Primary runoff on tap Saturday

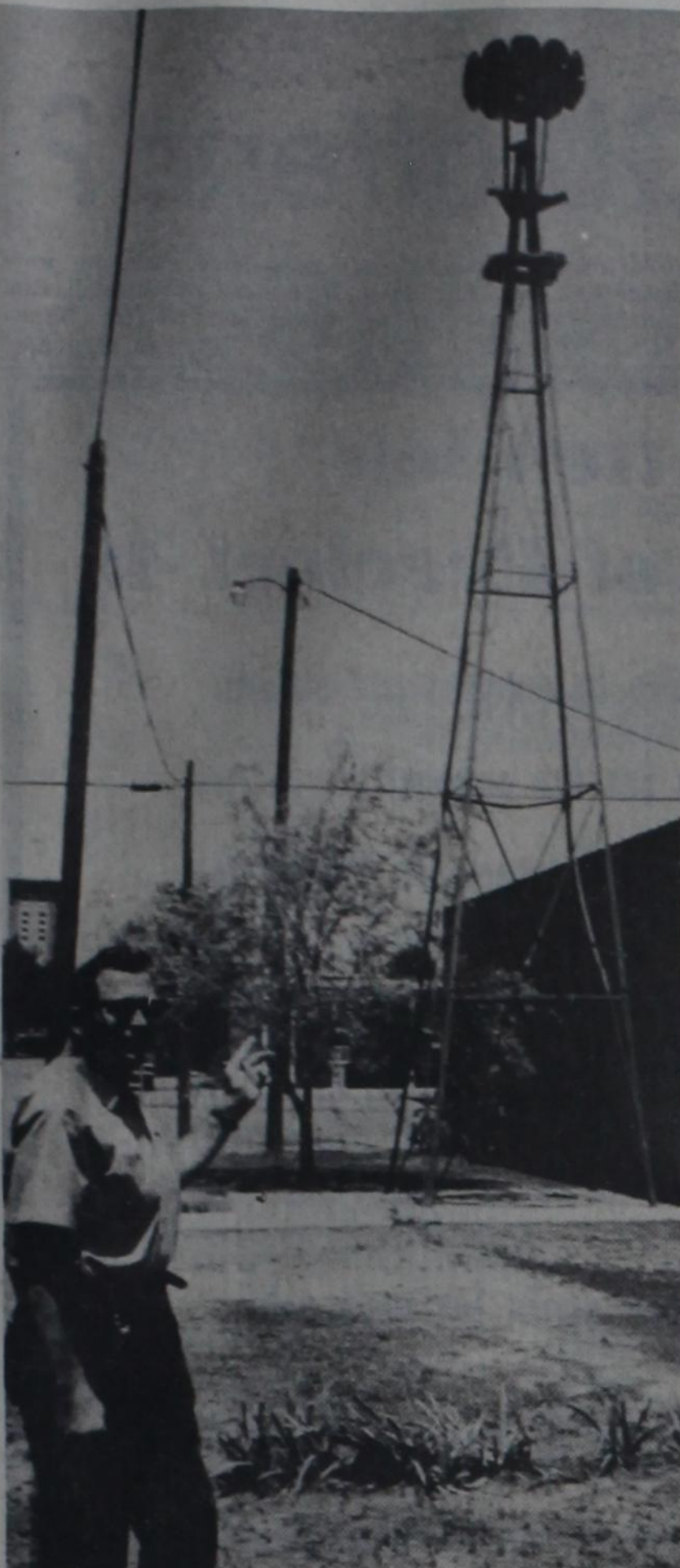
The Democratic Primary runoff election will be held Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The only local election going into a runoff is in the Commissioners' Precinct 4, where Thomas Falcon of Dimmitt and Vincent Guggemos of Nazareth will face each other. Also included in the election will be runoffs for attorney general between Mattox and John Hanley; land commissioner, between Nelson and Garry Mao; Criminal Appeals Court Precinct 1, John Humphreys and Charles Campbell Jr.; and Criminal Appeals Court Precinct 2, Bill Black and Chuck Miller.

