"This is our Land" is the theme for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet to be held Saturday night at 7:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt High School gym.

Ben H. Wooten, Dallas, outstanding banker will be the speaker. He is an active chairman of the Board of Dallas Federal Savings and Loan Association.

The speaker holds such honors as Dallas Top Salesman for the year 1950, Dallas' Headliner in 1952; Linn Award for outstanding community service, national citation by National Conference of Christians and Jews recognizing services in promoting understanding and civic cooperation among all faiths, New York Sales Executives' Club Applause Award and Horatio Alger Award by American Schools and Colleges Association in 1959.

Wooten has served as president of Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock, Arkansas which serves the states of Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, New Mexico and Texas, chairman of the Board of Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock, vice-president and member of Executive Committee of Republic National Bank of Dallas, president of First National Bank of Dallas and Chairman of the Board of Directors of the First National Bank in Dallas.

He has served as president of Dallas Chamber of Commerce, helped organize Texas Research League, a citizen - supported agency devoted to research into programs and problems of Texas government and is past president of National Bank Division of the American Bankers Association.

Telephone Toll Cable Installed

Installation of an underground toll cable which will add more toll circuits to local telephone service is underway announced Bill Woodard, manager of West Texas Telephone Co.

The 55 miles of cable is part of a two-step plan being inaugurated with the new central office to be built in the near future here. The manager said, "The cable will make more toll circuits available here."

The cable should be completed in about 60 days. Brooks Construction Co. of Shawnee, Oklahoma is laying the underground wire. The cable extends from Dimmitt to Nazareth, from Nazareth to Hart on to Plainview. The cable is being buried from a minimum of 36 inches to a maximum of 48 inches.

Woodard commented, "The toll cable will give more outside trunks and when central office is built, it will complete second stage of new facilities for the telephone company. With the completion of new office even more outside trunks will be added to the telephone service."

West Texas Telephone Co. is limited in good service due to outdated facilities and lack of equipment according to Woodard.

The manager said, "We will offer the best telephone service to be obtained in the area within two or three years."

Services Conducted Friday For R. W. (Scotty) Scoggin

Funeral services for R. W. (Scotty) Scoggin, 50 were held Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. in the First Baptist Church, Dimmitt.

Hilburn continued, "The governor's bill would increase salary of teachers to \$90 (bachelor) and \$107 (master's) next year. Teachers would receive \$89 every other year for the next ten years. Beginning salary schedule for 1974-75 would be \$4500 for Bachelor degree. This would be an increase of \$486 over 10 year period."

"Cost of governor's program will be \$32,800,000 for a two-year period. Forty million will go for teacher's pay during the two years and other money would be for teacher retirement and textbooks."

"Up to present time, local districts have never paid any costs of textbooks or teacher retirement," commented Hilburn. "Governor's bill proposes that local school districts pay one fifth of the cost of teacher retirement. For next year only, this would cost districts \$55,661,000. Cost of textbooks for next year which is \$15,481,000 would cost local districts one fifth of their money if governor's bill passes."

It would be my guess that anytime a race relation problem arises in any country feelings are apt to run rather high. In most instances deep-seated prejudices seem to prevail rather than the better judgment with which most people are equipped. There have been many regrettable occurrences in the Southern States in recent years as a result of sizeable segment of the population trying to throw off the yoke of oppression, both real and imaginary. We mentioned here last week that much of the present strife and turmoil could have been avoided if all of the Southern States had approached the matter with the same good judgment that was used in Texas. All constitutional rights and privileges have been extended to every citizen of this state so far as the right to vote is concerned, and that we feel is the greatest privilege of American citizenship. Had this procedure taken place in all of the Southern states there would be no cause for the continuing demonstrations.

The production was for the financial benefit of the exchange student program and in that regard it was highly successful. The Lions have again demonstrated that they have initiative and talent.

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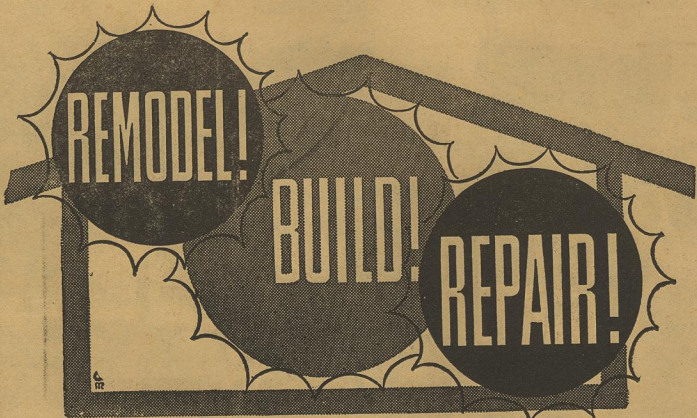

needed. Dual applications of an ammonium phosphate, either liquid or dry, plus anhydrous ammonia has proven to be one of the best methods available for application of fertilizer for cotton.

