CENSUS CHANGE SUGGESTED.

Controversy which developed at Austin over the cor rectness of the school census there this year has drawn from Mrs. George R. Felter, census taker for the Austin schools, the assertion that a more accurate accounting for purposes of paying state funds to school districts could be had by using the highest enrollment figure of each school, rather than the special enumeration in which all persons between certain ages, whether or not they go to school, are supposed to be counted.

A proposal to amend the state census law was before the 42nd legislature in its regular session, but was defeated. Possibly, as the uncertainties of the present system are brought out more forcefully, the legislature will come around to changing the system.

For one thing, making state payments on a basis of enrollment would eliminate census taking, a fairly costly procedure. Then there would be little or no opportunity for error-making in compiling the lists. It is the experience of persons who make enumerations that never can as many as 1000 persons be counted with absolute correctness, without requiring, as they do in Turkey, that each person stay within his own house during the period of the nose-numbering. The common assumption in census taking is that one error in excess will be off-set by a similar error of omission, and that the final result will be approximately correct if the number to be enumerated is sufficient to give play to laws of averages. 




