## HOUSE FAVORS **ABROGATION**

NATION OF RUSSO-AMERICAN PACT IS PASSED.

Debate Bristles with Charges That Russia's Attitude is Affront to United States

Washington, D. C., Dec. 14 .- The Sulzer joint resolution for the termination of the treaty of 1832 beween the United States and Russia because of the latter's discrimination against Jewish American citizens, passed the House last night, 300 to 1. The one negative vote was cast by Representative Malthy of New

York. A practically identical resolution by Senator Culberson of Texas is pending in the Senate. Both the Sulzer and Culberson resolutions would direct the President to immediately give Russia the year's notice necessary for the complete abrogation of the treaty that has been in force

nearly eighty years. An attempt was made by Representative Olmstead of Pennsylvania to modify the Sulzer resolution so as to avoid making the direct charge that Russia has violated the treaty in refusing to recognize the passports of American Jews, was defeated 184 to 115. Prominent Republicans declared that the House should not go on record as charging a violation of the treaty, but should adopt langauge stating that Russia has so construed the treaty that the United States

could no longer be a party to it. "The sentiments announced here yesterday," declared Republican Leader Mann, "are such that if they were uttered in another parliamentary body, they might bring such resent-

Mr. Mann added that if the United against races was a vigilation of a treaty it might weaken its own attitude toward the exclusion of Orien

The debate in the House bristled with charges that Russia's attitude was an offense against the United States and that her exclusion of American Jews who bore properly certified passports was an affront to this Government, Representative Mcshall have a certain experience as a Call of Massachusetts said the matter ought not to be acted upon by the House until it had been submitted to arbitration between the two countries. Representative Longworth of Ohio insisted that "the time for arbitration has gone by and the time

for action has come." "This ought not to be considered in any way an affront to Russia," said Mr. Longworth. "The United States desires the friendship of Russia, but this question is above and beyond friendship; it is a question of National honor."

Mr. Mann endeavored to have the joint resolution amended so as to secure the American right to discriminate against Orientals. All amend ments were overwhelmingly beaten.

The resolution passed declares that the Governmen of the United States will not be a party to any treaty which discriminates, or which by one of the parties thereto is so construed as to discriminate, between American citizens on the ground of

religion," and adds: "The Government of Russia has violated the treaty between the United States and Russia, concluded at the St. Petersburg, December 18, 1832, refusing to honor Amrican passports duly issued to American citizens on account of race and religion; and in the judgment of the Congress the said treaty for the reaons aforesaid, ought to be terminated at the

> The flockmasters believe that the vool growing industry in the United States has reached a critical stage of its existence and they have come o the convention prepared for exaustive discussion and vigorous action. Schedule "K" and the report of he tariff board will be the leading subjects of consideration. A vast ar ray of statistics will be offered to thow that the sheepmen are not responsible for the present high prices of clothing and other wool products On the contrary, it is declared that they have not been making any mony for several years. For the past ear, it is stated, the wool men have sctually lost money, because the manufacturers, as a result of the ariff agitation, would not buy except on a free trade basis.

The convention will demand that he American wool growers be given hat degree of protection which isepresented in the difference in the ost of producing a pound of wool in he United States and in foreign countries. The association believes that the importance of the industry ustifies its protection at the hands of Congress. Attention is called to he fact that nineteen per cent of the people of Wyoming are dependent on he wool growing industry. In Missouri there are 54,000 wool growers, 12,000 in Iowa and large numbers in numerous other States.