Banding of an ammonium phosphate provides one big benefit. This is the combination of nitrogen and phosphorus together in the same fertilizer particle in the same band. It has been definitely shown that this combination of nitrogen and phosphorus will result in a greater uptake of the applied phosphorus by the plant.

The calcium phosphates, 0-20-0 and 0-46-0, can also be applied as a dual application with ammonia, however, such a dual application will result in a decreased water solubility and availability of phosphate, therefore, it would generally be undesirable to band together a calcium phosphate and ammonia. Where calcium phosphates are being used, it would be more desirable to proceed with a

broadcast application with a separate application of ammonia being made.

For time of application of fertilizer for cotton, phosphorus should be applied either preplant or early sidedress when the plant is in the 4 to 6 leaf stage. Nitrogen application can be made up to time of first square. A good method which has been proven to be good is to place the dual application into the sides of the bed prior to watering or sidedress after

cotton is up to a good stand. By applying the fertilizer on 20 inch centers and if replanting is necessary, the fertilizer band is only 10 inches away from the row.

In cotton fertilization, for best results, use a completely watersoluble ammonium phosphate in a banded application. The dual application of ammonia with the ammonium phosphate is desirable and saves one trip across the field which saves time and labor costs.

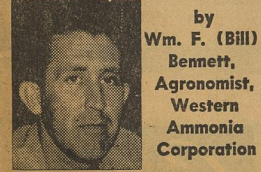

COTTON FERTILIZATION
Using the proper method of application of fertilizer for cotton can often mean the difference between profit and loss from that fertilizer application.

The preferred method for application of a phosphate source is in a band with the band being placed on 20 inch centers or within 10 inches of the row on each side. If convenient to do so, it would be desirable to place the phosphorus band even closer to the row. Research has generally shown that a banded application will produce an additional 10 to 20 lb. lint cotton per acre over a broadcast application where the phosphorus is

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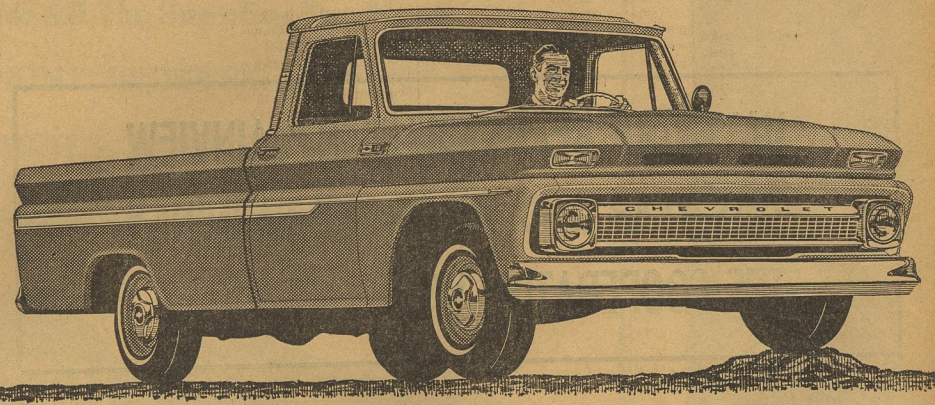

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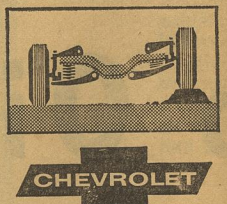

H-D Council Votes Delegates For District Meeting

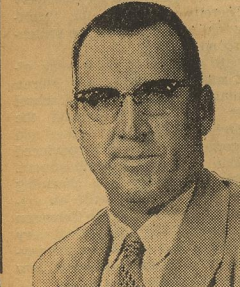

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Dimmitt P-TA Responsible For First Water In School System

(Editor's Note: The following facts concerning the early history of Dimmitt P-TA were taken from the scrapbook collected by Helen Richardson, historian for local P-TA).

Organization of Dimmitt Parent-Teacher Association was October 19, 1922. Mrs. John Flanagan, wife of the county sheriff then, presided as the first president.