Residents of Commissioners' Precinct 1 will vote at the Farmers State Bank of Hart. Those living in Commissioners' Precinct 2 will vote in the basement of the county courthouse.

Precinct 3 residents will go to either the District courtroom of the courthouse or to the Frio Church kitchen.

Those living in Precinct 4 will vote on state election runoffs and the local commissioner runoff. The boxes will be located in the JP-Probation office of the courthouse, Rachel Hunter's home, the Nazareth High School home-making dept., and the Arney community building.

Nazareth finally has warning system

The City of Nazareth now has a warning siren in operation. Located on the west side of the fire house, the tower is 45 feet tall. The siren can be heard for a quarter of a mile in any direction. A storm or civil defense signal will be a two minute solid warning. The all clear signal given after a storm or civil defense warning will be 30 seconds on and 30 seconds off.

Saturday is election day again, and unless folks aren't careful it is apt to slip by with a very light vote being cast. Very little interest has been shown or generated in the second primary. The republicans settled their nominating process in the first primary, but the democrats have a few races that were forced into the run-off primary coming up Saturday. A public office are important, and even though only a few are being involved in the second primary election they deserve the attention of the electorate. John Hinnah and Jim Mattox are staging a campaign for the office of Attorney General. This is an important office and apparently there is a considerable difference in the qualifications and type of man represented in the candidates for office. Mattox has conducted an abrasive campaign that has turned many voters off, and according to his credentials fail to represent his election to that office. Based on experience and record he seems to be well qualified to represent the attorney general. He has the endorsement and support of former Senator Sherman. Sherman is a candidate for the office in the first primary. Dan Kubiak and George Snelson, defeated candidates for office of Commissioner of General Land Office, have both endorsed the candidacy of Garry Mauro over that of Vincent Snelson. I think they are right. I will take their advice and support [See DIMMITT, Page 12]

A fire signal is 8 seconds on and 4 seconds off. Each signal runs in a two minute cycle and will only be repeated if manually set off again. 6th Wild West Show to be this weekend

The annual Nazareth Country Rodeo and Wild West Show will begin a three-day run Friday. Friday and Saturday activities will begin at 7:30 p.m. Sunday's performance will start at 3 p.m. Marvin Schulte's area will host the action. The arena is located five miles east of Nazareth on Highway 36. Rodeo events will include bareback and saddle bronc riding, bull riding, bulldogging, calf roping, barrel racing, team roping, and single steer roping. Admission will be \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for children 2 years of age up to high school. Children under 12 will be admitted free. The event is billed as "the wildest rodeo in the Texas Panhandle," and carries a money-back guarantee if you are not satisfied. Wild West events which are open only to local entrants are the wild mare race and the wild cow milking, each with a \$15 entry fee; the Saturday night bath race and kid's calf scramble, both free of charge; and the boys' steer riding with a \$10 entry fee. The stock will be furnished by C-T Rodeo of Lubbock. Books will be open for rodeo events from noon to 6 p.m. today (Thursday) in the concession stand building at the arena.

The family of Sister Norbert Hoelting honored her Saturday with a celebration to mark her 50th anniversary as a Benedictine Sister of St. Scholastica's Community, Fort Smith, Ark. The celebration began with a special mass in the Holy Family Catholic Church in Nazareth. Celebrant and homilist was Rev. Albert Schneider of Little Rock. Music for the Jubilee Mass was provided by relatives, Benedictine Sisters and a guitar group led by Sister Gertrude Grabber. Following the mass, a dinner was held in the Community Hall. A program included family singing groups; testimonials by family members; a proclamation by Mayor Tommy Hoelting designating Saturday as "Sister Norbert Hoelting Day" and a presentation of the keys of the City of Nazareth to Sister Norbert; and a program, "This is Your Life, Sister Norbert" presented by Dora Albracht and other family members. 'Charley Hill Day' scheduled June 22

