

ANOTHER RAILROAD FOR WEST TEXAS.

new rail line known as the Texas & Pacific Northern be built if the I. C. C. grants the permit to the Texas and Pacific railroad recommended by an examiner. Per-mission was asked to build 333 miles but the examiner advised that the company should confine its construction for the present to 126 miles or 80 miles from Big Spring to Brownfield and 46 miles from Lubbock Junction to Lubbock. Later the examiner said it may prove desirable to continue the construction from Brownfield to Vega and from Dimmitt to Amarillo. He made a suggestion that it would be best to await further development of the Texas Panhandle country and also see what effect highway transportation has on the railroad situation.

Many counties will be benefitted by the construction of the road. Rich farming lands abound and there is a good livestock industry. Oil, despite the present depression in that industry, is an important product. Lubbock according to the report of the examiner, is a railroad center, one of the largest inland cotton markets and has a number of mills and factories. In many of the countries, the report said, the country is generally supplied with good country roads and the farmers use motor trucks. There is tremendous development everywhere in the Panhandle and Plains section, including rail expansion, regardless of the so-called business depression and the keen rivalry which exists between the railroads and the busses and highway freight carriers. Texas is not standing still.

FARMING AND BUILDING ACTIVITIES.

A bulletin issued by the federal department of agricul-ture makes known that prices of farm products are far below a profit level. Farm wages are the lowest in 15 years. Large farm production and low prices are given as the outstanding features of the general situation. Some encouragement for farmers was found in commodity price grains following the moratorium discussion. A record breaking supply of sheep and lambs produced sharply falling prices. Wholesale beef prices are from 30 to 50 per cent lower than a year ago. Prices of eggs are one-third lower and poultry prices down about a fourth. These were features of the

livestock situation in general. A recent story from Dallas is most encouraging. The reader is reminded that the year 1931 turned the half way mark, the last day of June, with Texas cities maintaining a steady pulse of new construction, which although in most cases somewhat less than during the similar period of 1930, indicated business conditions were maintaining an even keel of development. In the following order, Houston, first; Dallas, second; Fort Worth, third; Galveston, fourth, San Antonio, fifth. A sure sign that Texas builders are not lagging behind the procession.
