#### NEW TRAFFIC VOLUME.

Announcement in the Daily News of a few days ago that Highway 23 north of Cisco has been made a federal highway forming part of a north and south national route from the Canadian border to the Gulf of Mexico perhaps did not meet with the interest that its significance merits. Certainly those who have labored so earnestly and long in promoting this particular project realize its importance. But the majority of the business men and the citizenship in general who are certain to derive the benefits have yet to accept it in the light of its ultimate value.

Federal approval followed by federal funds in the de-velopment of this route, coupled with state and local expenditures, should in time make this as popular a long distance traffic thoroughfare as the Bankhead is at present, not discounting in the least the importance of the Bankhead. But it fills a distinct need by providing the shortest route for tourist and commercial highway traffic north and south. Most of our national routes as well as the majority of our improved highways of any character trend east and west The result has been that motor traffic has flowed generally in these directions and the bulk of our tourist trade has come not from the north and middlewest but from the eastern and western sections of the United States. While contributing to the popularity of the gulf coast area among northern inhabitants such a direct north and south highway as the "Canada to the Gulf" provides new traffic volume from the territory hitherto undeveloped so far as this section and Texas in general is concerned. That it crosses the Bankhead at Cisco multiplies the advantages which this city may be expected to enjoy.

Let us make effective use of this opportunity.

"Since that time," said Mr. Terrell, some 15 different suits have been filed in state and federal courts and we are informed by the only lawyer we have, the attorney general, selected by the people of Texas to aelected by the people of Texas to advise and represent us in all courts, that we must wait until cases are finally settled in the highest courts before anything further can be done to conserve the oil and gas in that field."


