THE CRIPPLED NAUTILUS.

No one likes to be pessimistic about a great sporting venture. No one wishes the Nautilus and her gallant com mander and crew any worse luck than they have had. But it may be that Sir Hubert Wilkins and his men have not fully realized the kind of craft they were counting on. Various American observers have been dubious of their undertaking from the first. Here is an editorial, for instance, printed in the Westerly, R. I., Sun when the remodeled submarine first began to have difficulties on her trip across the Atlantic. It is captioned "Why the Nautilus?"

"Those who saw the Nautilus when she was at New London are rather glad that if her engines were going to break down and she was to have trouble, it was in the broad Atlantic and other craft were near enough to go to her res-It is much better to break down in a friendly ocean lane than it is up off Greenland somewhere with no friends within hundreds of miles, or under the ice where there would be nothing to do but bore holes heavenward from the submarine with their boring apparatus.

"The Nautilus is one of the oldest type of submarines. It has been used for experimental purposes by a private corporation. The changes which were made in her superstructure to convert it from a warlike craft to one which might go to sea, dive under ice and permit her back to be rubbed by the under side of that ice were of a rather flimsy con-

The Nautilus may get to the other side. She may get a lot of publicity and she may get further north. But those who know her and have seen her rather feel that that is about as far as she will get-'farther north' and not 'farther-

PUBLIC-SPIRITED TEACHERS.

Official Chicago made a discovery the other day. It was that there are 11,000 hungry school children in the city who are being fed by public-spirited teachers out of their own pockets. Chicago is one of the communities in which teachers have had to go without pay occasionally for lack of pub-

In another industrial city where there has been much agitation for teachers' salary cuts, the superintendent asked for a report from principals as to charitable work done by teachers during the school year. The result was surprising to citizens who don't know teachers very well.

It was found that many children who came to school breakfastless because their families could not feed them were given milk or hot soup or vegetables by teachers. Youngsters who couldn't afford lunches were helped. Now and then a child inadequately clothed received stockings or shoes or a warm sweater from teacher. In many cases teachers didn't know precisely how much money they had spent in this way because they hadn't kept track of it. They had met certain needs as they discovered them, but they had done so generously and modestly without any thought of counting the cost and getting glory for it.

It might be well if a good many communities planning to cut teachers' pay this year would investigate the extra service their teachers have been giving all through the depres-sion. with income under \$1200 spend Most people get the common about \$66 a year on medical service, communicable diseases of child-