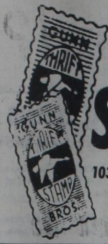

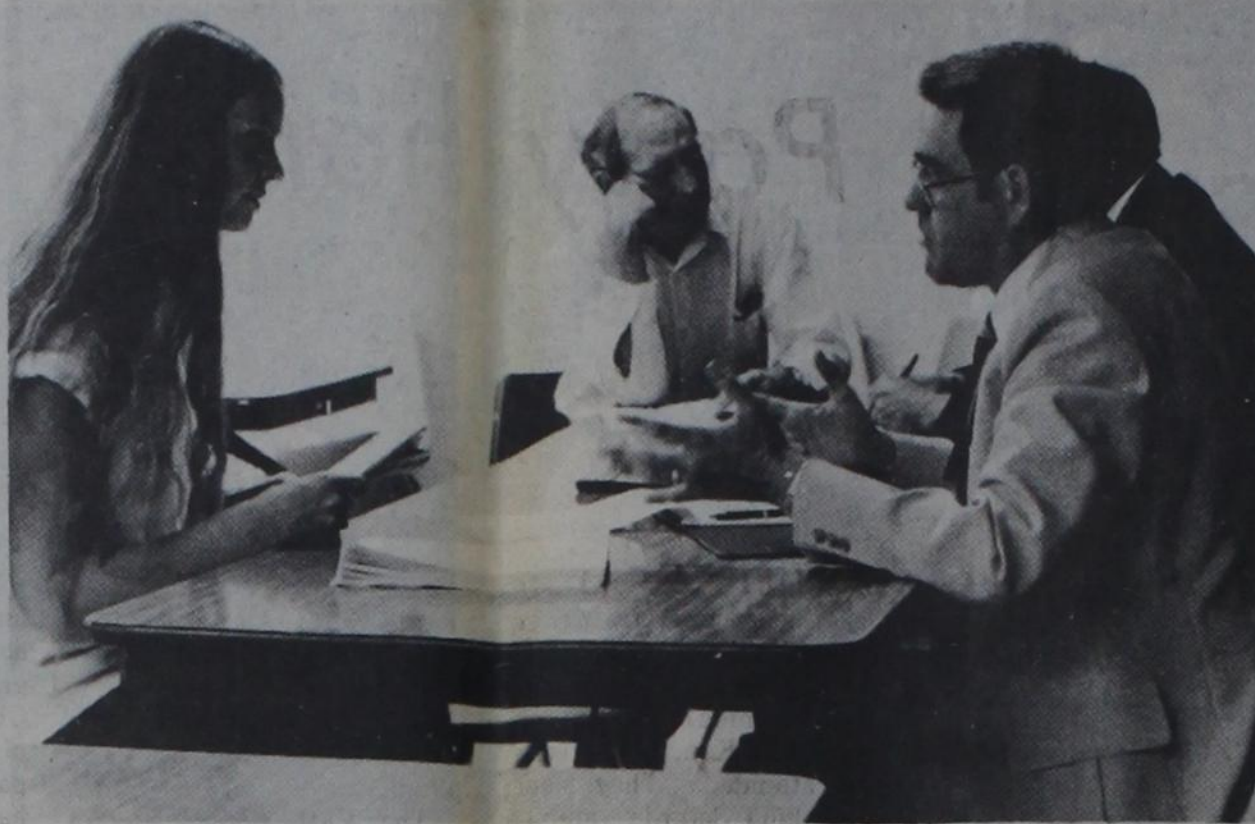

Land bank rates see an increase

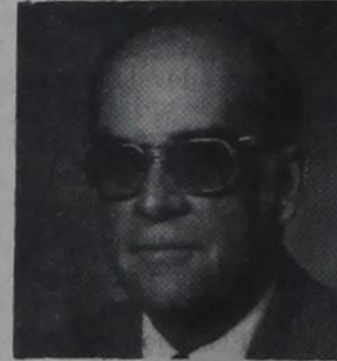

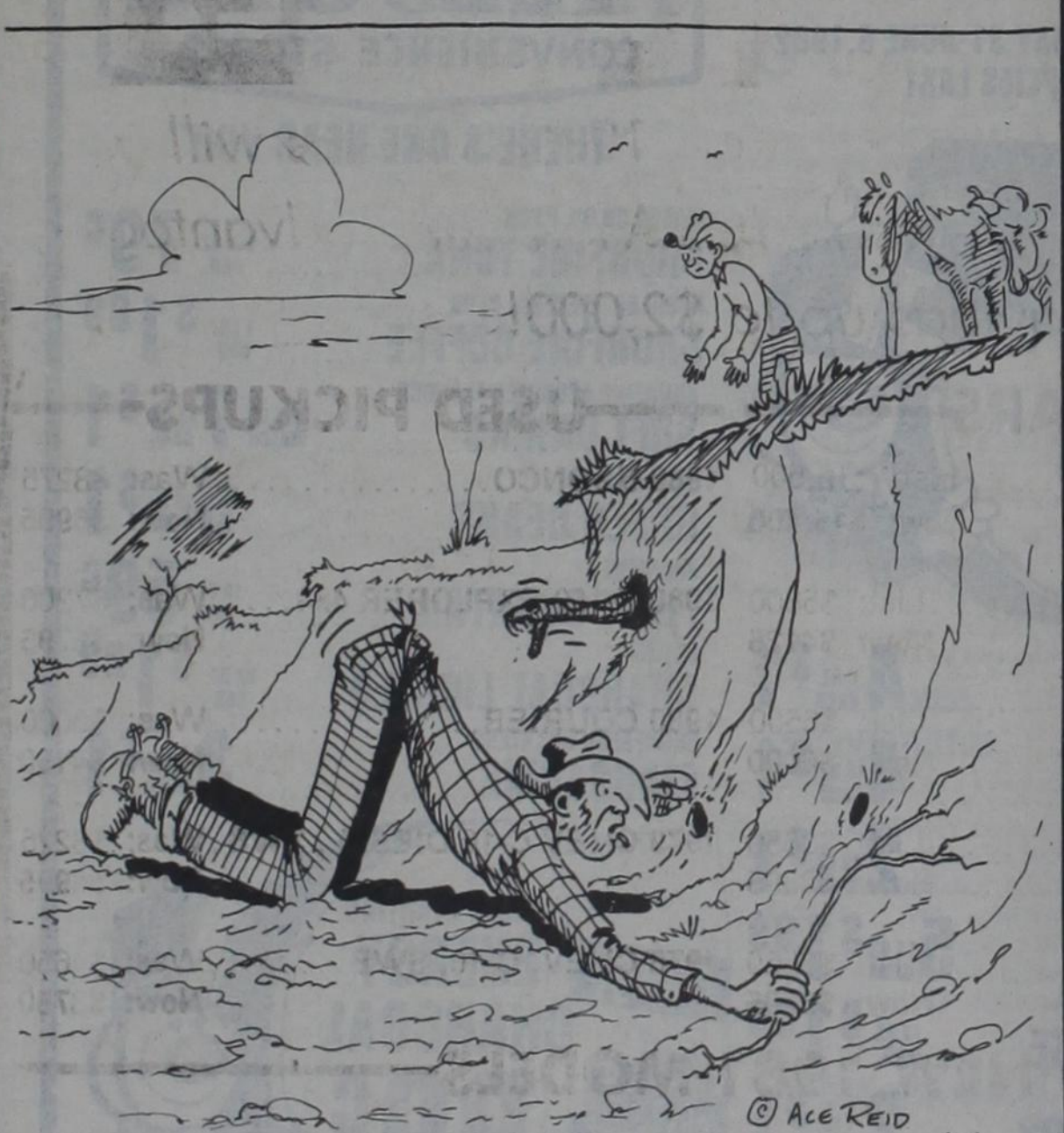

The Texas Veterans Land Board of Austin is offering, for the first time in almost five years, forfeited land tracts to veterans and certain others whose sealed bids are received on or before 10 a.m., June 8, 1982. The Board reserves the right to reject any or all bids, however.

