## NATIONAL GUARDS ARE OFF FOR CAMP

### ABOUT THIS AND THAT

Some time ago we ran across the following item in a newspaper and decided to cut it out and wipe it. We didn't. Then a little later we saw it again in another paper and the fact that two had run it made us think it might be pretty good, but we didn't run it. So when someone else brought it in to us with the suggestion that we run it, we finally made up our minds. Here it is:

**What is Wrong With Texas?**  
"Nothing's wrong with Texas, except entirely too many of us get up in the morning at the alarm of a Connecticut clock, button up a pair of Ohio suspenders to a pair of Chicago pants. Put on a pair of Massachusetts shoes; wash in a Pittsburgh basin, using Cincinnati soap, and a cotton towel made in New Hampshire, sit down to a Grand Rapids table, eat pan-cakes made from Minneapolis flour spread with Vermont maple syrup, and Kansas bacon fried on a St. Louis stove. Buy fruit put up in California, seasoned with Rhode Island spices, and sweetened with Colorado sugar. Put on a hat made in Philadelphia, hitch a Detroit mule fed on Oklahoma gasoline to an Ohio plow and work all day on a Texas farm, covered with a New England mortgage, send our money to Ohio for tires, wondering why Texas taxes are \$2.75 per acre while Ohio farmers pay \$1 tax and drive on paved roads, and at night we crawl under a New Jersey blanket to be kept awake by a bull dog the only home product on the place, wondering all the time, where in hell all the money went in this wonderful state of ours. If we all would buy more home manufactured products we could keep our money at home and be prosperous."

The American's passion for putting on unusual clothing is amply illustrated by the popularity of the great fraternal orders, with their gaudy uniforms. Someone should sit down some day and try to figure out whether the great popularity of outdoor sports isn't at least partly due to this craving.

All of this is brought to mind by—of all things—a recent photograph of Calvin Coolidge. The photograph showed Mr. Coolidge fishing for trout in a Vermont stream. He stood on the bank, fish pole in hand, knees-deep in tall grass, and the caption beneath the picture said that he had caught five trout when the picture was taken.

Now Mr. Coolidge, who seems immune to the desire for odd clothing, was not dressed like a fisherman. He had on what we used to call his "Sunday clothes," double-breasted blue suit, vest, neck straw hat, unbuttoned collar and tie and ordinary shoes. If he had dropped his fish pole he would have looked precisely as he used to look when he strolled down Pennsylvania avenue in Washington.

And yet, for all this unorthodoxy, he was doing very well. He had caught five trout in a short time, he was having a lot of fun and he was, presumably, perfectly comfortable; and the fact raises a suspicion about the way most fishermen dress themselves when they go out to fish.

Is the garb they affect necessary? Obviously it is not; Calvin Coolidge, in a business suit, does as well as anyone could wish. So, too, come to think of it, does President Hoover, whose photographs show that he fishes while wearing, among other things, a starched collar, and a high one at that.

### EXPERT FINDS CAPITOL IDEAL AS "ZEP" BASE

WASHINGTON.—Ward T. Van Orman, twice international balloon racing champion and a noted meteorological expert, has chosen Washington as the center of the most desirable area on the United States coast for terminus of a trans-Atlantic dirigible line.

Among the four principal cities named, Van Orman found that wind conditions were about the same in all. He found that Baltimore suffered more from fog. The northern part of the territory is more subject to heavy snowfall. Washington is outside the section of heaviest snows. Rainfall is about the same at most places, and wind conditions are better a little back from the coast, which would favor Washington.

The capital's chief disadvantage apparently was that it is near the belt of high southern temperatures in summer. Temperature is of importance, it was stated, for its effects on gases and on lifting capacity. Washington is in a favorable position, however, as regards frequency of thunderstorms. It ranks about equal with Philadelphia in this respect, having a smaller number annually than other nearby sections.

Their ship rose heavily and barely cleared nearby house-tops. Unable to gain altitude readily, it continued into the west for some time before it could turn and begin the Atlantic dash. Their flight was successful.

