republicans of the state to be the wish of Cecil A. Lyon, the recognized "boss" of the regular Republican organization in the state, and chairman of the state Republican executive committee. Col. Lyon is at present on a hunt in his ranch in Mexico, but when he returns is expected to make his wishes known.

It is said Chairman Lyon came near breaking with President Taft a year ago, but a truce was arranged. Announcement from him that he wishes an uninstructed delegation will worry every one of Taft's appointees in Texas, who, unwilling to oppose his desires actively and openly, are just as unwilling to attend a national convention of their party, without standing vociferously for the re-nomination of President Taft.

The activity of the LaFollette campaign bureau and the arguments emanating from that source are causing considerable uneasiness among the Republicans in Texas that wish to see President Taft re-nominated.

P. J. Boyle is now serving his fourth term as mayor of Newport, R. I., and is a candidate for re-election.

How to Get Rid of Chicken Ticks

Wilmom Newell, State Entomologist of Texas, at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, College Station, Texas, has issued the following special bulletin:

The "Blue Bug" is prevalent in some parts of Texas, and is a source of much annoyance and loss to poultry owners. Where the tick is present, a continuance of successful and profitable poultry culture is dependent on the poultry owner eradicating or keeping under control, this pest.

The "Blue Bug" is more ordinarily spoken of as the chicken tick. Its Latin name is "Argas miniatus." The tick infests the chicken houses and roosts and comes out and attacks the chickens while they are roosting at night. It is a severe pest and its eradication calls for persistent, thorough work.

The habit which the ticks have of saving the chicken and storing themselves away for the day can be shown advantage of by the construction of roosts, within the henhouse into which the ticks cannot get. This kind of roosts furnish only temporary relief; it is necessary to have tick proof roosts as well as to take measures which will destroy the ticks themselves. It would proceed as follows in the case of infested hen houses:

First of all, remove all roosts and nesting boxes from the building. Clean out all manure, litter, straw, etc., as well as straw in the nests and burn it. If the roosts and nesting boxes are old and of little value would burn them also. If however it is necessary to use the old boxes and roosts again, spray them with Beaumont oil or with kerosene oil.

After cleaning out the henhouse thoroughly, spray the cracks and corners with kerosene. For this purpose a good spray pump is desirable and plenty of kerosene should be gotten into the cracks where the ticks are hiding.

Next construct a roost or perch made in the form of a framework, so that it can be removed from the building at any time. Suspend this framework porch by smooth wires from the top of the building, being careful that the framework does not touch the sides or floor. This is important, for the tick will not crawl along the smooth wire. Wire the top of that used in baling hay, or mallet, should be used and it should be rusty.

Prof. W. D. Hunter, of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Bureau of Entomology, strongly recommends the use of "tick proof" houses in localities where "Blue Bug" is prevalent. These can be made entirely of iron, malleable iron being used for posts and rafters, bolted or riveted together, and the roof and sides covered with corrugated iron. The floor should be of concrete, or even of clay, firmly packed and tamped. In such a building the ticks could be easily destroyed by using an ordinary gasoline plumber's torch and directing the flame into all cracks and corners.

Fumigation of henhouses is not usually practical. A very strong gas is required for destruction of the ticks and the average henhouses cannot be made gas-tight. Parties who do not have the blue bug among their flocks, or who have cleared their premises of the pest, should be careful not to secure fowls from flocks where the blue bug occurs. It is safest when securing chickens from elsewhere, to keep them in a quarantine pen, by themselves until one is sure that they are not infested by the ticks.

It should perhaps be added that, after spraying the interior of the poultry house with kerosene as suggested above, plenty of ventilation should be allowed for a few days, so that the odor of the kerosene will not be annoying to the fowls at night.

If the above measures are followed out persistently and carefully, there

Tippacaw Centennial. Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 5.—On the banks of the Wabash river, about seven miles up the stream from the site of the present city of Lafayette, there was fought one hundred years ago today the celebrated battle of Tippacaw, which furnished one of the most thrilling chapters in American history. In the historic conflict Gen. William Henry Harrison and his little frontier army administered a crushing defeat to the hostile Shawnee Indians led by their able and celebrated chief, Tecumseh. Today the centennial was celebrated with a pageant and historic exercises held on the battlefield, which is a State reservation and where an imposing monument commemorating the battle was erected several years ago. Texas Senator Greets His Friends at Capital.

Austin, Texas, Nov. 7.—Just to shake hands with his many friends here and to attend to some private business, United States Senator C. A. Culberson of Dallas, senior Texas representative in the upper branch of congress, came to Austin yesterday, remaining here last night. He had planned to go to San Antonio, but a late train caused him to change his mind about leaving yesterday evening. In the morning he will determine whether he will journey on to San Antonio or go to Houston, as he had intended to do from San Antonio.

Senator Culberson is hale and hearty and has recovered entirely from his recent illness to the gratification of his friends, whom he has been busy greeting since he came back to Texas after the close of congress.

"Just say I am here socially or better, don't even say that," he remarked, when asked what he was up to. He absolutely refused to discuss politics, saying that he did not know that there was such a thing. In a few minutes however, Chairman Mayfield of the railroad commission, Secretary McLean, also of that body; R. W. Finley and other friends gathered about him and led him from the path that he has chosen—the social path. He forgot himself just long enough to say that he was opposed to life tenure in office; that he favored a presidential primary for Texas, and that of the candidates for the Democratic nomination for President now in the arena, he preferred Woodrow Wilson. Also he said that before long he was going to make a speech on the initiative, referendum and recall.