The following year, 1923-24, Mrs. E. L. O'Neil served as president. She was second grade teacher in the school and her husband was owner of a Dimmitt Dry Goods store.

The late Mrs. E. B. Wright followed Mrs. O'Neil as president. Mrs. Wright was president for seven years. The historian is deeply indebted to Mrs. Wright for her assistance in compiling the early history of Dimmitt P-TA.

Mrs. Wright gave Helen Richardson articles from her personal scrapbook which portrayed her aims and aspirations for the Dimmitt P-TA. It seemed that drinking water for

the school children at Dimmitt's only building had always been a problem when Mrs. Wright became P-TA president. The school did not have a windmill - really there was very few windmills in Dimmitt. The children either brought drinking water in jars, or did without, or went over to the Cowser's for water. The school board voted that it would furnish the necessary money for a well, if men in the P-TA would do the work. As a result, a well was dug and a windmill was put up. This well was used by the school until Dimmitt put in a city water system.

The P-TA also, bought Coleman gasoline lanterns for the school auditorium so that programs could be held at night with the luxury of this artificial "Daylight." Of course, each lantern had to be "re-pumped and re-mantled" once or twice during each meeting, but they were such an improvement over kerosene lamps that no one minded.

So runs the early history of the Dimmitt Parent-Teacher Association.

Dimmitt History Of P-TA Given

(Editor's Note: Following are more notes taken from the history of Dimmitt P-TA.)

In 1931, Dimmitt P-TA delegates returned from a state meeting excited over a new feature they'd been inspired to add to local organization. This new feature was to be the plan for room-mothers.

First room mothers were:

- First grade, Mrs. Ray Sheffy
 - Second grade, Mrs. E. R. Rothwell
 - Third grade, Mrs. Fred Boswell
 - Fourth grade, Mrs. G. L. Musick
 - Fifth grade, Mrs. Donald Dures
 - Sixth grade, Mrs. B. E. Huckabay
 - Seventh grade, Mrs. J. C. Benton
- The organization was spurred to do something about regular P-TA attendance in 1931-32. A picnic was

promised to the room having the most parents present at P-TA meetings during the year.

The fourth grade with Mrs. P. P. Robb, the teacher who finished the year for Mrs. C. A. Cryer, won the picnic. It was held at the "old Carter place" at the northeast corner of the town section, with the members of the P-TA furnishing the food. The practice of offering prizes to rooms with most parents present at P-TA has continued. For several years after "the picnic", a flag was passed from room to room each month or until the next meeting. Sometimes in the years that followed, the P-TA began to offer \$3 to the room with the best P-TA attendance in the first four grades; \$3 to a room in the next four grades; and \$3 to one of the grades in High School.

Mrs. W. A. Murphy was elected president in 1932. City water became available so the old windmill was taken down and water piped to, not in, the building. Drinking fountains were placed over wooden troughs in front of the building. A city light plant was erected and the P-TA took down the old gasoline lanterns. The Fort Worth and Denver Railroad was built in 1928-29 and the school grew by leaps and bounds as the town boomed.

Mrs. Percy Estes served as P-TA president in 1933-34. She was the wife of the County judge and County School superintendent and mother of the present P-TA historian, Helen Richardson. This was the year that the Texas Federation had a record of Dimmitt membership.

Mrs. C. J. Mapes was elected president for 1933-34. She took a correspondence course in "Procedure" for officers and teachers to help her with her work that year. She felt that it was beneficial and was most happy to receive a certificate from the National president upon finishing the course. During that year, the P-TA sponsored the "Cal Farley - Stuttering Sam" show. It was the custom of this group of entertainers to donate their services toward money-making projects of worthwhile organizations. Their chicken supper was the only recompense they asked. The P-TA members sold \$200 worth of tickets and \$35 was taken in from popcorn and candy that was sold.

Mrs. Wayne Thomas, wife of the County Agent, and now of Perryton, became president in 1936. Student representatives from the High School to the P-TA were an unusual addition. Representatives from the var-

sants thickly populated so they can be hunted in future years."

According to the game warden at Canyon, it is a \$250 fine to shoot a pheasant. Cates commented, "We'll sure turn in anyone seen shooting pheasants in the county."

Cates said, "If there is enough interest in pheasants, I'll try to get some more of the game birds."

There were three hens and a rooster given to each farmer desiring the birds. Farmers taking pheasants include: Dale Winders, O. B. Winkle, Doyle Tiffin, Jud Baldrige, Truman Touchstone, Sam Gilbreath, Jimmy Presley, C. G. Maples, T. D. Claborn.

