

In the case of the cigarette tester, the tobacco companies are willing and eager to bear all costs. There is nothing at stake, and it is freely admitted that the selection could be more easily made if the tester had his eyes wide open and could read the labels.

In the case of the shopper, she pays all expenses herself; scorns the use of eye-sight to recognize standard labels and has to pay for, carry home and use the product foisted upon her before she has a recognition of her selection.

Do not permit any salesman to deliberately blindfold you in your purchasing by his idle claims of "just as good and cheaper." If it's not more than "just as good," why not stay with your original selection? How can you tell whether or not it is cheaper, if you do not know what it is, how it is made or who made it?


