TRUCKS IN TROUBLE.

(The Bonham Favorite, Oct. 10, 1931)
Selfishness and greed often defeat their own purposes. It appears now as if the truck men engaged in operating truck lines have allowed their desire for quick profits to get them into serious trouble. They stand to lose heavily, and justly so, because they have not been content to recognize the rights of the public nor the public welfare in the use of the state highways.

These men were quick to recognize the advantages given them by the construction of good highways at public expense, and they at once began to use the advantage. At first, trucks of reasonable size were used, but gradually the capacity of the trucks was enlarged until monsters carrying many tons, and wide and long enough to monopolize a large part of the highway, were traveling over and fast destroying the roads the taxpayers' money had built for public use. Trucks almost as long, and carrying almost as much, as a railroad freight car were gradually increasing in number. Not only were they destroying permanent roads, but they were driving the railways out of business by carrying freight at lower rates. In addition they were threatening the safety of others using the highways.

So great a menace have these overly large trucks become that the legislature has sought to regulate by law the size of motor vehicles that may be used on the public highways as well as the weight of the loads they may haul. Refusing to see the gathering storm of opposition, the truck owners persisted in increasing the intensity of the opposition, and even after the law was enacted they continued to ignore it. Now the orders have gone out to the highway patrol to enforce the law. As far as their limited number will permit the patrolmen are doing their duty. It was reported the first of the week that over 200 trucks were held at one town for violation of the law.

The truck owners could have saved themselves had they been content to use the highways in a legitimate way with legitimate loads, and by showing due regard for the right of other motorists. If they now seek to evade or defeat the law, they will be but insuring their further restriction. The public feels outraged at the action of the big truck operators, and the public is determined to have relief in some lawful way from the outrageous injustice it suffers at the hands of the men who own and direct the big freight trucks. The public has no desire to destroy the business of the truck owners, but it is determined that the greed of the business shall not destroy the highways the public has paid for, nor the necessary business of freight carriers who construct and maintain their own roadbeds.




