DELAY ON WAR DEBTS IS URGED

WASHINGTON, June 20.—The United States has proposed to the leading powers a one-year suspension of all war debt payments between governments to give them a breathing spell in which to recover economically, President Hoover announced tonight.

The American government proposes the postponement during one year of all payments on inter-governmental debts, reparations and relief debts both principal and interest of course not including obligations of governments held by private parties. Subject of confirmation by congress, the American government will postpone all payments on debt of foreign governments to the American government payable during the fiscal year beginning July 1, next, conditional on like postponement for one year of all payments on inter-governmental debts owing the important creditor powers.

Fall Goes to Hospital for Examination

EL PASO, June 20.—Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the interior, will go to William Beaumont hospital tonight, members of his family announced late today. He will be under observation at the hospital for several days to determine whether he is able to go to Washington to receive sentence of one year in prison and a \$100,000 fine on a charge of accepting a bribe in the oil lease cases.

RENO, Nev., June 20.—Peter Arno will file suit for divorce from Lois Long, his wife, early next week, it was announced here today by Clyde Souster, Arno's attorney. Miss Long will file a counter suit and ask a decree from the court, it was announced by her attorney.

NEW YORK, June 20.—The flat statement that he is in possession of the names of persons he considers responsible for the death of Starr Faithfull, beautiful and eccentric Greenwich Village girl, was made today by Inspector Harold King, directing the Faithfull investigation.

POPE RAPS AFFAIRS OF ITALY

VATICAN CITY, June 20.—The pope, addressing 700 members of the propaganda of the faith congregation today, denounced the Italian government for maintaining "the most hateful, watching, odious, spying and steel-poisoning and continuous menace" over Aisiose Cattolica, Catholic layman organization which has recently been a fascist target in the Italian-Vatican crisis.

TEXAS IS SHIPPING POULTRY

AUSTIN, June 20.—Shipments of poultry from Texas during May included 99 cars of dressed chickens and 27 cars of live chickens, according to the Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas. Turkey shipments numbered five and one-half cars, while shipments of eggs totaled 199 cars, 116 of which were shipped to out-of-state destinations.

Haley Wins Out In Libel Suit

LUBBOCK, June 20.—Five weeks of testimony regarding Wild West days in the Panhandle 30 years ago ended today in victory for J. Everett Haley, historian, in the \$200,000 libel suit filed against him by Fred Spikes, rancher. Spikes challenged a chapter in Haley's "History of the XIT Ranch," which described the slaying of Spikes' two brothers and the wounding of himself by a posse seeking cattle thieves.

Man Killed By Iowa Cyclone

MASON CITY, Ia., June 20.—John Smith was killed near Hayfield today and extensive property damage done as the result of a sucking tunnel of wind which tore across Northern Iowa and Southern Minnesota last night. The storm was generated by the heat wave.

Northwest Heat Wave Is Broken

ST. PAUL, Minn., June 20.—Leaving a death toll of 35 the northwest heat spell apparently was broken this afternoon. Eight persons died of prostration. Two were killed in North Dakota when the heat blew out their tires. Six were killed in floods in Alberta. The rest of the deaths were from drowning.

AUSTIN—Oil men and business men who have been petitioning Governor Sterling to call a special session of the legislature to consider oil and gas conservation were glad to learn that the governor will not submit the subject of revenue and taxation if a special session of legislation is called. ARP SWEEP BY BLAZE SATURDAY

TYLER, June 20.—More than 100 persons clad only in their night clothes rushed about the streets of Arp, oil boom town about 18 miles from here, at day-break today after fire had razed 13 business establishments and caused an estimated loss of \$75,000.

The fire broke out in a defective gasoline stove in a domino hall at 2:45 a. m. when the blaze was brought under control, only a filling station, a cafe, jewelry store and a barber shop remained in the block.

No casualties were reported. Rescuers moved a sick man on a cot from a hotel and another man jumped through a window from the second story of another hotel but was unhurt.

Lack of water hampered the fire fighting. Alarms were turned in to Troop, Henderson and Tyler, but only the Tyler department responded because of the lack of water.

Superior Refining Co. One of the Permanent Results of Famous Ranger Oil Boom of 1919

By R. KENNETH EVANS. One of the permanent industries that came to Ranger as the result of the striking of oil in 1917 is the Superior Refining Company, an institution that has a substantial payroll each month that adds generally to the welfare and prosperity of the district.

So in reviewing the history of this company, it is not amiss to point out the fact that it is a local institution and to emphasize the fact that it deserves local patronage.

The plant of the Superior Refining Company was put up to serve a demand for gasoline and lubricating oils during the fast time of the oil development in Ranger and this field. It began operations in 1919 and so far as is known, is the only company of its kind in West Texas to start as an independent, remain independent, and continue in operation through the high and low peaks that have touched the oil industry in the past dozen years.

"We have been able to hold our own for two reasons," said Mr. J. W. Howlett, chief clerk and assistant to G. A. Clements, vice president and general manager. "These reasons are that we make a high quality product and are able to market this product at a fair price."

When an oil manufacturer speaks of "his product," he talks of the output of the plant. To the lay mind that usually is just one thing. But to a man like Mr. Howlett or J. W. Cash, plant superintendent, the product of a refinery such as the Superior is the sum total of a number of things. And a trip over the properties at the refinery shows that the products of the "liquid gold" come out in a variety of colors and with a variety of smells.

"Primarily we make gasoline and lubricating oils," said Mr. Cash, as he led the way across a maze of pipes and among an array of stills and tanks that are located on the premises. "But after we have taken out the gasoline, we get a run of kerosene and after that a product we call gas oil. Then we get lubricating oils of any one of several kinds that we make under our own system and which we bring to certain Society of American Engineering standards. To the person who does not know the intricacies of gasoline and lubricating oil manufacture, this process looks complicated and difficult but to us who have spent several years at the business it looks simple enough."

Mr. Cash makes things look simple enough when he explains the workings of the refinery to a visitor. He takes one down to the battery of huge stills where crude oil is pouring into them from the nearby field. Or for the moment, the oil may be coming from the far off fields of North Central Texas. Crude from any one of several fields may be coming in that day, for the Superior Refinery taps one of the big pipe lines and can get oil from many places, dependent upon the particular run the refinery is to make.

The crude goes into the still and is heated to a certain degree. This is predetermined by the grade of gasoline or kerosene that is to be made. Gasoline will come off in vapor at any one of several temperatures. Only certain of these temperatures are ever used at the local plant, for as Mr. Cash pointed out, "Superior gasoline must be just so, or it is not our brand of gasoline. It is somebody else's brand," he said and the way he explained that showed that he was in the habit of working with the stills to bring out a high quality product. "When the crude is heated to a

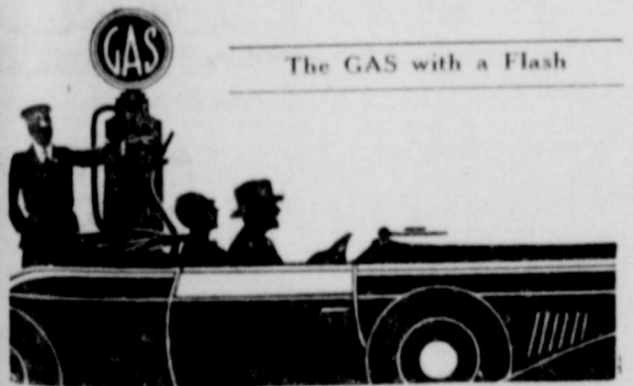
