# Three wheeler wreck harms girl

A 14 - year - old Amarillo girl remained in serious condition at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo Wednesday morning from injuries she received when the three wheeler she was driving collided with a pickup truck 2 miles south of Nazareth Tuesday morning.

Krista Ehly, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Ehly of Amarillo was taken to Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt and was later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital where she was treated for multiple broken bones and injuries.

According to DPS Trooper Nick

Hand, Ehly was operating the three wheeler in front of her grandparents' home, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Huseman of Nazareth.

While attempting to maneuver the three wheeler from the driveway of her grandparents' home onto a county dirt road, Ehly lost control of the vehicle and swerved into the path of an oncoming pickup driven by Gerald Birkenfeld of Nazareth.

The pickup was traveling west on the county road when the accident occurred.

# County to help buy drug testing system

Castro County commissioners voted to join with Hale and Swisher counties in the purchase of an Emit st portable drug. detection system to be used in all three counties.

Jean Sterns proposed the system purchase citing that it would save the probation department considerable time and expense. At present, in order to conduct a drug test on a probationer, they must be taken to Central Plains Hospital in Plainview, and each test costs \$65.

With this portable testing system, Sterns said tests could be performed at the probation offices at a cost of \$18.63 per test. The tests they will be running will detect alcohol, cocaine, amphetamines, opiates and cannabinoid (marijuana). A test strictly to detect marijuana would cost only \$4.03 per test.

The Probation Department plans to charge a minimum fee of \$10 to each probationer they run the full test on. This fee will help defray the cost of supplies

The total cost of the detection system is \$4,880. Castro County

will pay \$780.80 of that amount representing 16% of the total. Swisher County will pay 19% of the cost and Hale County will pay 65% of the cost.

And, what's even more difficult, you have to mend the broken hearts and shattered feelings that go along with the broken dolls and shattered



# Boulter and specialists speak on supercollider

conducting supercollider in a town meeting held in Happy last Friday night.

"I guess the biggest hurdle to when Amarillo and the Panhandle made it on the list of two to be proposed to the Department of Energy," Boulter told the crowd of about 200.

The other Texas location being proposed is a site in Ellis County outside of Dallas. The Panhandle site and the Ellis County site were the two chosen last May to represent Texas in competition with at least 41 other states.

Boulter said the two things which had made it possible for the Texas Panhandle to progress this far in the race for the SSC were the areas people who had vision and were willing to sacrifice and the God given natural resources of the region.

shifting to Washington now, according to Boulter. The application will be submitted to the DOE by no later than Sept. 2. The deadline had been Aug. 3, but the DOE has extended it by 30 days. Boulter said he wished the date hadn't been changed, but he didn't feel the delay would be a setback for the Panhandle at all.

Boulter and members of the getting the SSC was leaped over Amarillo superconducting supercollider group detailed the steps ahead in the site selection process and answered questions about the effects the SSC would have if it were located in the Panhandle.

Larry Milner, president of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, told those present what the SSC could mean to the area. He said if the site near Happy, about 30 miles south of Amarillo, is chosen, the high-energy atom smasher would net an estimated 10,500 construction jobs, 3,000 long-term scientific jobs and \$270 million annual operating budget linked with the SSC

Milner said all 174 property owners whose land would be involved in the project have signed an agreement that says The battle for this site is they are interested in working with them on this program.

At present, the size of the proposed SSC ring will be 53 miles, according to Milner. However, if a different type of magnets are used, the size could go to 100 miles which would be to our advantage, Milner added.

"We're one of the few sites in the United States that could handle the entire 100 miles," he said.

Jack Jones, a consulting engineer on the Panhandle project,

that, in all probability, the land not needed for buildings would be leased to the original landowner or anyone else who wants to lease the property.

Jones also said water is availble for the supercollider from the Santa Rosa and Ogalala Aquifers, as well as, treated water from the cities of Canyon and Hereford. It is estimated that the supercollider will use 2200 gallons of water per minute, but Jones did not feel the water use would be a problem.

The life of the supercollider project after construction will be 25 years and what will happen to the site after that time has not been decided. The Soviet Union is currently constructing a suppercollider ring at a location 80 miles south of Moscow.

Specialists at the meeting said the benefits of technology gained from the SSC are not fully known, but the posibilities are endless.

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

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### Social Security in Castro County

By TERRY J. CLEMENTS

Occasionally people ask if it's possible for a person to get Social Security while in jail. The situation usually arises when the worker has been charged with a felony and Social Security retirement or disability payments are the family's

In general, the Social Security law prohibits the payment of benefits to people imprisoned for the conviction of a felony. These include childhood disability beneficiaries as well as people receiving other types of benefits under the Social Security retirement, disability, or survivors insurance pro-

However, benefits may continue to be paid to any family members receiving benefits on the prisoner's Social Security earnings record. And the prisoner's benefit may begin again with the first full month after release from prison if he or she is otherwise entitled to benefits.

# Correction

The only exception to the prohibition against the payment of benefits to prisoners is if the person is entitled to benefits on the basis of a disability and is actively engaged in a vocational rehabilitation program approved by a court of law. The program must be expected to result in the person's being able to do substantial gainful work within a reasonable time after release.

A crime is considered a felony if

it is defined as such under applicable State law. In legal jurisdictions which do not use the term felony, a crime shall be considered a felony if the sentence exceeds a year.

The present prohibition is a result of legislation enacted in 1980 and 1983. Before 1980, Social Security benefits were paid to people imprisoned for a felony on the basis that the benefits were an earned right that could not be taken away under existing law.

# Conservation tillage increasing in Texas

Conservation tillage is gaining gradual acceptance by Texas farmers, with about 14 percent of the state's cultivated land now under this practice, according to Dr. Billy

Harris, a soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said the trend toward conservation tillage in Texas "is up."

There are approximately 30 million acres under cultivation in Texas this year and about 86 percent of that is under conventional tillage methods, he noted.

In 1974, only a little over a million acres were farmed with the conservation tillage, but that amount has risen to four million acres, Harris said.

Conservation tillage has great potential for areas in Texas with wind and water erosion problems, he pointed out.

Researchers and farmers have been experimenting with the practice and found that it does work well in grain sorghum, corn, cotton, soybeans and even peanuts. Some vegetable production in the state's Rio Grande Valley region is under conservation tillage, Harris said.

There are, however, some drawbacks to the practice, he said.

Specialized planting equipment is required and some crops don't grow well under this practice, since timing is important.

Weed control is another problem that researchers are having to tackle, Harris said. Weeds can multiply easily in some fields under conservation tillage and herbicide effectiveness varies with the region of the state and weather conditions, he said.

Attitudes toward this fairly new practice also will have to change before it finds acceptance, Harris added. Landowners may not want to see their leased land under conservation tillage and bankers are cautious about a practice they feel is not "proven."

Additionally, it is "almost a religion" with farmers to have rows clean and free of stubble in fields, he noted.
