Pickering Lumber Sales Company To Celebrate Twelfth Year in Ranger During Coming Week

This week the Pickering Lumber Sales company will celebrate its twelfth anniversary in Ranger and Calvin Brown will celebrate his fourth year with the company. In that time the district of Ranger and this trade territory has seen a substantial growth of the organization and has seen a company that has served in every case. During the rush days of the oil development, the Pickering Lumber Sales company did a large volume of business in oil supplies. And when those days began to subside, the company went right ahead serving the community. Today one can find one of the most complete lines of building materials in the district, including cement and sand for the foundation of a home, the lumber to erect that home, shingles for the roof and brick and mortar for the chimney.
"When I came here," Mr. Brown said, "we had a yard and an office that looked about like a lumber office was supposed to look in the old days of a boom town. But through co-operation we modernized the place, spread some paint around over things and it has a different look today."
The office of the Pickering Lumber Sales company is an inviting place. The building stands at the end of Main street where Railroad avenue carries the highway off to the left as you go out of Ranger. Large windows let in lots of day light and the neat paint on the side walls gives the place the appearance of having been the demonstration place of a "paint-up" campaign.
"Speaking of paint," Mr. Brown said, "we use the outside of the building as an advertisement for what we carry inside. We made over the building, almost, and the major operation was paint."
"True's 100 Per Cent Liquid Paint" is the brand handled by this firm. It is a paint that has been made of all the old familiar things that everyone knows should be in paint. The foundation, of course is white lead. Here is the formula: White lead, 34 per cent; zinc oxide, 34 per cent; linseed oil, 28 per cent; turpentine and dryer, 4 per cent.
"It has only been in recent years that this company went into the paint business in a big way," Brown said. "Paint was handled as just a necessary commodity. It was handled as sort of a side line. It was plain to see this was not efficient, for paint in Eastland county is a rather rare object. There is much room for paint all through the territory, so I decided to make room for it in the business."
"The way we were situated there was no place for it so we bought a building. We took over a store building and got our paint together on shelves so it could be displayed. We carry one brand and it is the best we can buy for the money."
The shelves that carry the paint are bright looking and the paint on these shelves when spread out will brighten up anything it touches. The white lead base is the foundation of all paints sold by this company. When various colors and blends are added, the white lead loses its identity and any color of the rainbow can be reproduced in a lasting covering. "A new house should have three coats," Mr. Brown said, "and money will be saved on it. A house unpainted will deteriorate as much as 10 per cent a year. A good three-coat job will last 10 years, if necessary. And when a house is painted right in the first place and then recoated once in two, three or four years, it will last almost indefinitely."
"An old house that has never been painted can be fixed up with a coat of paint until it will improve in appearance 100 per cent and more. When houses are put up for sale, the painted house will bring more on the market than the cost of the paint, when it is compared to a similar house that is not painted."
All the needs of the builder can be found under the wide sheds of the Pickering Lumber Sales company. If, by chance, the thing wanted is not just as hand it is sure to be found in either one of the two warehouses the company owns in Ranger. This is a fact for Mr. Brown knows the community and the needs of the trade here and he always has plenty of supplies on hand.
In studying the agricultural needs of the community, Mr. Brown found that farm buildings were not up to the standard they should be in a section with such undeveloped farm potentialities. Not being a farm building architect, Mr. Brown cast about to find where he could get the best information possible. So he took himself off to the state A. & M. college where he enrolled in the short course on modernizing and construction of farm buildings. When he finished that course he saw where he had been missing many opportunities in the past.
"I found that we were way shy on many of the simple farm equipment that goes to save labor and money," Mr. Brown said. "Self feeders were one of the many things we had 'everything else except.' The chickens for the most part were fed on the ground. Hogs had their feed thrown to them. Creep feeders for calves were few and far between, so I went about getting plans. I did not try to draw up plans and estimates and specifications myself. I sent back to the A. & M. college for them. They co-operated and I have now all the newest and latest plans for all sorts of farm buildings."
"One of the things I learned during the short course I have attended was the money saved in caring for sheep and goats in winter months. Goats are becoming an important factor in local agriculture and stock raising. When they are allowed to run without shelter in the winter, the danger of loss is great. When they have an inexpensive wind break and shed, the chances for loss are greatly reduced. A goat, when its hair is wet, chills easily. They are subject to pneumonia and other death dealing diseases."
Hog and chicken feeders can be made at very little cost. They can be filled once a day and less feed is wasted. Besides, the labor they save makes farming more fun.
The plans in the possession of Mr. Brown include everything from these simple feed saving troughs to dairy barns and farmhouses. He renders this service to builders free and his advice and time is worth money.
Besides the building materials and supplies, Mr. Brown has in the sheds a full line of American fencing. This fencing is to fill any requirement. Native cedar posts are there to be had in any quantity, as are the bois d'arc posts, which, in case you are not "up-town" in these fancy names, is just plain old Kansas hedge or Osage orange, a hard wood that is fast disappearing in sections where it was set out in the early days and where, now it is being condemned as "good for nothing but posts."
Large Wool Crop Forecast For 1931
By United Press.
WASHINGTON.—This year's production of wool is expected to surpass last year's because of the increased stock and more favorable weather conditions, the bureau of agricultural economics here announced, but the world's wool crop is expected to be smaller. This, it was pointed out, will increase the value of domestic wool clips.
Wool production in the southern hemisphere fell off from its abnormally large supply of last year and is now just below normal, the bureau said. The wool production of the British possessions continues slightly above normal.
