HALF-EDUCATED.

Joseph H. Appel, advertising manager for John Wanamaker, told a curious thing at the convention of the Advertising Federation of America. Of the 33 college graduates on the executive force, he said, 21 had taken cultural courses in college and 12 had had vocational training. Those who had the cultural courses revealed through a questionnaire that if they had it to do over again they would take vocational training instead. Those who had had vocational training, answering the same questionnaire, said they would choose the cultural courses if they were beginning over.

Apparently each group feels only half-educated, although the fact that there are nearly twice as many successful executives in the cultural course group as in the vocational training group seems to give a little special prestige to the former type of education. There are many educators and others who feel that a broad cultural course is the best educational foundation. It is easy to add special training in any line to such a foundation. Many men and women who have had strictly vocational training, later miss the breadth of view and interests derived from cultural studies. Perhaps the ideal system would give students the right amount

There is one easy solution to their problem ready for those 33 executives. With all the opportunities offered these days for continued study all through life, each one can take-up further study in the subjects in which he feels a lack.

TELEPHONES AROUND THE WORLD.

An American telephone subscriber, if he has anything he wants to tell them and the money to pay the bill, can now converse with 32,000,000 other telephone users in many parts of the world. So says a recent issue of the Telephone Review.

There were 34,526,629 telephones in the world on Jan. 1, 1930. More than 20,000,000 of them were in the United States, 88 per cent of the total. Europe on the same date had 29 per cent of the total. The other 13 per cent was widely distributed in the rest of the world. In America we have 16.4 telephones per 100 of population. Canada comes second with 14.2 and New Zealand third with 10.3 per 100. Europe as a whole has only 1.9 telephones for that number.

The figures do not necessarily indicate financial ability to have telephones. They indicate chiefly that not everybody is "sold" on their value as we are. Here in the United States the telephone is considered almost essential. In some European countries the telephone is not yet regarded as wholly desirable. It is considered a necessary evil in some instances and a horrible modernism eagerly dodged in others. A charming English hostess once apologized to some American guests because she had been compelled for certain reasons to have a telephone in her home. She used it, but she resented its ringing, its intrusion on the quiet and privacy of her home.

THE MARATHON MANIA.

Am Chicago seems to be coming to its senses in various ways. About dancing, for instance. It is forbidding marathen dances, on the ground that they are injurious to health. Every sane person knows that is a legitimate reason for

banning them. They might also be banned as injurious to sanity, or as downright evidence of insanity. In fact, there might well be a general prohibition, throughout the country. of marathon contests and stunts of all kinds, as tending to spread a form of mental epidemic that has already gone too far.

We seem to have arrived at a stage of public aberration where it is considered by countless men, women and children a noble and enviable thing to do anything longer and more exhaustively than anyone else has done it, even when the thing is not worth doing, or is downright harmful or idiotic, Pittsburgh It is time to stop competitions in idiocy. In fact, it may

be almost time to stop competitions in everything, since the American people seem to be drifting into a mental complex that regards the mere making of records as the supreme purpose of life.

TEXAS LEADS IN RURAL MAIL.

Texas is an empire territorially speaking and Texas eads all the rest in the modern accessories of civilization. Now the report of Postmaster General Brown shows that more persons are served on the rural mail routes of Texas than in any other state in the union. Indeed his reports show that the 2142 rural mail routes of Texas cover 72,097 miles, serve daily 1,456,287 persons who are watching 286,-677 mail boxes. Annually the mail carriers deliver 200,000,-000 pieces of mail along the routes. In 1896 the rural mail service was established in the United States. Now it requires over a hundred million dollars annually to keep the service functioning and Texas is given first place.

OPEN SPEED LIMIT FOR CALIFORNIA.

"California's new speed limit will be 45 miles an hour on open highways beginning August 15. This for Texas tourists who invade the Golden Coast country in the summer and fall months of the year. It is not necessary to be gifted with the spirit of prophecy to predict that 100 miles an hour will be the speed limit on American highways in the glorious days to come. Aces of the air have already perfected a plane that will fly 400 miles an hour. If it is possible in the sky, why not on the land?

OLD AGE PENSIONS DOWN EAST.

All male citizens of Massachusetts over 20 years of age will pay a head tax of a dollar a year hereafter for the upper of the old age assistance scheme drafted by the general court of 1930.
