



### A UNIVERSAL BELIEF.

Dickens has often been severely taken to task because, in "A Tale of Two Cities," he has made such free use of the facial resemblance between Charles Darnay and Sydney Carton in working out the plot to the unforseen conclusion.

In the beginning of the story he saves Darnay from probable execution by the expedient of making his identification by the hostile witnesses doubtful. Their doubt he makes very real by causing Carton to stand beside Darnay in the dock, so that all present, including the jury, could see for themselves the extraordinary likeness between the two young men and the consequent probability that a mistake had been made.

He uses the same resemblance in the end to allow Carton to take Darnay's place in the Parisian prison, and to save the life of the former by taking his place at the foot of the guillotine, and suffering the death penalty himself instead of the man who had succeeded in winning the heart and hand of Lucy Manette.

There are, indeed, certain difficulties to giving one's complete adhesion to the likelihood of so heroic an act of self-sacrifice, as well as to the means adopted to bring it about; but so fully do people believe in the possibility of mistaken identity that without positive identification by more than one person it is next to impossible to obtain convictions. in criminal cases. This policy of juries probably frees the guilty in many instances, but public opinion excuses that by citing cases where it has spared the innocent.

TWILIGHT OF THE BULL.
Time was, in the merry heyday of Spain, when the bull stood for heroism and martyrdom. Great throngs gathered at festive arenas to see matadors, picadors and toreadors goad noble bulls into frenzy, then kill them. It was a great sport. The throngs laughed and waved mantillas and other Spanish objects d'art. When the bull fell, part of the thrill to the crowd, no doubt, came in a feeling of feverish pity and sympathy for the dumb animal.

But now Spain is becoming civilized and has taken up soccer football as a halfway station to the more humane sports. One ponders a bit on the dumb animals who must compose the soccer teams of old Madrid and Seville. In fact, one comes to the conclusion that it would be pleasanter to be a jay-walking pedestrian than a Spanish soccer player. If the former, one could at least die quietly. It is possible that the players long wistfully for the good old days when the crowds indulged their bloodthirstiness on a bull which did not quite know what it was all about.

There is this to be said for Spanish soccer: It is difficult to believe that it will ever inspire an opera about an infuriated cigarette girl, her toredor boy friend and a suicidal climax. In the modern sporting history of Spain there can be no such word as suicide, for none of the soccer players, it is be-

of flavor.

Although pears of some variety are in the market almost the year cound, the delicious Bartlett pear is at its best during August and September. Many other high quality varieties follow the Bartlett, prolonging the season into the late fall.

truit. Their flavor is refreshing,
tending to tone up a tired summer
appetite. Used fresh in salads,

Pears are one of the few fruits which are best picked green and allowed to ripen in storage. In this way the fruit develops better according texture than green.