### Texas Senate Tables Motion to Oust Railroad Commissioners

AUSTIN, July 31.—Faced with a resolution which would have required it to join with the House and call on Texas railroad commissioners to resign and return their commissions to the people, the Texas Senate today refused to censure the commission and voted 15 to 9 to postpone consideration of the resolution indefinitely.

CHICAGO, July 31.—Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson today permitted attorneys for "Scarface" Al Capone to withdraw the gang leader's plea of guilty in the income tax cases but reserved decision on the prohibition conspiracy plea until Sept. 8.

# CONCENTRATE SALES SHOW A BIG INCREASE

**SAN FRANCISCO.**—Despite reported threats of Al Capone and protests of ardent prohibitionists, sales of grape concentrates, a by-product of California wine grapes sold for making "grape beverages" in the home, are increasing tremendously and are far ahead of expectations. Donald Conn, managing director of a grape concentrate cooperative, said today.

The concern, a national-wide merger of similar firms now organized as a growers' cooperative, first started marketing concentrates in Milwaukee two years ago. Despite warnings of wine and beer selling gangsters not to enter Chicago, merchandising in that and other cities of the east followed swiftly. Marketing in California was started this year.

**Attacked Drys**  
 Attacked by prohibitionists for selling products which could be made into wine and at the same time borrowing from the Federal Farm Board, the cooperative countered with the statement that it had never used the word wine, never referred to it and only sold a product designed for the manufacture of "grape beverages" in the home.

A grape juice in the same form as when the grapes are crushed and blended for certain wine flavors, constitutes the bulk of the sales, Conn said. Two new products sold in cans, forming a concentrated syrup, were recently placed on the market and are rapidly gaining in favor, according to Conn. The syrup is diluted by the consumer to make his "beverage."

**Just Wholesale**  
 Conn revealed that his concern now has given up the retail distribution of the concentrates, finding it more profitable to act as wholesalers only, with the retailing done by drug stores, grocers and chain stores.

The concern plans within the next three years to increase the sales until they will be a profitable outlet for the entire surplus of California's \$350,000,000 grape industry.

No figures were given showing the amount of concentrates now being marketed.

## Perry Memorial Dedicated On Lake Erie Isle

**PUT-IN-BAY, Ohio, July 31.**—Perry's Victory Memorial, memorializing the more than century old friendship between the United States and Canada, was formally dedicated today by representatives of the two countries.

Commemorating the victory of Commodore Oliver Howard Perry over the British fleet under Commodore Barkley in the Battle of Lake Erie, Sept. 10, 1813, the northwestern campaign of General William Henry Harrison in the War of 1812 and the resultant peace between United States and Great Britain, the memorial is the second highest monument in the world.

**352 Feet High**  
 It stands 352 feet high on this Lake Erie isle, overlooking the scene of Perry's conquest and the border line of Canada and United States.

The fluted doric column of the memorial with its pilasters and approaches is constructed of Massachusetts granite. Its appearance from a distance is white and because of the slim strip of land on which it is erected seems to rise directly from the water.

The column is 45 feet in diameter at the base. A spectators' gallery, attainable by elevator, or circular stairway is constructed on top, protected by a four-foot parapet.

**Historic Names**  
 The walls of the rotunda and the elevator floor above are embellished with historical tablets, four of which contain the names of the Americans who engaged in the Battle of Lake Erie, or in conducting the American fleet. Floodlights illuminate the exterior at night so that the edifice is discernible at a great distance across the waters.

The monument, designed by Joseph H. Freedlander of New York, was partially finished in 1915 when it was opened to the public. Its completion, however, was not final until year later.

## Parcel Post to India By Plane Opened

**LONDON.**—A parcel air mail service between England and India has been instituted by Imperial Airways. The 5,000 mile aerial route between London and Karachi has been in operation for three years, but the service has hitherto been for passengers, letters and freight only.

The cost for parcels is \$1.44 per pound. It is believed that the new service will be of considerable benefit to British business houses trading with India. The average surface transport from London to India requires from 19 to 21 days. The new aerial parcel service reduces the time to five days. The service operates weekly in each direction.
