FARMERS ENDORSE COTTON HOLIDAY

SIX MEN ARE SEEKING GASOLINE BOOTLEGGERS

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—Six men now touring the state have a novel detective job. It is that of trapping gasoline bootleggers.

Devious ways have been found to evade the 4 cents a gallon tax, but under a revised law making refiners responsible for the tax, the work has been much simplified.

It is not the refiners, alone who are watched. Many retailers have devised tax beating schemes. Under the law there is no tax on cashed gasoline.

Another favorite method, now being broken up, was to order a gasoline shipment to be delivered out of the state.

Audits furnish the best clues to violations, according to John Byrne who heads the gasoline division of the comptroller's office.

Developed cases are turned over to the attorney general's department for collection of suits.

FIFTH BODY IS FOUND IN GARAGE

CLARKSBURG, W. Va., Aug. 29.—The body of a woman was found buried within 20 feet of where police dug up the bodies of a widow and her three children.

Fragments of clothing were found farther on in the trench but police have not established whether there are any more bodies.

The woman's body was dug up near the same garage in Quiet Dell, six miles from here, where police believe Powers killed Mrs. Asie Buck Eicher and her children on an improvised gallows.

The chimney ruins of a cottage which was burned a few days before Powers built what police now believe a pre-determined chamber—the unused garage—is about 500 or 600 feet from the garage.

TEXAS IS CENTER OF INTEREST

AUSTIN, Aug. 29.—Two of the country's important industries had their eyes focused on Texas waiting to see what the state's governor, Ross Sterling, will do for the oil man and the cotton farmer.

Governor Huey Long tossed the cotton problem to Governor Sterling by signing a bill prohibiting cotton planting in 1932 and sending it by airplane to the Texas governor's office.

Texas, as producer of more than one-third of the country's cotton crop, ought to act while the cotton is still in the hands of the growers, said O. K. Allen.

Meantime, Texas bankers, generally opposing legislative action in the cotton problem, were considering a call of their executive committee to outline a voluntary plan to solve the cotton problem.

Curtis can put in an all-letter lineup if he thinks best. He has King and Stevens as ends, Jones and Fleming as tackles, Williams and Ashman as guards, Segars as center, Weaver as quarter, Townsend and Faircloth as fullbacks, and Fleming lettered at an Am-son last year while Connolly galloped in the backfield of an Am-son school.

Among the first string men who can fill in for any of these will probably be Hagar at full, Duval at guard, Ashman at end, and Faircloth can fill in at quarter and Yonker at tackle. By switching his line-up some he can have a good relief man at any position.

The Abilene Eagles, who will probably be Ranger's closest rival for district championship, expects to have its best team since the championship eleven of 1928, according to Prexy Anderson, who says that it has a good start with seven letter men, all regulars of last year. Besides these, the spring training class presented several dozen candidates that Prexy rates as both good and hard—mostly good. Gaines Davis and Bill Falls, 200-pounders who played some last year are expected to earn a position near the center of the line. The backfield is expected to include J. W. (Dub) Pool, Jr., Glenn Watt and Wayne Middleton, the latter a fullback.

The Abilene scribe, after watching the team work out, admitted in a print that the backfield lacked a little of the three v's—vim, vigor and vitality.

Incidentally the Eagles have lost three games away from home. One is at Sweetwater, one at Eastland and one at Breckenridge. Teams that will play in Abilene include Colorado, Stamford, Brownwood, Ranger and Cisco.

So far all is quiet on the western front—out Cisco way. Benny Adams, who usually writes some "Big Dam Chatter" has not begun chattering. No word has been received in this section about the prospects or the material for the Big Dam Lobes.
