COURT REDISTRICTING.

Saving of at least \$100,000 will be provided for in the court redistricting bill to be written by a joint legislative committee...

"The bill will have enough saving in it to fully justify its enactment—it will offer to save the people enough that it will be mighty hard for any group to fight its adoption..."

The bill, he said, is to offer to consolidate other courts elsewhere, and to wipe out, when their terms expire, the several special courts over the state, including a new one just set up at Longview.

"We can make it unnecessary to keep a single one of the temporary courts," he said.

The bill will be drawn so that mergers of two courts will not deprive either judge of any part of an elected term. The consolidations, even if ordered in the next few months, cannot be completely worked out before Jan. 1, 1935...

"It doesn't take many district courts to cost \$100,000 a year," Rep. Burns, chairman of the joint committee pointed out. "We feel that it will be a duty, based on experience so far in court redistricting, to recommend the merging of enough courts, and expiration of enough temporary courts, to save the state at least \$100,000 a year..."

Other members of the committee are O. R. Van Zandt, Tioga, and Senator Oliver Cunningham, Abilene.

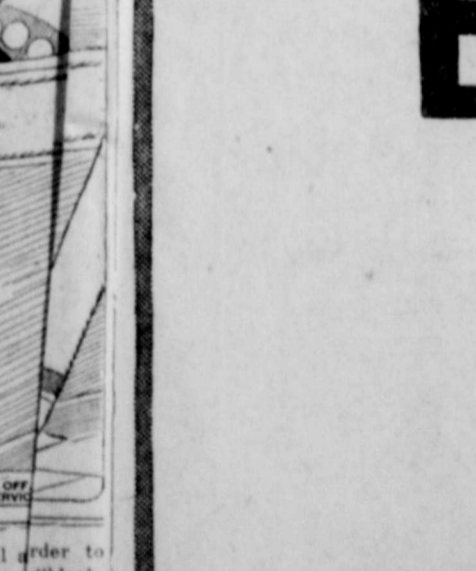

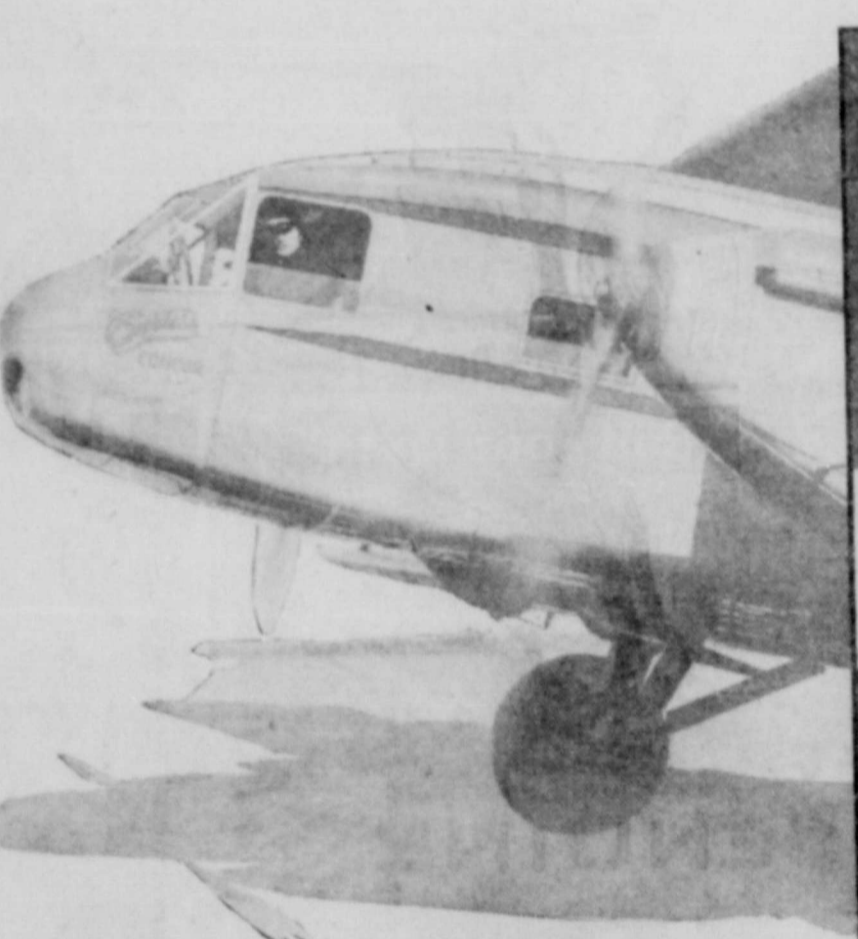