Mrs. E. C. Hudson was president in 1937-38. She was "Expression" teacher and her husband was owner of the Ford Motor Co. She recalls during her year "Teacher Retirement" was brought up at every meeting much to the disgust of the parents, but right down the teachers' alley.

The organization divided for a short time in 1939-40 when the Grade School seceded from the High School unit. Mrs. Barber Eubanks was elected president of the High School. It was hoped that more could be accomplished by each group being able to concentrate on its own problems. Attendance was so poor in the High School group that in the fall of 1941 they merged and Mrs. Eubanks was made president of the one group. This same experiment was tried by the Dimmitt P-TA last year. The two groups were merged this year due to poor attendance in the High School group.

When visiting with Mrs. Eubanks she recalled, "Money was pretty hard to get in those days — and I remember a lot of us nearly swallowed our uppers one day when someone, out of a clear-blue sky, moved and another someone seconded, — a motion to buy a bass drum. We bought it, but it cleaned out the treasury!" The drum was bought for the High School band.

In 1944-45 Mrs. P. P. Robb was president. An outstanding project was that of adopting the Pyracantha shrub as a memorial to the soldiers in World War II. Most of those shrubs growing in Dimmitt today were planted that year. The shrubs in front of the High School were bought and planted by the P-TA. In the spring of 1945, school was closed with a Fun Day at Grade School for everyone. After a morning of games and contests, parents, pupils, and teachers enjoyed a basket dinner together. In the afternoon the group moved to the front of the High School to the Pyracantha bushes where a dedication service was held. Attendance was good at all P-TA meetings during the war years. Tires and gasoline being rationed kept people close to home.

An outstanding health program was initiated by P-TA in 1948-49 while Mrs. Buster Cooper was president. Mrs. Howard Hershey was chairman of the Health Committee. A physical examination was given to all children in the first four grades by Dr. Lipscomb, Amarillo and Dr. Smith, Dr. Perrin, both of Dimmitt.

When parents' permission had been given, whooping cough, diphtheria, small pox and schick tests were, also given to children in first four grades. P-TA members assisted doctors with children by keeping records and contacting parents. This health program under Mrs. Hershey's direction continued for several years. The P-TA project was contributing some band suits.

So through the years Dimmitt P-TA has continued to better the relation-

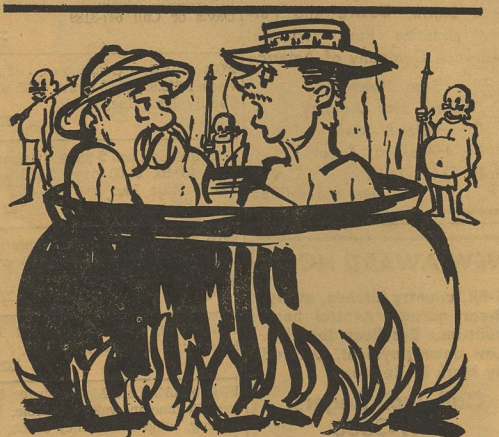
ship of parents to teachers and aid in projects around the school.

Some projects completed during the past include book shower for the school in 1949-50, dental survey, eye tests and hearing tests, purchase of grand piano in 1950-51, purchase of Visual Aids in 1954-55, library carts for high school, lounge furniture for South Grade School and purchase of an audiometer for testing student hearing.

March 26 Is Deadline For 1965 Feed Grain Signup

Friday, March 26, is the last day growers may file applications to take part in the 1965 feed grain program, Charley E. Hill, Office Manager, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Castro County Committee, said today.

He reminded farmers that only those who participate in the feed grain program will be eligible for price support on their 1965 corn, barley, and grain sorghum crops. As last year, the support is made available through loans and price-support payments.

Besides qualifying for price support, the participating grower also earns a diversion payment for shifting part of his feed grain base to a conserving use. Minimum diversion is 20 percent of the individual farm's total feed grain base. Maximum diversion is 50 percent of the base or 25 acres if this is more. For diverting more than the minimum, the di-

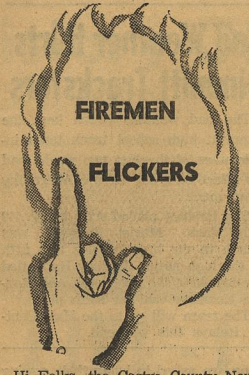
