PROSPERITY SIGNS IN TEXAS.

Swing of the economic pendulum toward a new era of prosperity will be felt by the clothing business over the entire nation, according to John Adams of Dallas, president of the Men's Apparel club of Taxas. More than a hundred delegates attend the Fort Worth convention of the clothiers club. Texas continues to be the great white spot on the map of America and the day will come when Texas will be as great as a manufacturing as it is as an agricultural and mineral producing state. A reminder that contracts aggregating \$16,-030,226 were awarded by the Texas highway commission for road and bridge construction on July 22 with a notice that work on the projects will be started immediately with all contractors pledged to the use of local work. Bumper crops are promised. Texas harvested the greatest wheat crop in the history of the commonwealth and yield of corn and oats will be very heavy. When it comes to production of feedstuffs and foodstuffs Texas will hang up a new high record. As for the summer and winter gardens of the commonwealth they have made dividends and the wool and the mo-hair producers are not going to face starvation the coming

REDWOODS ARE SAVED.

The California Redwoods have been saved, not for California alone but for the whole country and for admiring visitors from anywhere in the world. Ten years or so ago it or looked as if the redwoods were doomed to fall under the lumberman's ax. Then the public began to get excited about the

Public-spirited men and women, east and west, clubs, the California state park commission, magazines, and even school children rallied to the cry of "Save the redwoods!" Funds were raised. Negotiations were conducted between certain state officials and the lumber company involved. The Savethe-Redwoods League was organized and began to raise funds to purchase the largest tract of redwood forest. The state, by a bond issue in 1927, raised half the cost of the project. Philanthropists contributed generously.

The result has been the creation of Humboldt State Redwood Park, 16,000 acres in extent, running 15 miles along a fine highway. Thus the "tallest, oldest and most magnificent trees in the world" became a national treasure.

The redwoods triumph shows what can be done when nough of the public cares. It took ten years of persistent hard work to accomplish this, but there stand the redwoods now to show victory. What hext?

MORE MONEY TO BUILD SHIPS.

Now the president of the American bureau of shipping is positive that \$225,000,000 government appropriation for construction of 100 modern freight ships would relieve unemployment in Pacific coast shipyards. In war time the government built 2600 ships. Indeed it is said that more than \$3,000,000,000 was invested in craft to bridge the Atlantic Well, the bridging followed. Only two hundred of the 2600 ships built as Atlantic bridges remain.

Capt. C. M. McAlester is president of the bureau of shipping. He insists that there must be provided in a very short time a considerable fleet of modern freighters to meet the demands of our foreign trade.

SPEAKING OF THE TEXAS WOOL CROP.

Texas produced 41,600,000 pounds of wool in 1930 and now the wool guessers say that there will be a slightly larger yield this year. Last year the co-operative handled 119,000,-000 pounds of wool. They expect to have consigned this year 130,000,000 pounds or between 35 and 40 per cent of the 1931 crop. Texas leads all states in the production of wool and Texas is the banner mohair producing state of all of the Americans. As for cotton Texas leads the world in its production. Why the scarcity of cotton mills and the absence of woolen mills in Texas?

Judge Castleman stated that no request for an investigation was asked and in view of the fact that the girl met death in the presence of several relative-witnesses, no inquest

met death in the presence of several relative-witnesses, no inquest was at first thought necessary.

Mrs. Westbrook died two hours after one bullet was fired through the front part of her head. Relatives where Mrs. Westbrook had been visiting for the past six weeks told local authorities that the young lady had been despondent for several days and ended her life by quickly withdrawing a revolver from under the bed covers of the bed on which she was sitting Saturday afternoon while talking to relatives, sending the bullet directly between her eyes.

The Stephens county grand jury, in session this week, is expected to investigate the affair before recessing.

Its recommendations therefore were con-fined to what the federal government can do in the situation. Some of the penal institutions to which reference was made are state in-stitutions where the federal gov-ernment merely houses its delin-C 8-3757

quents, so its recommendation was only that where cases of cruelty are shown the prisoner should be

moved to another institution.

Changes recommended are legal and technical. The major recommendation favored federal legislation to recognize the status of juvenile delinquency for the child violator now tried as adult violators of federal law.

Pending enactment of this legis-

lation the commission recommend

"That a service be established by the attorney general for the purpose of supervising the han-dling of children; this service should include special registration and consistent verification of age of arrested minors; instructions to marshals and agents of the bureau of investigation, district attorneys

of investigation, district attorneys and commissioners to investigate children's cases by means of federal probation officers of local C 8—8777 juvenile courts; use of social agencies, foster homes and juvenile detention homes instead of jails; encouragement of the policy now imminent in the practice of several districts to study federal court proceedings until juvenile or other state courts have been consulted with view to co-operation; sulted with view to co-operation; where federal courts must act, an extended use of probation for minors; where young children are now in penal institutions and jails under conditions improper to their velfare, their removal or parole."

Concluding the report stated:
"It is recommended that the federal government recognize the concept of juvenile delinquency and withdraw the child offender from withdraw the child offender from the ordinary operation of federal penal justice save in cases in which the local processes for deal-ing with delinquent children prove to be or plainly are inadequate.
