NEW TELESCOPE FOR NAVY TO BE LATEST DESIGN

WASHINGTON. — Dr. George Willis Ritchey, designer of the 100-inch reflecting type telescope in use at Mt. Wilson, soon will build for the U. S. Naval Observa-

build for the U. S. Naval Observa-tory here an instrument that, be-cause of several new and secret refinements, will rival in scientific importance the one in California. Dr. Ritchey was given the con-tract to build a 40-inch reflecting type of instrument shortly after British scientists revealed plans for the erection of a 36-inch tele-scope at the famous. Greenwich scope at the famous Greenwich Observatory.

Naval officials have been work on plans for the instrument for over three years and sub-con-tracts will be let immediately. Ritchey expects to take about months for the construction.

\$225,000 Appropriation The last Congress authorized a mplete modernization of the Naval Observatory and \$225,000 shelter from the wind and waves. was appropriated. The new telescope will cost \$76,000.

The 40-inch glass cast, from which the huge lens for the new instrument will be ground, is expected to arrive from France within a month. It was made at the Saint-Gobain plant near Paris—a plant that has been making scientific instruments for 375 years.

Dr. Ritchey is enthusiastic over his new project. The 68-year-old scientist said he hopes to "erect

This will enable the Naval Observatory staff to produce the most accurate and most detailed photographs of the stars and heavenly bodies ever made. 



GREAT FINANCIAL LOSS TO TEXANS.

Representative Paul Hill of Webb county is a member of the oil and gas committee of the legislature. He made a tour of the East Texas oil field. His viewpoint is that oil proration would solve the trouble in East Texas which has caused the price of crude to toboggan all over the nation. Few people, according to Representative Hill, realize the great financial losses over-production in East Texas has caused the oil industry.

A reliable statistician has estimated that producers of the country are receiving \$1,600,000 a day less than they were receiving when the East Texas field was discovered while the producers of East Texas are receiving only \$70,000 a day for distress oil now being run from that field. It is Representative Hill's viewpoint that if the East Texans had obeyed the proration orders of the railroad commission and the price of crude should have continued, they would have re ceived twice as much for half as much oil and this woul have left the rest of the producers a million dollars a dz Furthermore, he stresses there is one phase which should be of vital interest to every citizen of Texas. It is estimated that Texas is losing in taxes and university royalties more than \$15,000 a day. This sum, declares the lawmaker and member of the oil and gas committee of the legislature, must be made up by placing additional burdens upon the already overtaxed real property of the state.

From the present depressed condition it seems to Representative Hill that the weakness, if not the futility, of agreed proration is apparent. He believes that the only permanent relief will be by law. He favors legislation which will make proration legal and erfective, with provisions of the law applying fairly and impartially to all fields and producers, both large and small.

To the governor, the lawmakers and the railroad commissioners: "Where do we go from here?"




