President Hoover's big credit pool will be ready within a few days by the end of the week-to provide ready cash for banks unable to turn their assets into currency quickly. The fund of \$500,000,000 for the pool will be subscribed by that time. The response of banking houses to the credit pool program has been gratifying. The great new reservoir of cash should do a great deal in stimulating sluggish credit currents, liquidifying assets that have become frozen through public timidity and lack of confidence.

New steel mills have been returned to operation in Pennsylvania. Large contracts for steel for New York's big "Radio City" and other big orders, reflecting an upturn in constructional activities, have set the wheels of one of the big key industries of the country to turning a little faster. As a result the restricting working week of the laborers will be lengthened. The worker will earn more money and have more money to spend. Correspondingly business will be better and there will be more work for the laborer.

Consumption of cotton is gaining. Hence the outlook for the textile is brighter. A survey of conditions and prospects by the New York Cotton Exchange service is described in the most encouraging terms of any report issued by the service in many months, say press reports.

Silicosis is caused by silica, a white crystalline substance composed of oxygen and silicon, the two most abundant elements in the earth's crust. They are believed either to dissolve in the lungs or to form a colloid, a substance of gluelike consistency which floats in the lung tissue fluids. resulting irritation creates scar tissue, and once established silicosis is permanent. The disease is usually progressive and frequently culminates in the dreaded tuberculosis.

Silicosis, of course, is most prevalent among industrial workers such as drillers and muckers in subways. But this menace to our health is faced, to a lesser degree, by all of us, when we travel over dusty roads - and silica is especially plentiful in sand, of which many roads are partly composed.

This is just one more reason for pushing the good roads movement. Eliminating the dust and dirt by even inexpensively bound top surface, we have always known adds much comfort, and we now learn it is an aid to health.
