**New Oil Pipe Line To Boost British Output**

BAGHDAD, Persia.—The output of oil in the British Empire, or in territories under British influence, will be increased by 2,000,000 tons annually from 1935, by an agreement signed here recently.

The agreement, signed after prolonged negotiations, by the Iraq Petroleum company and the Iraq government, calls for a pipeline from the Iraq oil fields near Kirkuk to the Mediterranean.

The pipeline, on which construction is to start immediately, will proceed first of all for about 150 miles to Haifa, where it will divide into two branches. One branch will pass through Haifa, then through the British mandated territories of Transjordan and Palestine to Haifa, and the other through the French man-

dated territories of Syria and Lebanon to Tripoli.

**1,200 Miles Long**  
The combined length of the two trans-desert lines will be about 1,200 miles. The total cost will be about \$50,000,000. About 500,000 tons of piping will be required, costing about \$15,000,000.

The Tripoli line, which is about 110 miles shorter than the one to Haifa, will be completed first, but the Haifa line must be completed within six months of the other, and both must be ready not later than 1935. Each of the two pipe lines will have a maximum carrying capacity of 2,000,000 tons yearly.

The delay in reaching agreement was due to the variety of conflicting international interests which sought satisfaction. The British desired the pipe-line to debouch in British mandated territory, the French in French mandated territory, and the Iraq government wanted the maximum in the way of royalties and taxation. In addition, the necessary transit conventions had to be signed by the governments of Transjordan, Palestine, Syria and Lebanon.

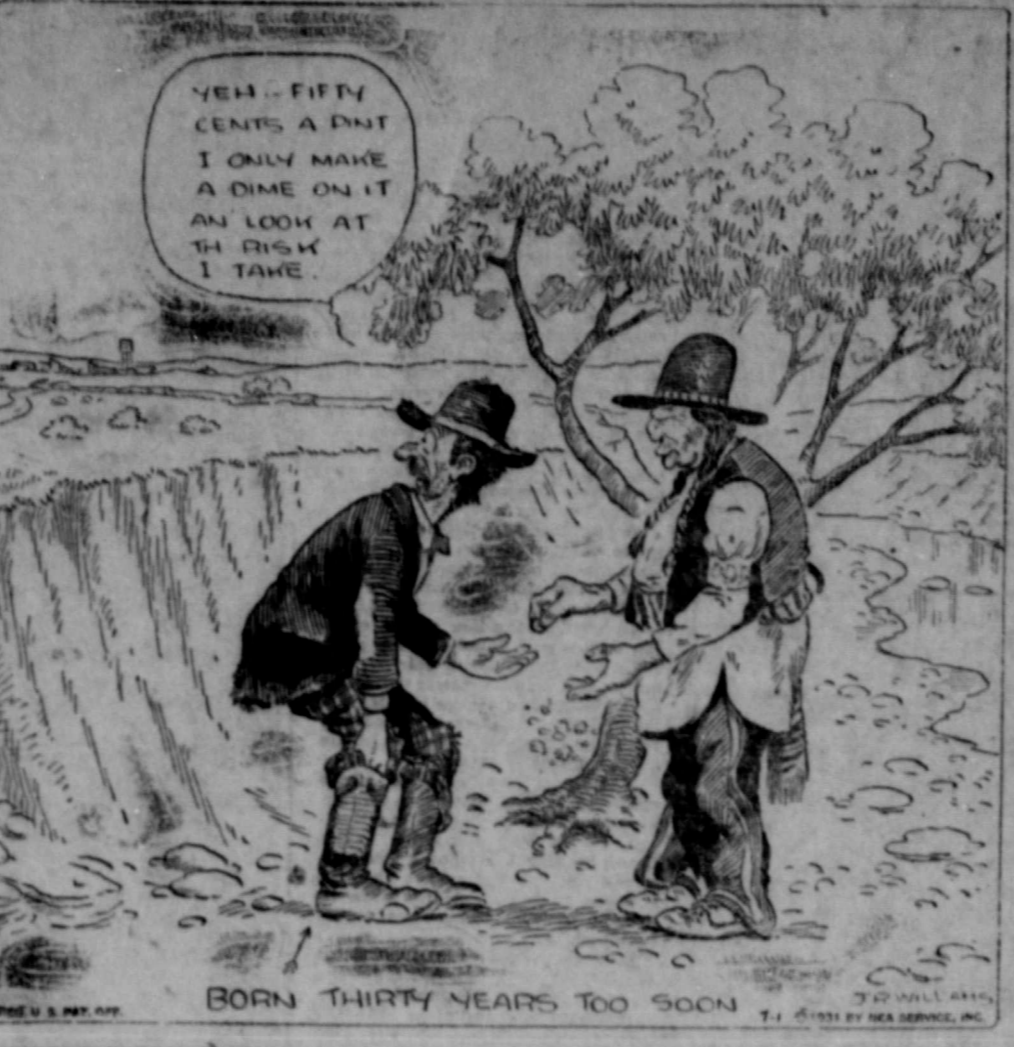
**British Oil**  
When the pipe-line is working the output of British controlled oil will represent roughly one-third of the total world output.

The Iraq Petroleum company, formerly known as the Turkish Petroleum company has a capital of \$20,000,000, and is an international concern in which a 25 per cent interest is held respectively by the Anglo-Persian Oil company, the Royal-Dutch Shell group, the Compagnie Francaise des Petroles, and an American group. The remaining five per cent is held privately by C. S. Gulbenkian.