We have in our office a complete listing of the tracts' descriptions, location and other pertinent information concerning them, as well as terms of the sale, and eligibility requirements for prospective buyers. I also have a

copy of a Bid Form. I can make copies of these forms, bidding instructions and/or pages listing facts about the tracts for prospective bidders. Note: The time is short.

According to Bob Armstrong, chairman of the board, these 96 tracts are but a fraction of the almost 43,000 tracts under contract at a given time.

At the present time, no new applications of eligible veterans to buy new tracts are being accepted due to the economy and bond market. He hopes this will change soon, so that the \$324 million in bonds overwhelmingly approved by Texas voters may be sold.

Meanwhile, this revolving fund of no cost to tax payers is now limited to receipts in the semi-annual payments veterans make on their contracts.

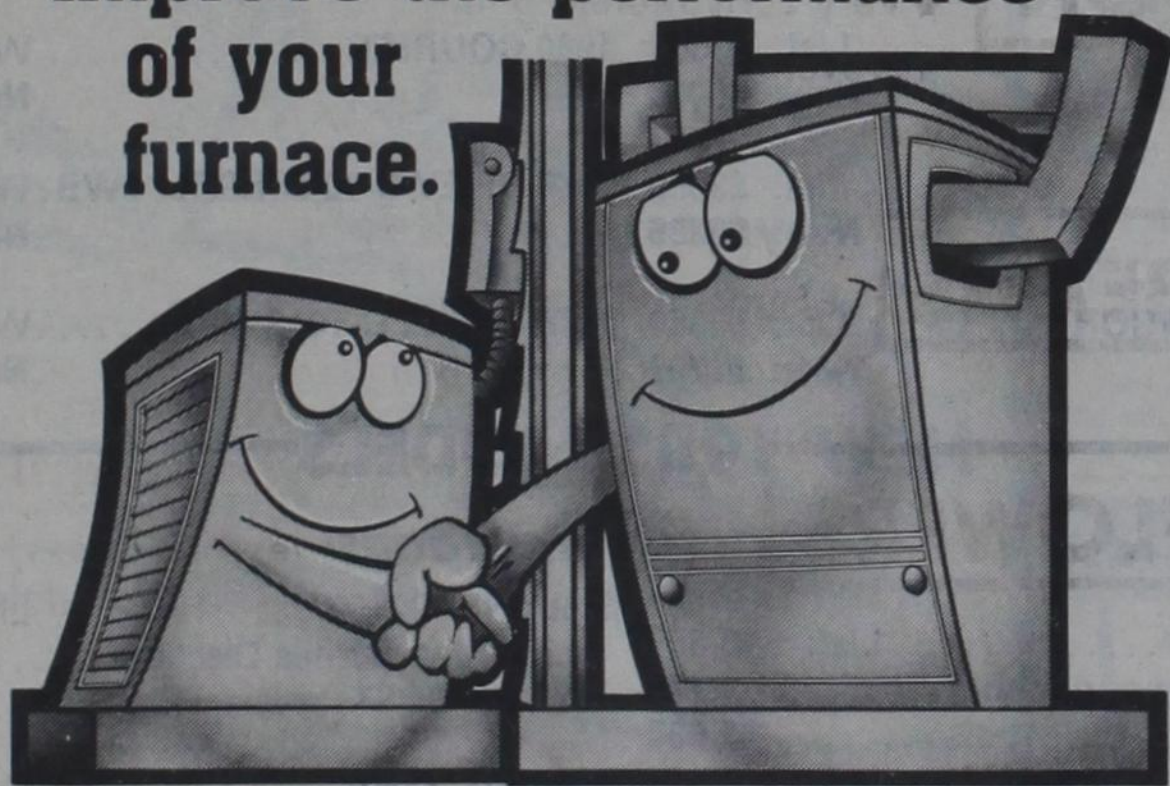

YOUR CITY AT WORK

I believe it is important to keep all the citizens of Dimmitt informed as to the types of activities in which city employees are engaged. I am therefore planning to write a weekly column which will appear in the Castro County News. I hope that it will be informative and helpful.

