#### DIVERSIFY TO PROSPER.

There's a story about grasshopper who sang and played all summer while an ant worked. The ant spent the summer months laying in food for the winter. The grasshopper didn't. He greeted with a sneer the advice of the ant to store up food.

In the winter the ant was snug and well fed in the home he had worked all summer to prepare. The cold winds came and the snow covered the ground. The grasshopper curled up and died from hunger and cold.

There are some farmers like the grasshopper and there're some like the ant. Some farmers diversify their erops, raise feed for their stock, food for their own table, and livestock. These farmers are like the ant. Then there's the farmer who raises little, if anything, besides cotton. He has no cows in his pasture. He has no hogs in his lot. He doesn't raise the feed for the horses that plow his cotton. He doesn't have a garden and doesn't raise food for his family. This farmer is like the grasshopper.

A bright spot in farming was revealed recently by the exhibits at the Williamson county fair in Georgetown. Farm exhibits showed that there are many progressive farmers in the district. There were displays of fine corn, oats, wheat, maize and other well known grain sorghums. There was hay and fodder, cut and cured and ready for feed.

Big Bermuda onions, cured for winter, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, a variety of green vegetables and fruits were displayed by farmers who grew them on Central Texas land.

There was a magnificent exhibit of canned vegetablespeas, beans, cabbage, tomatoes, pickles, okra and many others. To these the progressive farmers of Williamson county and their wives who are disciples of the "live-at-home program" will add canned beef, pork, chicken and mutton. There were dairy cottle, beef cattle, hogs, poultry, sheep and goats shown at the fair.

Thanks to County Agents J. C. Patterson and Miss Ruth Ramey of Eastland county and Vocational Agents E. H. Varnell, Ben Whitehouse and F. A. Lloyd, of Cisco, Ranger and Rising Star, Eastland county farmers and their wives are developing and exhibiting a very definite sense of self-dependence. More pronounced than ever in the history of the county has been the present movement toward living at home. Diversification from a theory of salvation has become a reality. As an instance, look at the enormous amount of home-canning that has taken place. For years community clubs have been demonstrating in canning processes under the direction of the agents. Vegetables, fruits and meats have been preserved in comparatively small lots each year. Now these farmers and their wives have realized the value of the knowledge they have gained. It was a splendid opportunity for the agricultural extension workers to show their value. That they have done so is amply evidenced by the difference in conditions that confront the Eastland county farmer for the coming winter. The price of cotton, wheat, hogs, sheep, wool, cattle, and other commodities may be low, but the Eastland county farmer will not be caught with the sack this winter. No, indeed. He has raised a living at home, and his good wife has followed the example of the ant and stocked the larder shelves against winter days until his family will be assured of a hospitable table throughout the bleak months of the non-growing season. There are chickens and turkeys in the yard, cows in the lot and hogs in the pen.

The Eastland county farmer may not have plenty of money this year but he will have a living, thanks to the lesson he has learned and the energy of those who have sought to guide him to a more rational plan of farming; and the price he gets for his crops won't be so serious a matter as when his very food and health depend upon it. Since he will not have to depend upon a "money" crop to the extent that he once did he will have more money and an infinitely better lattitude.
