WHY TITLE TO STREETS AND ALLEYS?

Governor Sterling vetoed house bill 1011, which would have permitted independent school districts by right of eminent domain to acquire title to streets and alleys. In his veto message the governor shot straight from the shoulder He said: "This bill would empower any independent school district in Texas, by the exercise of the right of eminent domain to acquire for school purposes the fee simple title to any street or alley abutting upon its property and give the district the further power to close to public use and travel the public ways so acquired. I am of the opinion that the powers conferred upon the trustees of the independent school districts of Texas by this measure embraces more authority than should reasonably be vested in them." And that's that.

A JOKER IN THE REGULATION BILL.

Correspondents have discovered a joker in a bill signed by Governor Sterling. It is the measure which provides incorporated cities with a population as small as 200 are empowered to regulate rates charged by water, light, gas and sewage companies. According to the very veracious correspondents this was a house bill and the record showed no amendments added in the senate but the bill as signed had "telephone" inserted between gas and light companies. Was a house member responsible for the insertion or addition after its passage by the house and before it was sent to the senate? Of course, no member of the third house would have been guilty of the innovation or addition of a public utility facing rate regulation.



Long-Sought "Thrill-Slayer" Seized



Pictured above is the end of a six-year search for Phillip Knox Knapp, former Cornell University student and member of a prominent Syracuse family, who has confessed that he committed a murder "just for the thrill." Knapp, shown in custody of officers who seized him at his West Orange, N. J., home, had married and lived unmolested under the name of Allen K. Phillips. Shortly after he deserted the army in 1925, leaving a note indicating he had considered the "supreme thrill" of taking a human life, the body of his victim, Louis Panella, a taxi driver, was found.

Naval Officers Cite Need For Plane Carrier

United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS .- Modern navies, under the scathing fire of bombing

planes, will have no more chance than a rabbit before the gun of an awerage hunter, according to a certain school of thought in the French Navy.

Under the pressure of these naval officers, the Ministry of Marine, the United Press understands, is soon asking the Chamber of Deputies to appropriate sufficient credits for the construction of two 17,000 tons airplane carriers. A former officer of the French Navy, M. Pierre Le Cour Grand-

maison, recently pointed out that on water, as well as land, the next war will be won by the nation pos-sessing the strongest air ficet. Even the fastest cruiser, he said, would not be able to escape the deadly fire of the new bombing and canno-carrying airplanes.

Cites Planes' Use

His answer to this threat is to

make the navy air-proof by pro-viding sufficient airplane carriers and airplanes to fight off any aerial attack. Smoke screens and anti-airclaft guns will be of no use, he declares. Airplanes can only be fought with airplanes, and once the enemy's naval air pro-tection is broken the fleet is at the mercy of the attacker. France's battleships cannot av-erage more than 15 knots an hour,



Vatican City To Have Own General Store

VATICAN CITY.—The Papal state is shortly to have its own commissariat department or central store for the supply of foodstuffs of common use. The sales will be made direct by the Vatican to its 500 citizens, and prices will be cheaper than in Rome, as the pontifical state will pay no custom or other duties to the Italian government.

Bread, macaroni, grocers' goods, fruit and vegetables will be on sale every day in the "Annona" or foodstuffs palace specially built for the purpose in Vatican City.

Produce Locally Grown.

A certain proportion of the fruit and vegetables on sale will come from the papal villa at Castelgandens of which are developed for the purpose of securing a plentiful supply of garden produce for the inhabitants of Vatican City.

Fish and meat also will be on sale, and will be kept in special cold storage plant recently installed for the purpose. Cloths, shoes, linen, hosiery and a number of dry

Ouly Citizens Can Buy.

The prelates of Vatican City will be able to obtain cassocks, clerical hats, and even such common necessities as shirts and collars by ordering them at the Vatican store.

Merchandise will not be available for persons who are not citizens of the Vatican City state. The store will open some time this month and probably will be inaugurated by the pope himself.