City workers are currently engaged in several major projects throughout the city. It's the time of year when many of the city's employees must take on additional responsibilities to adequately cover the needs of the community.

City employees worked several days last week to scrape off the old paint at the public swimming pool. The pool was then repainted white. The pool required two coats of paint which must cure out for approximately seven days before it can be filled with water. The pool was scheduled to open June 1; however because of bad weather last week, city employees were unable to complete work on the pool as scheduled. The opening of the pool is now rescheduled for Saturday, June 5, at 1 p.m.

Maintenance of the city parks has always been a problem. The parks need

constant attention and care if they are going to be adequately maintained. The city has purchased a new tractor mower and we hope to hire a temporary full-time worker for the parks this week. We plan to put the parks in good condition for all of the citizens of Dimmitt to enjoy. We also call upon the residents of Dimmitt to report any objectionable activity or vandalism to the Dimmitt Police Dept. Police will maintain a regular patrol of the parks.

Mosquitoes and flies are always two major problems for residents during the summer months. The city will be spraying mosquitoes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 6 to 10 p.m. We are therefore advising bee keepers to take all necessary precautions for the safety of their bees during the hours that the city will be spraying. The city will also periodically spray insecticide in the trash dumpsters to help eliminate any future problems with flies. Residents can help control the fly and mosquito problem by simply keeping their property and alleyways clean and clear of weeds. It is the responsibility of all residents to maintain their own alleyways.

Employee Highlights
City employees within the Dept. of Public Works are often called out at all hours of the day and night to check and repair broken water mains or perhaps to unstop a clogged sewer line. For the most part, they do not receive any extra pay for this extra work.

In every case I have found that city employees on call, are eager to halt whatever personal activity in which they may be engaged during their off-hours, to go and check out the nature of the problem and to make necessary repairs. These dedicated employees always put the safety and well-being of all city residents first.

I think it is nice to know that we are in good hands. I congratulate all employees within the Dept. of Public Works.

Fire calls

The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. was not called this week, fortunately.

The local firemen handled a total of seven alarms in May including five city runs and two county runs in Precincts 2 and 4. All of the fires were accidental. One involved an automobile, one was a dwelling, and one was an explosion. Others were trash fires and smoke scares.

The department also had one community service call to wash down a highway.

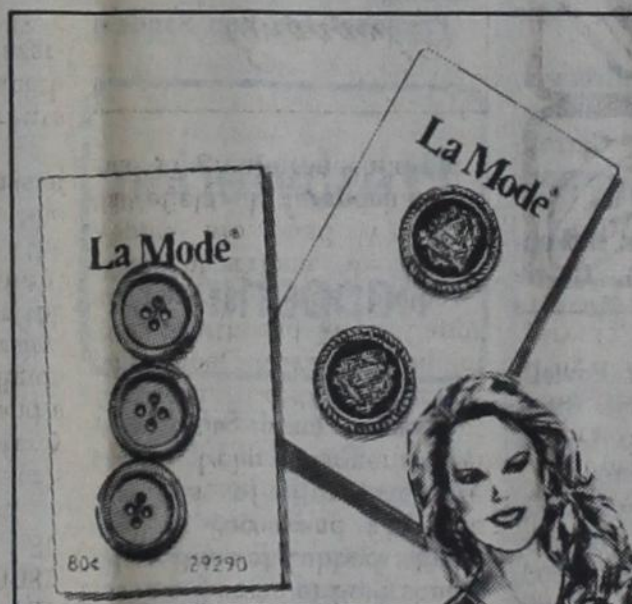
