### ALCOHOL MANUFACTURERS IN THE TOILS.

Prohibition Director W. W. Woodcock is a happy man. At a cost of \$500,000 for the government his agents turned in evidence to a federal grand jury in the city of Baltimore which resulted in three indictments charging 53 corporations and individuals with conspiracy to violate the prohibition laws. These indictments named persons in New York, New Jersey, Delaware, Maryland, Michigan and Ohio. It is said an investigation was ordered in 1929 and it was the largest and costliest ever undertaken by the pro enforcement department of the United States government. Heads of three of the largest industrial alcohol companies in the United States are among those named in the indictments and who will be forced to stand trial in the courts of the country. In 1929 pro officers seized three huge stills in the city of Baltimore used for cracking and re-distilling commercial alcohol for beverage purposes. Now it is the end of the trail for

Baltimore is said to be one of the wettest of American cities. Philadelphia is another. Pittsburgh is another. Chicago is another. For years and years republican administrations dominated Chicago. Republican administrations have dominated the two Pennsylvania cities for 50 years. Baltimore, municipally speaking, was ruled in recent years by the republicans until a dramatic landslide in late spring drove from power the G. O. P. in the metropolis of the state governed by Alfred C. Ritchie more than 12 years.




